Warsaw, February 18.

OUR Letters from Cracow of the 12th Instant inform us, That the King intended to part from thence as yesterday for *Niemirów*, a place on the Frontiers of *Podolia*, to give the necessary Orders concerning the Siege of *Caminitz*, which his Majesty has resolved to undertake so soon as the Weather will permit it. That the new *Hospodars* of *Moldavia* and *Walachia*, were with the assistance of the Poles and the Cossacks established in their Governments, and that it was hoped the Transilvians would follow their Example and put themselves under the Protection of the Crown of Poland. That the Conferences at *Smolensko* were like to have a very happy conclusion. And that the Ambassador which the Emperor is sending to the Czars of *Moscow*, was expected there, having orders to see those Commissioners, and to open to them the Subject of his Embassy. That Count *Teckelej* had sent to acquaint the King of Poland that he had quitted the Siege of *Ungwar*; And to excuse the Hostilities which his Troops committed some time ago upon his Majesties Forces; but that the King had taken little notice thereof, declaring he did look upon the said Count as his Enemy, and had commanded his Troops to treat him as such.

Venice, March 4. By a Vessel arrived from *Zant* we have advice, that three Venetian Barques meeting with two Vessels belonging to the Pirates of *St. Maur*, they had taken one, in which was 40 Turks, and had forced the other ashore. From *Dalmatia* they write, that the Morlaques whose number encreases daily, continue their Incurfions into the Turkish Territories from whence they returned for the most part with a great deal of Booty. Great preparations are making here for the War against the Turks, and we are assured the Republick besides their Naval Forces, will have an Army in *Dalmatia*. Prince *Alexander d'Este* General of the Horse of this State, brings a Body of Cavalry into their Service. And the Prince of *Parma* General of their Foot, raises 3000 men. From *Rome* they tell us, that the great care of the Pope is, to raise Moneys for the assistance of the Emperor and the King of Poland, and that he hath lately sent a very considerable supply to the latter.

Dantzick, March 8. We have Letters from *Moscow*, which tell us, that there appeared a great disposition in the Ministers of that Court to enter into a League with the Emperor and

the King of Poland against the Turks, which the Swedish Envoy at *Moscow* did very much endeavour to confirm them in. From *Cracow* they write, that the King of Poland intended to part from thence towards the end of this Month, and to go to *Lebpoł* or some other place towards the Frontiers of *Podolia*, to settle several affairs, with relation to the Cossacks, as well as to view his Troops which are to be employed in the Siege of *Caminitz*.

Ratisbonne, March 8. The Dyet is taken up with the Difficulties arisen by the Count *de Windisgratz* pretending to the Quality of the Emperor's Principal Commissioner, and to the Title of Excellency, which it's said according to antient Custom cannot be given but to one that is a Prince of the Empire. The Count *de Crecy* has presented a Memorial to the Dyet, wherein he communicates to them the Propositions which his Most Christian Majesty has made for the Determining the differences between him and the King of Spain by a Peace or a Truce.

Vienna, March 10. Our Letters from *Presbourg* inform us, that several Towns of *Hungary* had sent their Deputies thither; and that the Count *Bukiani*, the Count *Drozkowitz*, and the Count *Bradedi*, who have quitted Count *Teckelej's* Interests, were likewise arrived there, and have taken a new Oath of Fidelity to the Emperor, and that it was not doubted but many others would follow their example. The Duke of *Lorraine* will return to *Lintz* about the 20th of this Month, where his Presence begins to be very necessary to prepare things for the next Campaign. From *Gran* they write that a Polander, who pretends to have been some time among the Turks, was arrived there, and reported, That the Turks do make their utmost Efforts to bring a very great Army into the Field, and that the Grand Signior at the persuasion of some of the Chief Bassa's, had declared he will command it in Person, which it was believed was only given out to content the Janisaries, who are very much dissatisfied.

Lintz, March 10. Count *Wallastaine* the Emperors Ambassador to the King of Poland, will part from hence in few days, that he may reach *Cracow* before the King of Poland leaves that place, which according to our last Letters from thence, his Majesty intended to do presently after *Easter*. Count *Serini*, General of the Elector of *Bavaria's* Troops, parted from hence the last week for *Municke*: We are assured that that Elector will have an Army of Twenty thousand Men in the Field this Summer, with which it's said will join the Troops of the Circles of *Bavaria* and *Franconia*. It is confirmed from *Hungary*

Hungary that the Counts *de Humani* and *Bargotzi*, have burnt several places belonging to Count *Teckley*, in revenge of the ill treatment which some of their Relations have received from him. The Imperial Court will remove from hence about the latter end of this Month, or the beginning of the next to *Crembs*, which is about twelve miles from *Vienna*.

Cologne, March 14. The Deputies of the Elector of *Trier* and the Duke of *Neuburg* continue still here, and threaten this City with the Bau of the Empire, in case they persist in their refusal to receive the Imperial Commission, but the Commonalty are obstinate. It is said that our Elector is going to draw his Troops together between *Nuss* and *Rhinberg*; and that the Fortifications of this last place are not only ordered to be repaired, but several new Works are to be added. We are told that an Army of 40 or 50 thousand Men will be formed on the *Rhine*, in pursuance of the Alliance concluded at *Soest* between the King of *Denmark*, the Elector of *Brandenburg*, the Elector of *Cologne*, &c.

Hamburg, March 10. The Count *de Berka*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Kings of *Denmark* and *Sweden*, has during his stay here, employed his Endeavors pursuant to the Commission he has from his Imperial Majesty to compose the Differences between the Magistrates and the Burghers of this City; but the latter have refused to yield to his Proposals. He has demanded of this City 100 thousand Crowns as a Contribution to the Emperor in the War he is now engaged in against the Turks, but has not yet received any answer upon it. The Heer *Van Hairen* the Dutch Ambassador is parted from hence on his journey for *Sweden*.

Plimouth, March 18. The Ships, which came into *Ham Oare*, with the late Easterly Winds, set Sail this day to the Eastward, among which was a Spanish Ship bound with Soldiers for *Ostend*.

Deal, March 20. The *Asia*, the *Eagle*, and the *Syam* are come into the *Downes* from the River, bound for the *East Indies*. There is likewise in the *Downes* the *Quaker Ketch* bound for *Virginia*. This day passed through the *Downes* 10 or 12 Light Colliers from the West Country, bound for *Newcastle*. The Wind is now at N. W. Yesterday passed by on the Back of the *Goodwin* the Spanish Ships, that came from *Comes* in the Isle of *Wight*, having been joynd by two Men of War, sent from *Ostend* to meet them. They passed in sight of three French Privateers, but without giving one the other any disturbance, and are without doubt ere this time arrived at *Ostend*.

Deal, March 21. Yesterday in the afternoon the Wind veered to the S. W. and about three a Clock this morning came about again to the N. W. when there arose a very great Storm, the extrem violence whereof lasted about an hour and half or two hours, during which time the Wind veered from the N. W. to the S. W. and above twenty Ships then in the *Downes* were forced to leave their Ankors and put to Sea. The Wind is

come to N. E. and the *East-India* Ships and some other Merchant Ships are under sail.

Deal, March 22. The three *East-India* Ships which we told you in our last were under sail, came again yesterday in the afternoon to an Anchor in the *Downes*. This day at noon two of them failed the second time, and the *Eagle* intends to follow them the next Tide. There are about 14 sail of Ships in the *Downes* outward-bound. The Wind at N. and by E.
