Parlonment $3^{\circ}$ and $4^{\circ}$ Gulielmi IV. cap. 76. intituled
" An Act to alter and amend the laws for the elec-
rr tion of the Magistrates and Councils of the Royal
"Burghs in Scotland," the Commissioners namet and appointed by His Majesty to inguire into and report upon the coedition of the several burghs and towns of Scotland, by virtue of a commission, dated on the fiftecnth day of July, in the present year, have proceeded to divice into wards the several burghs enumerated in schedule (C.) annesed to the foresaid Act, and to fix and ascertain the number of councillors to be chosen by each of such wards or districts, having regard to its being the putport and meaning of the Act," that the number of wards shall ": be such that each ward shall at the first election " to be made under the Act, chonse, as nearly as " may be, the number of six counciliors, and at the " subsequent annual elections in each succeeding "year, the number of two councillors;" and the Commissioners beg leave to report the result as follows:-

## I.-The City of Edinburgh

That the ancient and extended royalty of this city shall be divided into five wards, liniited and bounded as fellows :-

First Ward.
That part of the ancient royalty situate south of the High-street and Canongate from the Castlehillosplanade to St. John's-cross, bounded on the south, east and west by the bouidary line of the royalty rumning from St. John's-cross to the South-back of Canongate, the street of South-back of Canongate to the Cowgate-port, and thence by the line of the Old Town-wall, by the west end of the Grass-market to the Castlebill; also that part of the ancient royaliy lying north of the High-street from the Castlehillesplanade to Bank-strect, bounded on the east, north, and west by Bank-street, Mound-place, and the Princes-street-gardens:

## Second W'ard.

Those parts of the ancient and extended royally comprehended within the following limits, viz. from Bank-street along the High-street to the head of Leith-wynd, down Leith-wynd round by the back of the College-Kirkyard, and incluting the houses of Shakespeare-square and both sides of Waterlooplice, and thein along the boundary line of the royalty that intersects the Regisiei-house, West Register-strect, the Royal-bank, and Elder-sireet to the foot of the Catholic Chapel-lane, at Eroughtonstreet; thence along York-place, North and Sou'h St. David-streets, Princes-sireet, west side of the Earthen-mound, Mound-place, and Lank-street.

## Third Ward.

Those parts of the extended royalty comprehended within the following limits, viz. from a point at the east end of Yorl-place at the intersection of Brongh-ton-sireet, along York-place and Queen-street to Hanover-strect, down Dundas-street and Pitt-street, along East Fettes-row, Roval-crescent, Kirklane at Canonniills, the High-road from Canommills to Broughton, Broughton-street to the place where it is intersected by the line of the royalty; thence along
the line of the royalty intersecting Forth-street an Hart-streat, East Bronghton-place along Unionstreet; across Leith-walk, down Elm-row, along the northern boundary of the royalty intersecting Wiad-sor-street, and from the easiern extremity of that boundary round the Caltonhill, including the west end of Regent-terrace, Blenheim-place, Leopoldplace, Hillside-crescent, and part of Windsor-street ; and thence along Greenside and Broughton-streets to the east end of York-place.

## Fourth Ward.

Those parts of the extended royalty comprehended within the following limits, viz. from a point at the interscction of Fettes-row and Yitt-street along Pittstreet, Dundas-street, Queen-street, North St. Davidstrect, west side of St. Andrew-square, South Saint David-street, Princes-street, Frederick-street, Howestreet, St. Vincent-street, West Fettes-row; and the irregular boundary line of the royalty running from Feites-row to St. Vincent-street; also the ground formerly called the Distille:y -park, upon which Hen-derson-row, the Edinburgh Acadeny, and the Deaf and Dumb Institution are now built.

## Fifth Ward.

Those parts of the extended royalty comprehended within the following limis, viz. from a point at the iutersection of souih Frederick-street and Princesstreet, along Frederick-street, Howe-street, to near the foot of St. Vincent-sireet ; thence along the line of royalty intersecting the Circus-lane, India-street, India-place, Mackenzie-place, Moray-place, Saint Colme-street, Gleafinlas-street, and Charlotte-place to Queensfcry-street; and then along that street and Princes-street to the point first mentioned. This ward includes also the Princes-street-gardens, St. John's-chapel, and Cuninghau's-fen at Coates, upon which Walker-street, Manor-place, and parts of Coates-crescent, Willim-street, and Melvillestreet are built.

That the number of councillors to be chosen at the first election in November next being thirty-one; six councillors shall be chosen in each of the first, second, third, and fifth wards, and seven shall be chosen in the fourth ward.

That the number of such councillors to ke elected in November one thousand eight hundred eand ihitit-four shall be ten-two being chosen in earis of the five wards.
. That the number of councillors to be elected in November one thonsand eight hundred and teityfive shall likewise be ten-two being chosen in sacl. of the five wards:
That the number of councillors to be elected is November one thousand eight hundred and tiaty six sheil be eleven - two councillors being chosea each of the first, second, third, and fifth wads, asi three in the fourth ward.

And the members of the council of the $2 \times$ shall in all future terms of three years afier 1 .ovi. ber one thousand êight hundred and tivisy-sis, elected in the same wanner as is above afire for the period from November one thouse: $\because$ hundred and thirty-four to November ane .. eight hundred and thirty-six, both inctiasive.
