The People of Schleswig between the Rivers Spre and Drax, have it's said demanded the Emperor's Protection, and have declared that they will take Arms and act against the Turks either in conjunction with the Croats, or by themselves, if his Imperial Majesty will please to give them a General and the assistance of some of his Troops.

Linz, March 21. The Commission of Presbourg is ended, having had all the success that could be expected from the Republick and Towns of Hungary appearing to their enemies or by their Deputies; and those who could not be allowed to swear the same to receive their Oath of Fid. lieg to the Emperor, whiche the Count Gatzky, whom his Imperial Majestie has made General of the Troops of Hungary, was empowersd to take, and for that purpose he sent Generals to Upper Hungary, and to remain for sometime at the Castle of Zipschau in the County of Schemo. The Duke of Lorraine, as our Informants told us, intended to pass from Presbourg yesterday in his return to his, and so soon as he is there a great Council of War will be held to prepare things for the opening of the Campaigne. We are assured that this Emperor will have this Summer 60000 men in the Field, to sides the Hungarians and Croats, and the Forces which his Allies will send to his assistance, I ~

Cologne March 21. The States of this Arch-bishoprick are now assembled at Nuremberg, and are considering of the Supply which his Electoral Highness has demanded of them towards the defraying the extraordinary charges which the present juncture of affairs do oblige him to bear. The Count de Choiseul General of his Electoral Highness's Troops arrived from hence the 20th instant with the Bishop of Strasburgh for Vienna, from whence he intended to go to Rimblerg to view the place and to give the necessary orders for the putting it into a posture of defence. The Commonalty of his Electorate were resolved to submit to the Imperial Commissioners the Decree of Tyser and Neuburg, who were charged with it, and gone home again, leaving 100000 men Masters. The States of Flanders are now assembled at Duysseldorf, and report that the Duke of Flanders has demanded of them a contribution towards the War against the Turks. They write from Munich that the Count de Saxe has returned thither from Linz to halfe the payed rations for the Campaigne. We apprehend that these Brandenburgh Troops move towards the Alpine Army. ~

Prague March 22. Our Letters from Hungary bring us intelligence that the King of Hungary hath got together 100000 men and Hungary is a body of 10 or 120000 men. That he hath burnt 13 Villages in the County of Szaps. And that he was on his march to Belgrave again the Castle of Viznay belonging to the Count de Hunyay. The Letters add that the Troops of Szaps and those commanded by Prince Lubomirski have gone back to Poland in their Business. In Hungary lying upon 90000 to 100000 men. It is said rephred that the Tyrois have suffered a great loss in

Breslau March 22. Several Regiments, part of the 90000 troops from England marched yesterday through this Country and are quartered in the Villages belonging to this place and Lauenburg in the County of the Dutchy of Prussia, which consist of 100000 men. A Body of 20000 men, are to encamp near the Wetherby, as far as between Buxton and Fuggerby. And the Prince of Orange will shortly suddenly with his whole Court be there, which may be the leaders upon any occasion to joynt the Army. The French Troops commanded by the Marquis d'Aligre, have

been raising Contributions in the Province of Gueldres; The States of that Province could have made a Composition with the French for 200000 Florins, but the Marquis de Grane would not permit it, and the damage that Province has now sustained amounts to above double that sum. Last night arrived here the Viadore Carnero from Ostend, where he hath safely landed the Moncys and uncouney Silver, which he brought from Spain for the Service of these Countries.

Paris April 5. The French Troops that were before Audenarde are returned to their quarters. From Bayonne we have an account that the French have burnt greatest part of Flanders with their Bombs. The King has named the Sieur de Guigny to go in Quality of his Envoy to the Republick of Genoa, in the place of the Sieur de St. Olon, whom his Majestie has recalled. Our advices from Turkey say, that the affiis of the Turks are in so ill a posture, that all they can do this year will be to act defensively.
