A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

7 HEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the third and fourth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to alter and " amend the laws for the election of the Ma-" gistrates and Councils of the Royal Burghs in " Scotland," it is, among other things, enacted, " that " the several burghs in schedule (C.) to the said Act " annexed, shall be divided into wards or districts, " which, together with the number of councillors to " be chosen by each such ward or district, shall be " fixed and ascertained by the Commissioners named " and appointed by His Majesty to inquire into and "report upon the condition of the several burghs and " towns of Scotland, by virtue of a commission, dated " on the fifteenth day of July in the present year; " and such Commissioners shall have regard to its " being the purport and meaning of this Act, that the " number of wards shall be such that each ward shall, " at the first election to be made under this Act, " choose, as nearly as may be, the number of six ": councillors, and at the subsequent annual elections " in each succeeding year the number of two coun-" cillors; and the said Commissioners shall, upon " such division being made and completed, report the " same to His Majesty's Privy Council, who shall " cause such report to be published by Royal Pro-" clamation in the Gazette; and the number and

" limits of such districts, and the number of councillors to be elected by each such district, being so fixed, reported, and published, shall be held and taken to be a part of this Act, in the same manner and to the same effect as if the same were particularly set forth and enacted herein:"

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, made and passed in the third and fourth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to provide for " the appointment and election of Magistrates and " Councillors for the several Burghs and Towns of " Scotland which now return, or contribute to return, Members of Parliament, and are not Reyal Burghs," it is, among other things, enacted, " that the said burghs or towns of Paisley, Greenock, " Leith, and Kilmarnock, shall be divided into " wards or districts, which, together with the " number of councillors to be chosen by each such " ward or district, shall be fixed and ascertained by " the Commissioners named and appointed by His " Majesty to inquire into and report upon the con-" dition of the several burghs and towns of Scot-" land by a commission, dated on the fifteenth day " of July in the present year; and such Commis-" sioners shall have regard to its being the purport " and meaning of this Act, that the number of " wards shall be such that each ward shall, at the " first election to be made under this Act, choose, " as nearly as may be, the number of three coun-" cillors, and at the subsequent annual elections in " each succeeding year the number of one coun" clor; and the said Commissioners shall, upon " such division being made and completed, report " the same to His Majesty's Privy Council, who " shall cause such report to be published by Royal " Proclamation in the Gazette; and the number " and limits of such districts, and the number of " councillors to be elected by each such district, " being so fixed, reported, and published, shall be " held and taken to be a part of this Act, in the " same manner and to the same effect as if the " same were particularly set forth and enacted " herein:"

And whereas such commissions as are in the said Acts recited to have been granted by His Majesty on the fifteenth day of July in this present year, were respectively granted of that date; and whereas, as well under the authority thereof, as of the said Acts, the Commissioners named and appointed by His Majesty in that behalf, have duly executed the said commissions, and made and completed the divisions by the said Acts authorised and required, and have duly reported the same to His Majesty's Privy Council, by two reports under their several and respective hands and seals, which are in the words and figures, or to the purport and effect, hereinafter set forth; His Majesty doth hereby, by the advice of His Privy Council, by this His Royal Proclamation, publish the said two reports, in pursuance of the said Acts, for the purpose of giving full effect thereto according to the intent and meaning of the said Acts, that is to say:

REPORT

By the Commissioners appointed to divide into Wards for the election of Councillors certain Royal Burghs in Scotland.

> To His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

IN pursuance of certain provisions in the Act of Parliament 3° and 4° Gulielmi IV. cap. 76. initialed "An Act to alter and amend the laws for the elec-"tion of the Magistrates and Councils of the Royal "Burghs in Scotland," the Commissioners named and appointed by His Majesty to inquire into and report upon the condition of the several burghs and towns of Scotland, by virtue of a commission, dated on the fifteenth day of July, in the present year, have proceeded to divide into wards the several burghs enumerated in schedule (C.) annexed to the foresaid Act, and to fix and ascertain the number of councillors to be chosen by each of such wards or districts, having regard to its being the purport and meaning of the Act, " that the number of wards shall " be such that each ward shall at the first election " to be made under the Act, choose, as nearly as " may be, the number of six councillors, and at the " subsequent annual elections in each succeeding " year, the number of two councillors;" and the Commissioners beg leave to report the result as follows :---

I .--- THE CITY OF EDINBURGH.

That the ancient and extended royalty of this city shall be divided into five wards, limited and bounded as follows :---

First Ward.

That part of the ancient royalty situate south of the High-street and Canongate from the Castlehillesplanade to St. John's-cross, bounded on the south, east and west by the boundary line of the royalty running from St. John's-cross to the South-back of Canongate, the street of South-back of Canongate to the Cowgate-port, and thence by the line of the Old Town-wall, by the west end of the Grass-market to the Castlehill; also that part of the ancient royalty lying north of the High-street from the Castlehillesplanade to Bank-street, bounded on the east, north, and west by Bank-street, Mound-place, and the Princes-street-gardens.

Second Ward.

