*Church Commissioners'-Office,

HIS Majesty's Commissioners for building new
churches, in pursuance of the directions of an
Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of
His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An
Act for building, and promoting the building, of
additional churches in populous parishes," do hereby
give notice, that upon a representation from the said
Commissioners, His Majesty was pleased, by an
Order in Council, of the 30th day of May, in the
year 1832, to order that the parish of St. Luke,
Chelsea, in the county of Middlesex, and diocese of
London, should be divided into two distinct and
separate parishes, under the 16th section of the
above-mentioned Act, and that the said parishes
should be named respectively the parish of St. Luke,
Chelsea, and the parish of Upper Chelsea; that the
chapel called Holy Trinity Chapel should be the
parish church of the said parish of Upper Chelsea;
and that the boundaries of the said parish of Upper
Chelsea should be as follows:

The boundary to commence in the centre of the
road called Blackland's-lane, where the parish of
Chelsea joins the parish of Kensington; and pro-
ceeding, in a north east direction, along the boun-
dary which separates the parishes of Chelsea and
Kensington, crossing Sloane-street; and from thence
eastward along the boundary which separates the
parishes of Chelsea and St. Margaret's, Westmin-
ster, to where the parish of Chelsea joins the parish
of St. George, Hanover-square; from thence to
proceed, in a southwardly direction, along the boun-
dary which separates the parishes of Chelsea and
St. George's, Hanover-square, crossing Pont-street,
and continuing along the same boundary, to the
Ranelagh Sewer, and along the same boundary, in
the centre of Ranelagh Sewer, to the line of the
west side of the road belonging to the east court of
Chelsea Hospital; from thence to proceed north-
ward on such line of the side of the road, until it
reaches the road; from thence along the centre of
the said road, passing Franklin's-row, and continu-
ing along the centre of the roadway called White-
land's-lane, crossing the King's-road and Colville's
nursery ground; and from thence northward along
the centre of the roadway called Blackland's-lane,
to the point where the boundary commenced; which
district was more particularly described in the plan.

And the description of the said boundaries has
been since enrolled in the High Court of Chan-
cery, and registered in the Office of Registry of
the Lord Bishop of London.
