Dantzicke, March 5.

They write from *Cracow*, that the King of *Poland* had received Letters from the Polish Commissioners at the Conference at *Smolensko*, where- in among other things they give his Majesty an account, that they found a great disposition in the *Moscovites* to enter into a League with the Emperor and his Majesty against the *Turks*, but that this matter was to be treated at *Moscow*. That the King of *Poland* intended to part from *Cracow* about the end of this Month, and to go to *Leopol* or some other place towards the frontiers of *Podolia*, to view his Troops on that side, which it's not doubted will besiege *Caminiec* so soon as the Weather will suffer it. That the *Hospodar Dukas* who is a prisoner, had written to the King of *Poland*, desiring his Majesty to grant him his liberty, and assuring him that he will employ the rest of his life in his Service. The *Sieur du Cros*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark* to the King of *Poland*, continues still here.

Vienna, March 4. We have an account from *Presburgh*, that most of the Nobility of the *Lower Hungary* were come thither and had taken an Oath of Fidelity to the Emperor: And that the Count *de Zischi* had presented himself to the Imperial Commissioners, on the behalf of many of the Nobility of the *Upper Hungary*, who are desirous to lay hold on the Emperor's Pardon, but dare not repair to *Presburgh* or send any Deputies thither for fear of Count *Teckelej*, who has threaten'd those that do, with Fire and Sword. From *Cracow* they write, that the King of *Poland* makes great preparations for the approaching Campaign, which his Majesty will begin very early, and with the Siege of *Caminiec*. That the Deputies of Count *Teckelej* continued under a Guard, and that the King had declared that he would receive no more Letters or Messages from him, but would treat him as the worst of his Enemies, unless he did immediately quit the Engagements he had with the *Turks*, and embrace the Overture of Grace that was made him by the General Pardon which the Emperor had published in *Hungary*. There are Letters from *Hungary* which say, that the Grand Signior had caused 26 *Bassa's* to be strangled, who were the Creatures of the late *Visier*; and that He had declared He will command his Army in Person the next Campaign in *Hungary*. Our Governor the Count *de Staremberg*, is not yet returned hither from *Lintz*. After the several reports we have had of the Garrison of *Newbeufels* having received some relief, it is now said that they have not got any supply of Provisions but only a sum of Money, which the *Bassa* of *Buda* lent them, that they may buy of the Country People; but that the Imperialists have taken what care they can to hinder them from being supplied that way as well as any other.

Lintz, March 5. The Emperor, so soon as the weather is a little warmer, will remove from hence to *Crembs*, which is about 12 miles from *Vienna*.

The Count *de Walastain*, the Emperor's Ambassador to the King of *Poland*, is still here, but has orders to hasten his departure, that he may arrive at *Cracow* before the King leaves that place, which our last Letters from thence told us he intended to do presently after *Easter*. The Imperial Commissioners and the Ambassadors of *Poland* and *Venice* had their first Meeting on the second Instant, upon the Receipt of their Powers; They have had several Conferences since, at which the Cardinal *Bonvisi* assisted on the part of the Pop, and have agreed all the Articles of the League, which it's said is writing over fair in order to their Signing it. The Count *Serini*, General of the Elector of *Bavaria's* Troops parted from hence some days ago for *Municke*, and we are told that it has been very earnestly recommended to him by the Emperor's Ministers, to get the Forces of that Elector early into the Field. Our Letters from *Hungary* inform us; that a Party of *Turks* of *Agria* having passed the *Tibisque* near *Osoth*, with design to plunder and burn *Debrezen*, the Garrison of *Zasmar* having notice of it, marched out and falling upon them, killed a great many of them and put the rest to flight. That the *Turks* have not hitherto dared to attempt the relief of *Newbeufel*; but that they are now again drawing several Troops together near *Buda* and *Agia* and providing great quantities of Provisions resolving to hazard it. That the Counts *de Humany* and *Bargozzi* having got some Troops together, they had burnt several places belonging to Count *Teckelej* and the Princess *Ragotzi* his Wife, not far from *Menkatz* and *Beresar*.

Frankfort, March 7. Our Letters from *Lintz* give an account, that the Imperial Commission was opened at *Presbourg* the 18th of the last Month. That many of the *Hungarians* that had taken part with Count *Teckelej*, were some in, and had laid hold on the Emperor's Pardon, and that it was not doubted but many others would follow their example. That the Troops of *Lithuania* had taken *Barfeld* in *Upper Hungary*; and that they would attack *Caschaw* and *Elperics* so soon as the weather would give them leave. That a Party of *Turks* had passed the *Tibisque* intending to plunder *Debrezen*, but that the Poles and Imperialists had fallen upon them, killed several, and put the rest to flight; and that some days after they made an attempt upon *Zatmar*, but were repulsed and forced to retire with the loss of 60 men. We are told that the Elector of *Cologne* has offered to assist the Emperor with 12000 men against the *Turks*, in case a Peace or a Truce be established between the Empire and the Crown of *France*.

