repeal of the Legislative Union, that great bond of our national strength and safety; which excitement must in its continuance seriously impede the progressive improvement of Ireland, and in our opinion, if effected, ultimately lead to total separation of the two islands, impair the power, security, and glory of the empire, and plunge this country into irretrievable anarchy, misery, and ruin; and we entreat your Majesty to accept our warmest thanks and gratitude for the patriotic declaration of your determination to maintain this union inviolate.
