The Lord Chancellor has appointed Richard Williams, of Denbigh, in the county of Denbigh, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the fortyeighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act for making a navigable cut from the east side of the River Tees, near Stockton, into the said river near Portrach, in the county of Durham, and making various other improvements in the navigation of the said river between the town of Stockton and the sea," certain duties are made payable to the Tees Navigation Company, on ships or vessels of ten tons measurement and upwards:

And whereas by another Act, passed in the ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to enable the Tees Navigation Company to make a navigable cut from the east side of the River Tees, near Portrach, in the county of Durham, into the said river near Newport, in the township and parish of Acklam, in the north riding of the county of York," further powers are granted to the said Tees Navigation Company as therein set forth, and power is also given to His Majesty, in and by an Order in Council, or to the Lords of His Majesty's Treasury, or any three or more of them, from time to time, and at all times when and so often as he or they deem fit so to do, in and by his or their Order in writing, to reduce the duties by the said recited Act made payable on all or on such or so many of the foreign ships or vessels, and on all or on such or so many of the goods and merchandises imported or exported in foreign bottoms, as he or they in their judgment shall deem expedient, to the same and like duties as are by the said recited Act, or hereafter shall in pursuance of the powers therein contained, be made payable in respect of British ships or vessels, or the goods and merchandises imported or exported in or by them:

And whereas the public have been charged with the difference of dues payable on foreign and British ships in those cases where, under the provisions of Reciprocity Treaties, such charges are equalized, and it appears that there is no adequate necessity for continuing this charge on the public:

We, being three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in virtue of the powers vested in us by the above-recited Act, passed in the ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, do hereby reduce the duties made payable by the said recited Act of the fortyeighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, on foreign shipping in the port of Stockton belonging to those countries with whom Reciprocity Treaties have been concluded, or shall hereafter be concluded, to the same and the like duties as are by the said recited Act, or shall have been made payable in pursuance of the powers therein contained, on British ships or vessels in the port of Stockton.

And we do hereby further direct, that the said duties shall be reduced from and after the 1st day of January 1834.