Those parts of the ancient and extended royalty comprehended within the following limits, viz. from Bank-street along the High-street to the head of Leith-wynd, down Leith-wynd round by the back of the College-Kirkyard, and including the houses of Shakespeare square and both sides of Waterlooplace, and then along the boundary line of the royalty that intersects the Register-house, West Register-street, the Royal-bank, and Elder-street to the foot of the Catholic Chapel-lane, at Broughtonstreet; thence along York-place, North and South St. David-streets, Princes-street, west side of the Earthen-mound, Mound-place, and Bank-street.

Third Ward.

Those parts of the extended royalty comprehended within the following limits, viz. from a point at the east end of York-place at the intersection of Broughton-street, along York-place and Queen-street to Hanover-street, down Dundas-street and Pitt-street, along East Fettes-row, Royal-crescent, Kirklane at Canonmills, the High-road from Canonmills to Broughton, Broughton-street to the place where it is intersected by the line of the royalty; thence along the line of the royalty intersecting Forth-street and

Hart-street, East Broughton-place along Unionstreet; across Leith-walk, down Elm-row, along the northern boundary of the royalty intersecting Windsor-street, and from the eastern extremity of that boundary round the Caltonhill, including the west end of Regent-terrace, Blenheim-place, Leopoldplace, Hillside-crescent, and part of Windsor-street; and thence along Greenside and Broughton-streets to the east end of York-place.

Fourth Ward.

Those parts of the extended royalty comprehended within the following limits, viz. from a point at the intersection of Fettes-row and Pitt-street along Pittstreet, Dundas-street, Queen-street, North St. Davidstreet, west side of St. Andrew-square, South Saint-David-street, Princes-street, Frederick-street, Howestreet, St. Vincent-street, West Fettes-row, and the irregular boundary line of the royalty running from Fettes-row to St. Vincent-street; also the ground formerly called the Distillery-park, upon which Henderson-row, the Edinburgh Academy, and the Deaf and Dumb Institution are now built.

Fifth Ward.

Those parts of the extended royalty comprehended within the following limits, viz. from a point at the intersection of South Frederick-street and Princesstreet, along Frederick-street, Howe-street, to near the foot of St. Vincent-street; thence along the line of royalty intersecting the Circus-lane, India-street, India-place, Mackenzie-place, Moray-place, Saint Colme-street, Glenfinlas-street, and Charlotte-place to Queensferry-street; and then along that street and Princes-street to the point first mentioned. This ward includes also the Princes-street-gardens, St. John's-chapel, and Cuningham's-fen at Coates, upon which Walker-street, Manor-place, and parts of Coates-crescent, William-street, and Melvillestreet are built.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next being thirty-one; six councillors shall be chosen in each of the first, second, third, and fifth wards, and seven shall be chosen in the fourth ward.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four shall be ten—two being chosen in each of the five wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive shall likewise be ten—two being chosen in each of the five wards. That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall be eleven - two conneillors being chosen in each of the first, second, third, and fifth wards, and three in the fourth ward.

And the members of the council of the said city shall in all future terms of three years after Noventber one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, be elected in the same manner as is above appointed for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both inclusive.

II.-THE CITY OF GLASGOW.

That the royalty of this city shall be divided into five wards, limited and bounded as follows z-

First Ward.

The whole of the royalty within the parliamentary boundary, situated to the east of a line drawn from Hutcheson-bridge through the centres of Saltmarketstreet, High-street, Kirk-street, Castle-street, and the road leading by Inchbelly-bridge to Stirling and Falkirk, till the same reaches the parliamentary boundary.

Second Ward.

That part of the royalty included within a line drawn from the Cross through the centres of Highstreet and Kirk-street, till the same joins the south end of Castle-street; thence northward along the centre of Castle-street to the junction therewith of the road from Possil and Keppochhill; thence along the centre of the road from Possil and Keppochhill to the royalty stone, number one hundred and eighty seven; thence westward along the boundary of the royalty to the royalty stone, number one hundred and ninety three; thence southward along the centure of the road from Garscube-bridge until it comes to the head of Dundas-street; thence eastward along the centre of the road leading to Rottenrow-street, until it reaches the head of John-street; thence southward through the centre of John-street till it joins the centre of Ingram-street; thence eastward along the centre of Ingram-street till it reaches the centre of Candleriggs-street ; thence southward along the centre of Candleriggs-street till it reaches the centre of Trongate-street ; thence eastward through the centre of Trongate-street to the Cross, the point first described. And also those portions of the royalty situated, adjoining to, and immediately south of the Forth and Clyde Canal, and the canal connecting the same with the Monkland Canal, and west | centre of Dundas-street, and of the highway from of ward first. Glasgow to Garscube-bridge, to the extremity of the

Third Ward.

That part of the royalty included within a line drawn from Hutcheson-bridge through the centre of Saltmarket-street to the Cross; thence westward along the centre of Trongate-street to the centre of Candleriggs-street; thence through the centre of Candleriggs-street to the centre of Ingram-street; thence westward along the centre of Ingram-street to the centre of Glassford-street; thence through the centres of Glassford-street and Stockwell-street to the Old-bridge; thence along the right margin of the River Clyde to the point first described.

- Fourth Word.

