SCHOOL OF PHYSIC IN IRELAND.

WHEREAS by the 40th Geo. 3, c. 84, commonly called the School of Physic Act, it is enacted, that it may be lawful for the President and Fellows of the King's and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland to direct, that any of the King's Professors shall continue to hold their Professorships for another term of seven years, after the expiration of the term for which they were elected, provided that the said President and Fellows do give three months notice, previous to the time at which the election to such Professorship would otherwise have been held, in the Dublin and London Gazettes, of such their direction; and whereas the King's Professorship of the Institute of Medicine, now held by Dr. Robert James Graves, will become vacant on the 2d day of October next, this is to give notice, that the President and Fellows of the said College of Physicians, have at a meeting of said College, held on the 19th day of May last, directed that the said Dr. Robert James Graves shall continue to hold said Professorship of the Institute of Medicine for the term of seven years, to commence from the 2d day of October next, pursuant to the powers vested in them by the said recited Act.