Hamburg, March 10. The Heer *Van Hairen*, Ambassador from the States General of the *United Provinces*, to the King of *Sweden*, is arrived here, and purposes in few days to continue his Journey. From *Berlin* they write, that the Castellan of *Posnen* was arrived there with a Train of above four-score Persons, being sent by the King of *Poland* to invite his Electoral Highness to come into the Alliance against the *Turks*; and to adjust matters with relation to the Lands which the Margrave of *Brandenburg*, the Elector's second Son, possesses in *Lithuania* in right of his Wife the Princess *Radzeville*; and that the Count *de Lamberg*, the Imperial Minister, and the Heer *d'Amersongen* the Dutch Envoy, were upon their departure for the Court of the Elector of *Saxony*. The Baron *Fuels*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark* to the States General

neral, passed some days since through this place in his journey for *Holland*; whither the Elector of *Brandenburg* is likewise sending the *Sieur Fuchs*. From *Copenhagen* they tell us, that the King of *Denmark* will take a journey towards *Holstein* the beginning of the next Month. That He will have an Army of 30 thousand men; and a Fleet of between 30 and 40 Men of War, besides the Squadron which it's said the Most Christian King will send to his assistance. The King of *Sweden* makes likewise preparations to have a good Army in the Field, and a Fleet at Sea, and it's said that he will send a Body of men over to *Germany*.

Brussels, March 14. On Sunday last arrived here an Express from the *Hague* with Letters for the Marquis *de Grana*, which we are told, gave him an account that the States General had resolved to send hither 8000 men more, and that orders were given for their march. These Troops will it's said be put into *Aeth, Mons, Charleroy,* and *Namur*. The 400 men which the States of *Brabant* have resolved to raise and maintain at their own charge, are to be put into *Leuwe* a small place on the Frontiers of *Liege*, but of much importance for the covering this Province from any Incurfions on that side. We expect every hour to hear of the *Viadore Carnero's* arrival at *Ostend*, who brings with him a very considerable sum of Money for the Service of these Countries. From *Lille* we are informed, that the Troops of the Kings Household are come to *Cambrai, Valenciennes, Doway,* and *Arras*; and that the *Marschal d'Humieres* had sent orders to the French Troops quartered in the neighbouring places, that they should put themselves into a readiness to march. They write from *Cologne* that *Monsieur de Choiseul* arrived there the 5th Instant with about 30 French Officers; that he had passed through *Coblenz*, where he was very kindly received and entertained by the Elector of *Trier*: That the Levies which are making for the Service of the Elector of *Cologne*, advance very successfully, and that his Electoral Highness has given out Commissions for five Regiments more. And that Princes Minister here does assure us, That his Master will have an Army of 20000 men before the end of this Month.

Brussels, March 17. Yesterday the Prince *de Vaudemont* marched from hence with 2000 Dutch Horse and Dragoons commanded under him by Lieutenant-General *Ginkje* towards the *Grand Chaussee*, upon the notice his Excellency had that *Monsieur de Montal* was moving with his Troops that way. We had an account last night from *Flanders* that the French have within these few days burnt the Castle of the Great Bayliff of *Gaunt*, and several Houses within the Castellanie of *Audenarde*. We hear from *Mabuse* that the Magazine of Hay which the French had there, hath by accident been burnt. From *Lille* and other places we are told of the Preparations the French are making for the opening the Campaign; That a great detachment of the Troops of the Kings Household was come to *Lille*: And that the *Marschal d'Humieres* had sent orders for the drawing 20 men out of every Company throughout all the French Garrisons within the new Conquests.

Brussels, March 17. We understand that the design of the Prince *de Vaudemont's* march was to put 400 Dutch Foot into *Charleroy*, and that He has done it and will be back here this night or tomorrow. Our Spanish Letters, which arrived this afternoon, inform us, that the *Viadore Carnero* embarked the 19th of the last Month at *Cadix*, and set sail the same day with two *Ostend* Men of War, and that He brings with him 500 thousand

Pieces of Eight. That the *Conde d'Aquilar*, General of the Spanish Armada, was called to *Madrid*, and that *Don Matheo de la Aya*, was sent to *Carthagena* to command the Fleet. And that the French had thrown a great many Bombs into *Fon-tarabie* having planted their Mortar Pieces on the point of the River *Bidassoa* towards *Andaya*, which had set Fire to several parts of the Town.

Hague, March 17. The States of Holland met again the 15th Instant; when the Debate concerning the opening and examining the Papers of *Amsterdam* was re-assumed, but they came to no resolution in it, most of the Deputies of the Towns declaring they had no orders from their Principals to consent to it. The City of *Amsterdam* sent their Secretaries to the Assembly once more to demand the restitution of their Papers and Security for their Deputies, and to Protest against what shall be done in the said Assembly in the absence of their Deputies. The *Heer Pelters* is returned from *Middleburgh*; but the *Heer Van Odje* continues still in *Zealand*. We are told that orders are given for 8000 men to march towards *Flanders*. And that the new Levies will be gone on with. They write from *Liatz* that the *Popes Nuncio*, the Imperial Commissioners, and the Polish and Venetian Ambassadors had Signed the League against the Turks.

London, March 11. We have an account that the *Viadore General of Flanders* is arrived at *Cows* in the *Isle of Wight* with two *Ostend* Men of War and two or three Vessels more, being bound for *Ostend*,