That part of the royalty included within a line drawn from the Old-bridge northward through the centres of Stockwell-street and Glassford-street till the same reaches the centre of Ingram-street; thence eastward along the centre of that street till the same reaches the centre of John-street; thence northward along the centre of John-street to the head of that street; thence westward along the centre of the road leading from Rottenrow-street to the head of Dundas-street; thence southward through the centre of Dundas-street to the centre of West George-street; thence eastward through the centre of that street to the north west corner of Georgesquare ; thence southward through the centre of the street on the west side of George-square to the head of Queen-street; thence through the centre of that street to the centre of Argyle-street; thence westward through the centre of that street to the head of Maxwell-street ; thence southward through the centre of Maxwell-street and in a straight line at right angles to Great Clyde-street prolonged to the River Clyde; thence eastward along the right margin of the River Clyde to the point first described.

Fifth Ward.

The whole of the royalty situated to the west of a straight line at right angles to Great Clyde-street drawn from the River Clyde to the centre of the south end of Maxwell-street : thence northward along the centre of Maxwell-street to the centre of Argyle-street; thence eastward through the centre of that street to the centre of Queen-street; thence northward through the centre of Queen-street and the centre of the street on the west side of Georgesquare to the centre of West George-street; thence westward along the centre of that street to the centre of Dundas-street; thence northward through the

centre of Dundas-street, and of the highway from Glasgow to Garscube-bridge, to the extremity of the royalty near the royalty stone, number one hundred and ninety three, excluding that portion of the royalty situated, adjoining to, and immediately south of the Forth and Clyde Canal, and west of Port Dundas, which is included in ward second.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next being thirty, six councillors shall be chosen by each ward.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour, and in each succeeding year, shall be ten—two being chosen by each ward.

III.-THE CITY OF ABERDEEN.

That the royalty of this city shall be divided into three wards, limited and bounded as follows:—

First Ward.

To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. beginning on the sea shore at the point where the north boundary of the royalty touches the shore, and following the said north boundary westward till it touches the turnpike road leading from Inverary to Aberdeen; southward along that road and the Gallowgate to Broad-street, and along Broad-street to Union-street; along Union-street, Castle-street, and Justice-street, eastward to Park-lane; along Park-lane and the road or street leading along the foot of the Castlehill to James-street; along Jamesstreet and continuing in a line due south from the termination of the same to the Dee; eastward along the Dee to the mouth of that river; and from thence northward along the sea shore to the point where the north boundary of the royalty touches the shore.

Second Ward.

To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. beginning at the centre of Union-street, opposite the Back-wynd, and keeping along the Back-wynd to Schoolhill; westward along Schoolhill and along Woolmanhill to the point where the Hill-burn crosses Spa-street, near the steps of Gilcomston; from that point northward by the boundary of the royalty, and following the said royalty boundary eastward till it meets the north west point of the boundary of the first ward; then southward by the Inverary-road and Gallowgate to Broad-street, and along Broad-street to Union-street; along Union-street, Castle-street,

and Justice-street, eastward to Park-lane; along Park-lane and the road or street leading along the foot of the Castlehill to James-street, and continued in a line due south from the termination of the same to the Dee; thence up the river to where the same is intersected by a line drawn south in continuation of the Shore-brae; thence up the said line, Shorebrae, and Ship-row, to Union-street; and along Union-street westward to the point opposite the Back-wynd, where the description of the ward began.

Third Ward.

To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. beginning at the point where the Millburn crosses Spa-street, near the steps of Gilcomston, from thence along Woolmanhill and Schoolhill to a point opposite the north end of Back-wynd; along Back-wynd southward to Union-street; along Union-street eastward to opposite the head of Ship-row, down the Ship-row and Shore-brae and in prolongation of the termination of the latter to its intersection of the River Dee; from thence up the River Dee to the mouth of the burn of Ferryhill; and from the mouth of the burn of Ferryhill following the boundary of the royalty to the point on the Millburn near the steps of Gilcomston, where the description of the ward began.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour, and in each succeeding year, shall be six—two being chosen in each ward.

IV .- THE BURGH OF DUNDEE.

First Ward.

^t To contain that portion of the burgh included within the following boundary, viz. beginning with the eastern boundary of the royalty on the turnpike road from Dundee to Arbroath, westward along the said turnpike road, King-street, Cowgate, Murraygate, north side of Trades-hall, High-street, and Overgate, as far as the Long-wynd; southward along the Long-wynd crossing the Nethergate to Slate or Sea-wynd, and along Slate or Sea-wynd to the River Tay; from thence eastward along the river to the eastern boundary of the royalty; and

following the eastern boundary of the royalty to its junction with the turnpike road leading from Dundee to Arbroath, with which the description of the ward began.

Second Ward.

To contain that portion of the burgh included within the following boundary, viz. beginning on the River Tay, at the bottom of Slate or Sea-wynd. and holding northward by Sea-wynd and crossing the Nethergate to the Long-wynd; northward along the Long-wynd to the Overgate; eastward along the Overgate as far as Barrack-street; northward by Barrack-street, Barrack-road, and Constitution-brae, and the road or lane leading along the west side of Stirling's park to the north west corner of Stirling'spark; and from that point in a straight line to the north boundary of the royalty, at the point where a straight line drawn from the north west corner of Stirling's-park to the King's-cross cuts the said boundary of the royalty; from thence westward by the boundary of the royalty, and following the boundary of the royalty south to the River Tay, and along that river eastward to the point at the bottom of Slate or Sea-wynd, where the description of the ward began.

