The Assizes for the County of Bedford, hath of late by the Kings Command been kept at Ampthil, but by the Intercession of the Right Honorable the Earl of Ailesbury, His Majesty has been pleased it should be this time kept at Bedford.

Ampthil, January 22. The last week was held here the General Quarter Sessions for the County of Bedford, the Earl of Ailesbury our Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum was upon the Bench, and having received a very Loyal Presentment from the Grand Jury, his Lordship did greatly commend their expressing in this manner their Loyalty to His Majesty, and their Zeal for the Church, and gave them his own, and the thanks of the rest of that most Loyal Bench, with an assurance of their unanimous Resolution to encourage the Prosecution of their good Designs.

Deale, February 1. The Dapnet has been very full of Ice, but is now pretty clear again, the Ice being most of it driven to the Northwards.

Westminster Feb 4 This day the Earl of Danby

Danby, according to the Rule of Court, made this day Sevennight, was brought from the *Tower* to the *Kings Bench*, where his Lordships Council very Fully and Learnedly Argued his Case, insisting upon the hardship and length of his Lordships Imprisonment, which had continued now for Five years. That in the Intervals of Parliament, the *Kings Bench* was the Supream Court, to which the Subject could have recourse for his Liberty: And that the Law did not leave any Subject under an Indefinite Confinement, without any remedy. That besides, the Earl of *Danby* had His Majesties Pardon, which was produced, and offered to the Court to be read; and they concluded with a Prayer, that the said Earl might be admitted to Bail; Then the said Pardon was read, and some of the Judges desired time till the next Term to consider of his Lordships Case; which was wholly new to them; But his Lordship praying they would please to deliver their Opinions some time this Term; the Court gave leave that his Lordships Council should towards the end of the Term, move the Court to know their farther pleasure; and in the mean time his Lordship was remanded to the *Tower*.

Whitehall, February 4. His Majesty hath been graciously pleased to constitute *Ambur Herbert Esq;* Rear Admiral of *England*, in consideration of the many good and acceptable Services performed by him as in the Inferior Commands which he hath had in His Majesties Fleets, so more especially of late years in the Quality first of Vice-Admiral, and then of Admiral and Commander in Chief of His Majesties Fleet employed in and about the Mediterranean against the Pyrates of *Argiers*, and other His Majesties Enemies of *Barbary*.

Whitehall, Feb. 5. *Thomas Archer* of *Lancashire* in the County of *Warwick*, Esq; having by Warrant from His Majesties Privy Council, been sent for in custody of a Messenger, for his contempt of an Order of the Board, requiring his appearance to give an account of a Paper in the nature of a Challenge, annexed by him, or his Order, on the High Cross in *Warwick*, reflecting upon the Deputy-Lieutenants and Militia Officers of that County: And the said Mr. *Archer* attending His Majesty in Council on the First of this Month, and by his Petition humbly

submitting himself to His Majesties Pleasure, and begging His Pardon; It was ordered that he should attend the Right Honourable the Earl of *Sunderland* Lord-Lieutenant of the County of *Warwick*, and make such publick satisfaction to the said Deputy-Lieutenants, and Militia-Officers, as his Lordship should judge fit; and that thereupon he should be discharged from the custody of the Messenger. And accordingly Mr. *Archer* attended his Lordship on Monday last, and was required by his Lordship, in pursuance of His Majesties Order in Council, to make his submission to Sir *Thomas Price*, Sir *Charles Lee*, and *Thomas Lucy*, Esq; three of the Deputy-Lieutenants, who were there present, in the name of all the Lieutenancy of that County, which he did, expressing much sorrow for his rash act in affixing the Paper before-mentioned, and promising to behave himself with all Obedience to the King; and submission to His Officers; upon which he was discharged.

Westminster, Feb 6. This day *John Hambden*, Esq; came to his Tryal at the *Kings Bench* Barr, upon an Indictment of High Misdemeanor, to which he had pleaded the last Term, and was found Guilty of the same. The whole Tryal will very suddenly be made publick by my Lord Chief Justice his appointment.
