Venice, Aug. 30. By a Veffel lately arrived here from Raguse, we are informed, that that City is now in a very good Condition, the Ruines of the late Batthquake being in a great messure repaired by the Charlty of the Neighbouring Counerles, and the great fums of money advanced by the remaining Mobility of that place, which begins again to grow populous by the refert of ftrangers from all pasts.

The Mafter of this thip affirms, that fome bou s before he came from thence, there arrived a Tarran from the Levant, who informed him, That he left our Auxiliary Gallies with the greatest part of the Flegt in the Archipelago, in fearch af-

ter the Turkifh Fleet, which was deligned to carry men and moneyes to affift the Grand Vifier in his Siege, and hoped to get to Canca without fighting, which he believed they could not estily avoid, fince another Squadron of our Gallies and . ther thips of ftrength were riding about thole Coaft, with et ders to wait their motion, and if peffable to engage them.

He fayes farther, That the Chy of Candia defends it felf with great Coursge and Valour, of which the Turks ere ved ry ferfible, having loft great numbers of men before it, yet do they still continue to play upon it with their guns from their. Batteries, shooting also their M rear-pieces into the Towns though hi herto with very little or inconfiderable damage to

the Town.

He likewife tells us, That the Christian Corfayres have done confiderable fervice in Cruifing upon those Seas and in the Archipelago, by which means they have much enriched themfelves with many Prizes taken f.cm the Turks, feifing also on several Veffels laden with Provisions, intended for the supply of their Army, which is in great want of all forts of accef-

We have here a ftrong report that the great Veffel called the Marabotto, fome weeks fince fent hence for the Armate, and thence intended for Candia, was near Moden fet upon by fome thips from Barbary, but were fo luftily enterrained with feveral B.oadfides, that they were forced with great lofs of men, and much damage to their thips, to quit their Desgo, and give leave to the Marabotto to pursue her Voyage.

We have also News, not only by the way of Legorn, but by

feveral Letters from other parts, that our Armata had met with the Turkish Fleer, composed of a great number of Gallies, which after some few hours sharp dispute, they defeated, with great loss and confusion to the Turks, but the particulars not said: and that the Grand Vifier despatring of the long expected recruits of Men, Provisions and Ammunities with which thefe Gallies were to have supplyed him, had despaired of any present success against Candia, and retired with his Army to fome farther diftance, the confirmation of which welcome news we daily exped.

The Senate ftill continue careful for the Supplies both of Candia and the Armats, and are fitting up leveral Gallies, levying Souldiers and making Provinces of all forts to be speedily sent away, hoping in few weeks to oblige the Grand Vi-

fier to leave the Siege.

Hambourg, Sept. 3. The Affembly at Brunfwick have at the last concluded and feeled a firm Allience betwitt the Princes of the Lower Saxony; the D:puties from the Electors are in few daies to go from thence for Cologne, where another Affembly is to be held to confider of the Affairs of that pare of the Empire. The Princes Electors feem laclineable, and confequently their Deputies endeavour to prepare all things for an Accommodation, to prevent the great and huxtrdous confequences which feem to threaten the whole Empire; should

the War continue between the two Crowns.