Third Ward.

To contain that portion of the burgh included in the following boundary, viz. beginning with the eastern boundary of the royalty, on the turnpike road between Dundee and Arbroath, westward along the said turnpike road, and by King-street, Cowgate, Murraygate, north side of Trades-hall, High-street, and Overgate, as far as Barrack-street; northward by Barrack-street, Barrack-road, Constitution-brae, and the road or lane leading along the west side of Stirling's-park, to the north west corner of Stirling'spark; and from that point in a straight line to the north boundary of the royalty, at the point where a line drawn from the north west corner of Stirling'spark to the King's cross cuts the said boundary of the royalty; from thence eastward by the boundary of the royalty, and following the same to the point of its junction with the turnpike road from Dundee to Arbroath, where the description of the ward began.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next, being twenty seven councillors shall be chosen in each of the first and second wards—and six shall be chosen in the third ward.

That the number of such councillors to be elected

in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour shall be six-two being chosen in each ward.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive shall be seven—three being chosen in the first ward, and two in each of the second and third wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall likewise be seven—three being chosen in the first ward, and two in each of the second and third wards.

And the members of the council of the said burgh shall, in all future terms of three years after November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, be elected in the same manner as is above appointed for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both inclusive.

V .- THE BURGH OF PERTH.

That the royalty of this burgh shall be divided into four wards, limited and bounded as follows:----

First Ward.

To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. beginning at the junction of the Watergate with the Highstreet, southward along the Watergate to the Southstreet; thence westward along that street to the Meal-vennel; thence northward along the said Mealvennel to the High-street; and thence eastward along that street to its junction with the Watergate.

Second Ward.

To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. beginning at the west end of Perth-bridge, from thence southwards along George's-street and the Watergate, till it reaches the South-street; thence westward along that street to the South-street-port, where the southbranch of the Towns-lead crosses the same; and from thence southward, following the course of that; branch of the Lead which runs along the west and south sides of the South-inch, until it reaches the River Tay; and northward along the river to the; Perth-bridge.

Third Ward.

To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. beginning: at the River Tay, immediately above the Perthbridge; from thence northward along the River Tay to the north boundary of the royalty on the Northinch; from thence westward along that boundary to the Balhousie Mill-lead; from thence following the course of that Lead to the point where it crosses the North Port-street; from thence along the North Port and Curfen-row to Mill-street; thence eastward along Mill-street to the Old Guard-vennel; thence southward along said vennel to the High-street; thence eastward along the High-street to George's-street; and from thence along George's-street to the point at the river above the bridge first mentioned.

Fourth Ward.

To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. from the South-street-port eastward along the said street to the Meal-vennel; thence northward along that vennel to the High-street; thence eastward along that street to the Old Guard-vennel; thence northward along that vennel to Mill-street, and westward along that street to Methven-street; including likewise in this ward the rest of the royalty not included in any of the other three wards.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next being twenty-five-seven councillors shall be chosen in the first ward, and six councillors shall be chosen in each of the second, third, and fourth wards.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour shall be eight—two being chosen in each of the four wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive shall likewise be eight—two being chosen in each of the four wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall be nine—three councillors being chosen in the first ward, and two councillors in each of the second, third, and fourth wards.

And the members of the council of the said burgh shall, in all future terms of three years after November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, be elected in the same manner as is above appointed, for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both inclusive.

VI .- THE BURGH OF DUNFERMEINE.

That the royalty of this burgh shall be divided into four wards, limited and bounded as follows,----- Г

First Ward.

That part of the royalty included within a line drawn from the point where Bridge-street intersects the burgh boundary, along Bridge-street and Highstreet to the Cross; thence down Guildhall-street, St. Margaret-street, and Gibb-street to Priory-lane; thence along Priory-lane to Reid-street; thence down Reid-street to Nethertown broad-street; thence westward along the same till it meets the burgh boundary; then northward along the said boundary to the point first described.

Second Ward.

That part of the royalty included within a line drawn from the point where the Crossgate-road intersects the burgh boundary; thence to the south and along the said boundary till it comes round to the point where it is intersected by the Nethertownbroad-street; thence along the said street to Reidstreet; then up the same to Priory-lane; then along the same to Gibb-street; then up Gibb-street, St. Margarets-street, and Guildhall-street to the Cross; then along the High-street, East Port-street, and Crossgates-road, to the point first described.

Third Ward.

That part of the royalty included within a line drawn from the point where Grant's bank-road intersects the burgh boundary, eastward and along the said boundary to the point where it intersects the Crossgates-road; then along the said road, East Portstreet, and High-street to the Cross; then up Crosswynd to Queen Ann-street; then along Queen Annstreet to Schoolend-road; then up the same, Pilmuir-street, and Grant's-bank-road to the point first described.

