Turin, February 16:

HE Marriage between the Duke of Savoy and Madamoiselle Daughter to the Duke of Orleans, was declared here the last week, upon which his Highness has received the Complements of the Popes Nuncio, the Abbé d'Estrades Ambassador of France, and the other Foreign Miniflers residing at this Court. The Count de Majano will part from hence in few days, with the Pretents which the Duke of Savoy fends to Madamoifelle, and we are told, that the Marriage will b: celebrated fome time the next month. Venice, February 19. We are told that the Senate have sent a full Power to their Ambassador at Liniz, to fign the League against the Turks; and that the Polish Minister at that Court will be empowered to do the like on the part of the King of Poland, who has agreed to all that was defi.ed of It's said the great him by the Confederates. Duke of Tuscany will likewise come into this Allyance, and that he will not only joyn his Galleys with the Fleet of this State, but will likewife contribute in Money towards the War; for which great Preparations are making here. Our Letters from Turkey give us an account that the Grand Signior had, with much difficulty, been brought to give order to have the Visier Strangled, and that no-thing but the absolute recessity there was to satisfie the Janisaries, who were ready to mutiny, and threatned a great and fudden Commotion, could have prevailed with him. That for the same reason the Grand Signior had declared he would, the next Campagne, command his Army in Person; But that the People continued notwithstanding very averse to the War, so that the Officers who were fent about to raile men, met every where with much opposition. From Dalmatia they write. that the Morlaques were above 12000 strong, and that with the help of the Horses they had taken from the Turks, they had formed a very confiderable Body of Cavalry.

Danizick, February 21. We have Letters from Moscow, of the 14th fine last month, which tell us, That the Eldest of the two Czars was married the week before to a Lady of very Noble Extraction, and allyed to most of the Great Families in Poland, which is a thing not usual in Moscovy, those Princes being accustom d to chose their Wives among the lowest of their Subjects. That the Sieur Prosting Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden, was arrived at that Court, and had had his Audie ce of the Eldest Czar (the youngest being andifposed) to whom he had declared the great value the King his Mafter his fit his Friendthip, and that his Majefly was fending a fol mn Embaffy to Moscow; and that the said Envoy had afterwards been in Conscrence with the Chief Ministers of that Court, and among other things, had represented to them several weighty reasons that might

conjuncture, to recover what the Turks took from them in the last War.

Lintz, February 24. It is reported here, that feveral Wagons with Provisions are got into New-, beusel, but without any certainty; The lass Letters from Newsol, the Head Quarter in Hungary, told us, that the Torks had indeed prepared a great Convoy for that place, but that hearing that Count Teckeley had been attacked and pursued several miles by the Troops of Lithuania, and the Imperialists they durit venture no farther than Vaccia. Out next Letters from Presbourg, will we doubt not give us an account of the Duke of Lorrain's arrival there, and that the Imperial Com-

mission hath been opened.

Ratubonne, february 24, They write from Gran in Hungary, that a Jew who was come thirther from the Turkish Territories, had not only confirmed the account they had before of the Grand Vifiers being Strangled at Belgrade the 25th of the laft month, but reported withall, that there were great D'scontents among the Janisaries: That the Grand Signior had caused their Pay to be doubled, and farther to fatisfie them, it was given out, he will command them in Person the next Campagne, That it was said he will bend all his Force against Hungary, to repair the Difgraces of the last year, and that all possible endeavours were used through. out the Ottoman Empire, to raise Men and gather Provisions; but that according to all appearance, the Turks will not be able to bring fo great and Army into the Field this Summer as they did the laft, or if they do, they will be raw undisciplined men. We have other Letters that inform us, that the King of Poland makes likewise great Preparations on his lide; That he will have an Army of 50000 men of his own Troops, with which he will act either in Podolia or Hungary, according as the Enemy turn their Forces. The News of the great Successes of the Cossacks, and of the Moldarians and Walachians having put themselves under the Protection of the Crown of Poland is confirmed; and there is a report that the Transilvanians and treating with the King of Poland, which we shall be glad to have confirmed. The Troops of Lithuania are on their march, and we hope ere it be long; to have an account that they have made themselves Masters of Casebaw and Esperies, the only considerable Towns which the Rebels remain passified of in upper Hungary. We have had no persain news of Count Teckeley since the precipitate retreat he was forced to make about a fortnight agone to avoid an Engagement with the Troops of Liebuania, who followed him feveral miles, and falling upon his Rear, killed many of his men.

Hamburg, February 2'. The Count de Berta, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Kings of Denmark and Sweden is still here, and has frequent Conferences with the Duke of Holffein Gotterp, to dispose things to an accommodation between the King of Denmark and him. ters from Danzick tell us, that according to their advices from Poland, no doubt was made, but the Moscovites would come into the War against the induce the Czars to make use of this favourable Turks; and that the Polish and Moscovite Com-

missioners that are now met at Smolensko; having Letter from Captain Randoll Mac Donnel, of the adjusted the Preliminaries, were entred upon the main Points of their Commission, with that dispositioned both sides, that there is great reason to believe their Conferences will have a very good, and speedy Conclusion. They write from Berlin, that the Count de Lamberg, the Imperial Envoy, hath had several Conferences with the Ministers of that Court, but do not tell us with what Success,

Cologne, March 3 The Sieur Fuchs Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh, parted from hence yesterday for the Hague; whither the Elector of Cologne is likewise sending the Baron de Plestendorf. The Baron de Hoensbrocke, the Spanish Minister, continues still here; He has it's faid, defired our Elector to grant the Troops which the Duke of Hanouer has undertaken to furnish for the affistance of the Spanish Notherlands, a passage through his Electoral Highnesses Territories, but we do not hear that he has obtained it. The Counc de Chaif-ul, who is coming hither from France to command our Electors Forces, is not yet arrived; but we are informed that feveral Troops have, in the mean time, orders to march towards Rhinberg, where his Electoral Highnels intends to have a Camp of 6 or 7000 men. Our last Letters from Linez gave an account that the Emperor had appointed the Count de Caprara and Count l'affi to command his Forces in Hungary. That the Troops of Lithuania were actually on their march to attack Caschaw or Esperies, after having obliged Count Teckeley to relice in great diforder and with confiderable loss. That the Turks are providing great Magazines at Belgrade, and make their utmost Efforts to bring a great Army into the Field this next Summer.

Paris, March 8. Monsieur de la Vauguion late Ambassador from this Crown at the Court of Spain, is returned hither. The Kings Journey continues fixed for the beginning of the next month, and in the mean time the Troops of the Houshold march towards Flanders; from whence we have an account that the Spaniards have burnt several Villages belonging to Lille; and that the French Troops, under the command of Monfieur de Montal, have done the like on the fide of Wallbon Brabant. Wé arc told that the Genoueles are fitting out several men of War, as well as Galleys.
