Whitehall, March 19. His day was Publifhed the following Proclamation.

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R. Hereas the Safeguard and Protection We owe to luch of Our own subjects and to all others in League and Ami ty with Us, as pais and repair the Seas belonging to thele Our King-doms, hath been always a Principal part of Our Royal Care and Concern; And we finding that the Freedom and Security of Navigarbor

and Commerce to and from Our Ports in times of Hottility between Our Neighbour Princes hath been much diffurbed, nay the Reverence due to Our Ports, Harbours, and other Places under Our immediate Protection, hath been violated by the Piratical Practices, Depredations, and Infolencies of Private Men of War, and others pretending Committeen for the prefent Hoff lities; We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, after an exact view hift taken of the Roles, Ordinances, and Provisions made upon the like Occa-fions b. Our Royal Progenitors, and Our Self, to Revive Ethabli h, Ratific and Publich to all the World, these Rules and Ordinances following. Our Royal Will and Pleafure

therefore is ; I That within Our Ports, Havens, Roads and Creeks, as allo in every other Place or Tract at Sea, that may be rea-fonably confirtued to be within an / of those Denominations, Limits, or Precincts, there shall be an Inviolable Truce and Ceffation of all Holtilities between all Perfons and Parties Cention of all Hofflittes between all Perions and Parties whatfoever, and that no Force, Violence, Surprize or Offence fhall be done therein, either from Man of War to Man of War, or from Man of War to Merchant, of from Merchant to Merchant, that happen to be in Hofflitv the one againft the other; but that all, of what Nation of Party foever, fo long as they fhall be within Our Ports, Harbours, or other black reported to Keinchio Our mode immediate Beargerion Places reported to be within Our more immediate Protection, and where Our Commanders and Officers are accomptable and where Our Commanders and Omcers are accomptance for the Publick Peace; fhall be underflood to be under Our Special Safe-Conduct, and mult keep the Peace inviolably each with other. And We do further Declare, and hereby Denounce; That the Ships and Goods of all Aggreffors, Actors, and Offenders whatfoever against the true meaning of this Our Ordinance and Proclamation are and fhall be ipfo facto Confiscate, and proceeded against in Our High Court of Ad miralty, to Sentence and Condemnation, according to Law, notwithstanding any Commission of War, or Letters of Reprivals fuch Offenders may have, or prerend to have for their **Intification**

IP. We Will and Command, That all Our Officers and Sub-19. We will and Command, 1 hat an Our Oncers and Sup-leda by Sea and Land, do as much as in them lies. Prohibit the Roving and Hovering of Men of War fo near the Entry of any of Our Harbours, or Our Coalts, as that Merchan-then home word or outward bound, to or from any of Our Ports. Ihall apprehend their Paffage to be unfafe, or their danger of being Set upon and Surprized apparent, to the hindring and diverting of Trade and Commerce from Our Ports. And We do Itraitly Charge and Require Our faid OF ficers and Subjects to Refcue, Succour and Defend all Merchant-men, and others that final happen to be set upon or Surprized fo near Our Coatts, or the Botry of Our Harbours, as may be easily confirmed to be under Our more special Care and Protection, and that they Apprehend and Scize all Offen-ders in this kind, in order to bring them to Condign Punilli-ment, for Dillurbing and Hindring the Trade and Commerce between Our Subjects, and those of Our Neighbours and Allies

III. That where it happens that a Man of War of the one Party come into any of Our Ports where there shall be a Mercirdit-man (one or more) of the other Party, fuch Merchant Ship or Shins, if they defire it. fhall be fuffered to depart the Port two Tides before the Man of War, to the intent they may get themselves out of his reach and purfuit; And if it may get themicive out of his reach and purifit.