Fourth Ward.

That part of the royalty included within a line drawn from the point where Bridge-street intersects the burgh boundary, along Bridge-street and Highstreet to the Cross; then up Cross-wynd to Queen Ann-street; then along the same to Schoolend-road; then up the same, Pilmuir-street, and Grant's-bankroad to the point where the latter intersects the burgh boundary; then west and along the same to the point first described.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next being twenty two six councillors shall be chosen in each of the first and second wards, and five councillors shall be chosen in each of the third and fourth wards.

That the number of such councillors to be chosen in November one thousand eight hundred and thirty four shall be seven—two councillors being chosen in each of the first, second, and third wards, and one councillor in the fourth ward.

That the number of councillors to be chosen in November one thousand eight hundred and thirty five shall likewise be seven—two councillors being chosen in each of the first, second, and third wards, and one councillor in the fourth ward.

That the number of councillors to be chosen in November one thousand eight hundred and thirty six, shall be eight -- two being chosen in each of the four wards.

And the members of the council of the said burgh shall in all future terms of three years after November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, be elected in the same manner as is above appointed for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both inclusive.

VII.-THE BURGH OF DUMFRIES.

First Ward.

From the north east end of the Caul below the Old-bridge up through Vennel-foot, and thence along Friars-vennel to the High-street, down the Highstreet, keeping the Mid-raw and Mid-steeple on the north east; then turning round the south end of the Old Coffee-house up Queensberry-street to Academystreet; thence along Academy-street, Townheadstreet, and the road to Nunholm, until the said road intersects the Poindfold-burn, which is on that side the boundary of the royalty; then following the line of the said Poindfold-burn till the same falls into the Nith; and thence down the Nith to the nort east end of the Caul.

Second Ward.

From the north east end of the Caul below the Old-bridge up through Vennel-foot, and thence along Friars-vennel down the High-street to Assemblystreet, from thence down Assembly-street to the Nith, and thence up the Nith to the north east end of the Caul aforesaid.

Third Ward.

From the point in ward first where the Nunholmroad intersects the Poindfold-burn, along the whole boundary line of ward first till the same reaches the south end of the Old Coffee house, from thence along the boundary line of ward second to the point where English-street joins the High-street, then along

English-street until the same reaches Queen-street, from thence along Queen-street to Shakespearestreet, from thence along Shakespeare-street to the port, from thence along the continuation of Englishstreet which forms the English-street branch of the road to Edinburgh, until the said road intersects the Poindfold-burn, and thence down the said burn to the point aforesaid where the same is intersected by the Nunholm road.

Fourth Ward.

From the point in ward third where the Englishstreet branch of the Edinburgh-road intersects the Poindfold-burn, along the whole boundary line of ward third till the same reaches the point where English-street joins the High-street; from thence along the boundary line of ward second till the same reaches the nith opposite to Assembly-street, from thence down the nith as far as the royalty extends, and from thence along the line of the royalty until the said line again reaches the foresaid point where the English-street branch of the Edinburgh-road intersects the Poindfold-burn.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next being twenty-five six councillors shall be chosen in each of the first, third, and fourth wards, and seven shall be chosen in the second ward.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour shall be eight—two being chosen in each of the four wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive shall likewise be eight—two being chosen in each of the four wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall be nine—two councillors being chosen in each of the first, third, and fourth wards, and three in the second ward.

And the members of the council of the said burgh shall in all future terms of three years after November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six be elected in the same manner as is above appointed for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both inclusive.

VIII.-THE BURGH OF INVERNESS.

That the royalty of this burgh shall be divided into three wards, limited and bounded as follows : -

First Ward.

Bounded on the west and south by the limits of the royalty from the north end of Huntly-street, on the west side of the River Ness (including the lands commonly called Fairfield, Planefield, and Clerk Fraser's Park), to the head of Castle-street, on the east side of the said river; thence by a line running along the centre of Castle-street, and continued along the centre of that part of the High-street opposite to the Exchange and Castle-wynd, along the centre of Church-street as far as Fraser-street, along the centre of Fraser-street, and continued in that last direction to the centre of the bed of the river: and lastly by a line running down the middle of the River Ness to a point where the said line is intersected by a straight line running from the north end of Huntly-street at right angles with that part of the said street lying to the north of Celt-street.

Second Ward.

Bounded by a line running along the centre of Castle-street, and in front of the Exchange and Castle-wynd, as already mentioned; thence by a line running along the centre of Church-street as far as Baron Taylor's lane; thence by a line running along the centre of Baron Taylor's-lane to the eastern extremity thereof; thence to the corner of junction of Inglis-street and the said lane; thence from the said corner of junction by a straight line drawn at right angles with the general direction of the west side of Academy-street to a point at the distance of two hundred and twenty-nine feet; from this last point in another straight line to the south eastern angle of Miss Baillie's property, on the north margin of the Fort George-road, and thence south eastward by the royalty boundary to the head of Castle-street (on which side that boundary includes the whole north side of Petty-street, the Fleshmarket, part of Stephen's-brae, the Cattle-market, and Barn-hill.)

Third Ward.

