NOTICE is hereby given, that information has been received at this Office from His Majesty's Consul at Christiania, dated the 26th of last month, respecting the erection of two new Light-houses near Flekkerøe, to the east of the Naze of Norway; and that the Norwegian Government, on the 16th of October last, published a notification thereof, of which the following is a translation:

“As soon as practicable after the middle of next month of November (the exact time will be advertised hereafter), there will be lit a lamp-light on the Oxisland (Oxoe) to the east of Flekkerøe, on the eastern channel leading to Christiansand, at an elevation of 135 feet above the sea. At a distance less than four miles (fifteen to a degree), the light will, in clear weather, present the following appearance; during two minutes and fifty-five seconds, it will shew a steady flame, after this will follow a short eclipse, succeeded by a strong flash of light, and, after a second eclipse, it will regain and retain, during two minutes and fifty-five seconds, its original steady flame; the brilliant flashes will occur every four minutes, and, at a distance exceeding four miles, these only will be observable. The light will be visible as above from all points of the compass, and will be kept burning throughout the year. The light-house is white, and serves for a day-mark.

“In connection with the Oxisland Light, there will be lit on the Odderisland (Odderøer), a channel or harbour light. At the distance of one mile from Oxisland, with the light on that island N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. the Odderisland Light may be seen, in clear weather from the shrolds, in N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N. keeping this course with the Odderøe Light in sight, until twenty fathoms distant from the light, you go clear of all rocks and shallows; then you vary your course to N. W. to W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. (all per compass), continuing