Bounded by the boundary of the royalty running from the north end of Huntly-street on the west side of the river, along Huntly-place and Veteran-row (comprehending that part of Merkinch, which is the property of Mr. Fraser, of Torbreck), thence by the lines already described as part of the boundaries of districts number one and number two, along the centre of the river, the centre of Fraser's-street, the centre of that part of Church-street from Fraser'sstreet to Baron Taylor's-lane, the centre of Baron Taylor's-lane, the line from thence to the corner of junction of Inglis-street with the said lane, the straight line from the said corner of junction at right angles with the general direction of the west side of Academy-street to a point at the distance of two hundred and twenty-nine feet; the straight line from the said point to the south eastern angle of Miss Baillie's property on the north margin of the Fort George-road, and lastly by the said road, being there the royalty boundary, to its intersection with the parliamentary boundary of the burgh, and thence by the said boundary to the sea.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next being twentyone-seven councillors shall be chosen in each of the three wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour, and in each succeeding year, shall be seventwo being chosen in each of the first and second wards, and three in the third ward.

GENERAL DECLARATION.

All the boundaries of the wards of the above cities and burghs shall be understood to run along the centres of the streets, roads, lanes, and closes by which they are described to be bounded, except where the contrary is particularly mentioned.

Any streets, grounds, houses, and places situated within the royalties of the cities and burghs before mentioned, and included in the foregoing descriptions and boundaries, but not making parts of the said royalties, are to be held as excluded; and any streets, grounds, houses, and places making parts of the said royalties, but lying detached and not embraced in the description of the several wards before mentioned, shall be held as belonging to the ward to which such streets, grounds, houses, and places are severally next adjacent, unless where otherwise specially provided.

REPORT

By the Commissioners appointed to divide into Wards, for the Election of Councillors, certain Burghs and Towns of Scotland which now return, or contribute to return, Members to Parliament, and are not Royal Burghs.

> To His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

IN pursuance of certain provisions in the Act of Parliament, 3° and 4° Gulielmi IV. cap. 77. intituled " An Act to provide for the appointment and " election of Magistrates and Councillors for the " several Burghs and Towns of Scotland which " now return, or contribute to return, Members to " Parliament, and are not Royal Burghs," the Commissioners named and appointed by His Majesty to inquire into and report upon the condition of the several burghs and towns of Scotland, by virtue of a commission, dated on the fifteenth day of July in the present year, have proceeded to divide into wards or districts the burghs or towns of Paisley, Greenock, Leith, and Kilmarnock, and to fix and ascertain the number of councillors to be chosen by each of such wards or districts, having regard to its being the purport and meaning of the Act, " that " the number of wards shall be such that each ward " shall, at the first election to be made under the " Act, choose, as nearly as may be, the number of " three councillors, and at the subsequent annual " elections in each succeeding year, the number of " one councillor;" and the Commissioners now beg leave to report the result as follows :---

I.—THE BURGH OR TOWN OF PAISLEY.

That this burgh or town shall be divided into five wards, limited and bounded as follows :---

First Ward.

All within a line drawn as follows, viz. from the Moss-toll on the Greenock road along the centre of the Greenock road, southward to a point opposite to the centre of the north road of the Race-course, leading westward from the Greenock road; thence along the centre of that road to the centre of the road that intersects the Race-course-road; thence southward along the centre of that intersecting road and the road in a line therewith, passing West March to the centre of the Greenhill-road; thence westward along that road to a point opposite to the centre of the north end of Lonewells-street; thence southward along the centre of that street to a point in the centre of Wellmeadow-street; thence west-

ward along the centre of that street to a point opposite to the centre of the north end of Castlestreet; thence southward along the centre of that street to the south end thereof; thence southward in a direct line to the north east corner of the Mansion-house of Castlehead; thence in a direct line southward to the point where the parliamentary line intersects the Espedair-burn near Haircraigs; thence along the parliamentary boundary westward, northward, and eastward, to the point first described.

Second Ward.

All within a line drawn from a point in Greenhillroad opposite to the centre of the north end of Lonewells-street, along the middle of the Greenhillroad, Underwood-street, and Saint James-street, to a point opposite the centre of the street called Stony-brac; thence by the centre of Stony-brae till it joins 'Oakshaw-street; thence along the centre of the road leading round the High Church-wall to the Churchhill; thence along the centre of Churchhill to New-street; thence along the centre of Newstreet to a point opposite the centre of Shuttlestreet; thence along the centre of that street to George's-place; thence along the centre of the street in George's-place, by the west and south of George'schurch, to a point in George's-street opposite the north end of Wardrop-street; thence along the centre of that street to Canal-street; thence along the centre of that street to a point opposite the centre of the road leading to. Canal-basin; thence along the centre of that road to the canal; thence along the centre of the canal westward to the east boundary of the first ward; thence northward along the said boundary to the point first described.

* Third Ward.

All within a line drawn from the point where the burn, called St. Mirrens burn, enters the River Cart, up the centre of the River Cart until it reaches the extremity of the parliamentary boundary of the burgh at or near the junction of the Hawkhead-lade with the River Cart ; thence along the parliamentary line until it reaches the intersection of the Espedairburn at or near Haircraigs; thence along the east boundary of ward first till it reaches the canal; thence along the centre of the canal till it reaches the street leading from Canal-street to the Canal-basin; thence along that street till it reaches Canal-street; thence eastward along Canal-street to the bottom of Wardrop-street; thence along Wardrop-street to a point in George-street, at the north end of Wardropstreet; thence by the south and west sides of George's-church to a point at the north end of the church, opposite the south end of Shuttle-street; thence along Shuttle-street to the centre of Newstreet; thence by the centre of New-street till it reaches the centre of Causeyside; and from thence down Causeyside until it reaches the said burn, called St. Mirrens-burn; and thence along the burn to the point first described.

- Fourth Ward.

All within the parliamentary boundary to the west of the centre of the River Cart, which is not included in any of the preceding wards.

Fifth Ward.

All within the parliamentary boundary of the burgh, situated on the east of the centre of the said. River Cart.

That the number of councillors to be chosen in each ward at the first election in November next. shall be three in each of the first, second, third, and. fifth wards, and four in the fourth ward.

That the number of such councillors to be elected. in November, one thousand eight hundred and, thirty-four shall be five—one being chosen in each, of the five wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in. November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive, shall likewise be five—one being chosen in. each of the five wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall be six—one councillor being chosen in each. of the first, second, third, and fifth wards, and two, in the fourth ward.

And the members of the council of the said burgh, or town shall in all future terms of three years after. November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix be elected in the same manner as is aboveappointed, for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to Novemberone thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both, inclusive.

II.-THE BURGH OR TOWN OF GREENOCK.

That this burgh or town shall be divided into five: wards, limited and bounded as follows:---

First Ward.

That part of the burgh comprehended within a line commencing at the point where Ladyburn joins the River Clyde, and running westward along the margin of the said river to the point where Cartsburn joins the Clyde; thence up the said burn till it is crossed by Rue-end-street; thence along the centre of the said street till the same joins Cathcartstreet; thence along the centre of the said street to the foot of Bank-street; thence along the centre of the said street to its southern extremity; thence in a straight line to the Parliamentary boundary at the Upper East Reservoir; and from thence eastward and northward along the Parliamentary boundary to the point first described.

Second Ward.

That part of the burgh comprehended within a line commencing at the point where Cartsburn joins the Clyde; thence up the said burn to the point where it is crossed by Rue-end-street; thence through the centre of Rue-end and Cathcart-streets to the centre of Cathcart-square; thence to the head of William-street; thence along the centre of said street to the Mid-quay; thence along the said Mid-quay to the Clyde; and thence south eastward along the margin of said river to the point first described.

Third Ward.

That part of the burgh comprehended within a line commencing at the north east extremity of the Mid-quay, and running along the said quay to the foot of William street; thence along the centre of the said street to the centre of Cathcart-square; thence along the said square to Hamilton-street; thence along the centre of Hamilton-street to Sugarhouse-lane; thence down the said lane to the point where Crawford-street crosses the West burn; thence along the margin of the said river to the extremity of the Mid-quay, being the point first described.

Fourth Ward.

That part of the burgh comprehended within a line commencing at the centre of Cathcart-square ; thence proceeding to Hamilton-street, and along said street to the point where it joins Sugar-house-lane ; thence southward along the centre of said lane ; thence along the centre of Sir Michael-street to Roxburgh-street ; thence along the centre of said street in a straight line to the West burn ; thence up the West burn to the parliamentary boundary ; thence along said boundary to the Upper East Reservoir : thence along the west boundary of ward first to the point first described.

Fifth Ward.

All the remaining parts of the burgh.

That the number of councillors to be chosen in bridge; then by Tolbooth-wynd to Riddell's-close, each ward at the first election in November next, and back of vaults to Giles'-street, and by Cables-

shall be three in each of the first, second, third, and fourth wards, and four in the fifth ward.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour shall be five—one being chosen in each of the five words.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive shall likewise be five—one being chosen in each of the five wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall be six—one councillor being chosen in each of the first, second, third, and fourth wards, and two in the fifth ward.

And the members of the council of the said burgh or town shall, in all future terms of three years after November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, be elected in the same manner as is above appointed for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both inclusive.

III .- THE BURCH OR TOWN OF LEITH.

That this burgh or town shall be divided into five wards, limited and bounded as follows :---

First Ward.

Bounded on the north east by the sea, on the south by the road in front of Seafield-baths and Claremont-park to the Restalrig-road, and to the road in front of James'-place, Charlotte-street, to Water-lane; and on the west by Water-lane to Bernard-street, by Bernard-street to the shore and the harbour to Leith-pier.

Second Ward.

Bounded on the north east by the sea, from the boundary of the burgh to Seafield-baths, by the road in front of Seafield-baths and Claremont-park to the Restalrig-road, and the road in front of James'place and Charlotte-street to the Kirkgate; on the north west by the Kirkgate and Leith-walk to Pilrig-street; and on the south by the boundary of the burgh by Lochend to the sea.

Third Ward.

Bounded on the east by Leith-walk, Kirkgete, and Water-lane and Bernard-street on to the harbour: on the west by harbour to Upper Drawbridge; then by Tolbooth-wynd to Riddell's-close, and back of vaults to Giles'-street, and by Cableswynd and Bonington-road to boundary of burgh; and by said boundary on south west.

Fourth Ward.

Bounded on the south east by Bonington-road, Cables-wynd, back of vaults, Riddell's-close, to Tolbooth-wynd to harbour at Upper Draw-bridge; then by harbour to Lower Draw-bridge; on the north by Commercial-street and back of docks to Great Junction-street; on the west by Great Junction-street and Queensferry-road to Newhaven-road; and on the south by the boundary of the burgh to lower end of Pilrig-street.

Fifth Ward.

Bounded on the south by the Queensferry-road to Great Junction-street; then along Junction-street to the back of the docks; then eastward to Lower Draw-bridge; on the east by the harbour; on the north by the sea; on the west by boundary line of burgh to Queensferry-road.

That the number of councillors to be chosen in each ward at the first election in November next, shall be four in the first ward, and three in each of the second, third, fourth, and fifth wards.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour shall be five—one being chosen in each ward.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive shall be five—one being chosen in each of the five wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall be six—two councillors being chosen in the first ward, and one in each of the second, third, fourth, and fifth wards.

And the members of the council of the said burgh or town shall, in all future terms of three years after November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, be elected in the same manner as is above appointed for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, both inclusive.

IV .--- THE BURGH OR TOWN OF KILMARNOCK.

That this burgh or town shall be divided into five wards, limited and bounded as follows :---

First Ward.

That part of the burgh included within a line drawn from the point where the road to Hillhead leaves the Kilmaurs-road, eastward along the parliamentary boundary to the point where it crosses Kilmarnock-water; thence along the parliamentary boundary to the Parish-road to West Dean; thence down the said Parish-road and Muirs-brae to the bridge over the Kilmarnock-water, near Craighead; thence down said water to the Greenbridge; thence along the centres of Green-street, New-street, and East and West George-streets, to the junction of the last street with Langlands-street; and thence along the centre of the Kilmaurs-road to the point first described.

Second Ward.

That part of the burgh included within a line drawn from the point where the road to Hitlhead leaves the Kilmaurs-road; thence southward along the parliamentary boundary to the junction of the water of Kilmarnock with the water of Irvine; thence up the Kilmarnock-water to the New-bridge; thence along the centres of King-street, Portlandstreet, and West George-street, to the junction of the last street with Langlands-street; and thence along the centre of the Kilmaurs-road to the point. first described.

Third Ward.

That part of the burgh included within a line drawn from the centre of Portland-street, at its junction with George-street, along the centres of East George-street, New-street, and Green-street, to the Greenbridge; thence down the water of Kilmarnock to the Flesh-market-bridge; thence along the centre of Market-lane to King-street; thence along the centres of King-street and Portland-street. to the point first described.

Fourth Ward.

That part of the burgh included within a line drawn from the Greenbridge up the water of Kilmarnock, to the bridge near Craighead ; thence along Muir's-brae and the Parish-road to West Dean to the parliamentary boundary ; thence southward along said boundary to the water of Irvine; thence down the said water to the road near Richardland-brewery; thence along said road leading past the Slaughterhouse to its junction with King-street and Titchfield-street; thence in a straight line across to the water of Kilmarnock, passing through the point of junction of King-street and Titchfield-street; thence up said water to the New-bridge ; thence along the centre of King-street till opposite to Market-lane; thence along the centre of the said lane to the Fleshmarket-bridge; and thence up the Kilmarnock water to the Greenbridge, the point first described.

Fifth Ward.

That part of the burgh included within a line drawn from the junction of Titchfield-street with King-street, along the road leading past the Slaughter-house to the water of Irvine; thence up said water to the point at which the parliamentary boundary intersects the water of Irvine; thence along said boundary, southward, westward, and northward, to the junction of the waters of Irvine and Kilmarnock; and thence up Kilmarnock-water to a point opposite the junction of Titchfield-street with King-street; and thence in a straight line, passing through the point of junction of King-street and Titchfield street, to the point first described.

That the number of councillors to be chosen in each ward at the first election in November next, shall be three in each of the first, third, fourth, and fifth wards, and four in the second ward.

That the number of such councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfour shall be five—one being chosen in each of the five wards.

That the number of counciliors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtyfive shall likewise be five—one being chosen in each of the five wards.

That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix shall be six—one councillor being chosen in each of the first, third, fourth, and fifth wards, and two in the second ward. And

That in all future terms of three years the members of the council shall be supplied in a similar rotation as is above appointed for the period from November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four to November one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix, both inclusive.

All the boundaries of the wards of the above burghs or towns shall be understood to run along the centres of the streets, roads, lanes, streams, and closes by which they are described to be bounded, except where the contrary is particularly provided.

Any streets, grounds, houses, and places situated within the boundaries of the aforesaid burghs or towns, and not included in the description of the several wards before mentioned, shall be held as belonging to the ward to which such streets, grounds, houses, and places are severally next adjacent, unless where otherwise specially provided.
