THE following regulation must be observed by all persons (His Majesty's subjects), upon presentation to the King:

The person being presented is to kneel upon the right knee and kiss His Majesty's hand, then rise, bow and retire.

St. James's-Palace, June 25, 1834.

THE following Petition was this day presented to His Majesty at the Levee, and graciously received:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Petition of the British and other Inhabitants of the City of Calcutta,

Humbly sheweth,

THAT the trial of disputed matters of fact by means of a jury, which was formerly the peculiar feature of English jurisprudence, has been adopted into the codes of surrounding nations, and is he ginning to be regarded as the inseparable characteristic of liberal forms of government:

That jury trial has accompanied English law into all the colonies and settlements founded by English.

That its introduction into Bengal, in criminal matters, is coeval with the first establishment of a regular tribunal by charter, erecting the Mayor's Court of Calcutta in the Christian year 1726; and that as far as your petitioners can discover, the sole reason for its non-extension to civil cases also, was the want of a body of jurymen sufficiently numerous to ensure attendance and impartiality; the place of a jury in civil cases was, however, in some measure supplied in that Court by the number of its own

members and all practical men selected from the

European inhabitants at large:

That the subsequent erection of the Supreme Court of Fort William, by the charter of 1774, was expected by the British inhabitants to have brought with it the extension of jury trial to civil actions, but their hopes were destroyed by a solemn decision and declaration of the judges, in the year 1779, that, " except in criminal cases, they had no authority to

try by jury:"
That the British inhabitants of that period, surprised and mortified to find that, instead of acquiring the benefit of a jury, the trial of matters of fact had been transferred from a numerous tribunal of practical men to a limited bench of professional judges, presented petitions, first to the Supreme Court, and afterwards to His Majesty, expressing strongly their concern at such a departure from the maxims of English law, and their alarm at the establishment of a court who were at once judges and jury, judges of common law and judges of equity, and " invested with uncontrouled and indefinite powers, such as no men were to be trusted with:'

That the ill success of those petitions can only be attributed to the conviction of the continued want of a sufficient body of jurymen, and to the silence of the native population of that day upon the matter:

That these adverse circumstances have ceased to operate, and the time has arrived when jury trial in all cases not only is practicable but is ardently desired; that Europeans qualified to serve as jurymen have multiplied tenfold; that qualified Christian inhabitants of other than European birth are become still more numerous; and that the Asiatic population not only has learnt to appreciate trial by jury, but contains many individuals qualified in all respects to exercise the functions of jurymen:

That your Majesty must not suppose the principle of jury trial to be anywise alien to the habits or opinions of the people of Hindoostan who hall it as the renovation, under an improved form, of their 13th Light Dragoons, Captain Sir Alexander Thomas own cherished punchayet, the origin of which is lost Cockburn Campbell, Bart. from half-pay Unat-

in the shade of by-gone ages :

That neither can your Majesty'be surprised that men who are Britons born, or educated in the principles of Britons, should express invincible attachment under every change of climate and circumstance to of the best parts of national character may be referred, and should consider the deprivation of it, whether in civil or in criminal proceedings, as an infringement of their birth-right. But that attachment is made more sensible by personal observation and experience, without which it is difficult to form an adequate notion of the degree in which the wisdom, the strength, and the popularity of justice are impaired by resting on the same minds, and often upon a single mind, the whole onus, both of fact and law, and confounding that distribution of judicial functions which is truly ranked as one of the happiest of social arrangements:

That your petitioners look to the extension of jury trial as a measure calculated to foster increasing reverence for British maxims of administration, to enlarge the sphere of mutual intercourse by the participation of important civil duties, to soften down the discordences of character in this mixed population by a sense of mutual dependence, and to raise the standard of private morals by submitting the dealings of individuals to the test of public opinion:

Your petitioners, therefore, humbly pray, that matters of fact in issue before the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature, at Fort William, may be made triable by jury in civil as well as criminal actions, suits, and proceedings, under such rules and modifications as to your Majesty shall seem fit.

And your petitioners will ever pray.

HALF-PAY AND RETIRED. PAY, MIDSUMMER QUAR-TER, TO NAVAL OFFICERS AND OFFICERS OF THE ROYAL MARINES.

OTICE is hereby given, that on the receipt in the Wages Department at the Admiraltyoffice, Somerset-place, of the affidavit or certificate of identity required from each Officer by His Majesty's Orders in Council, a bill for the amount of the half-pay or retired-pay due will be made out in this Department, which will be payable by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, on the following days, viz.

On the 10th and 11th of July, to Masters, Surgeons, and Pursers, and their Attorneys.

On the 12th, 14th, and 15th of July, to Lieutenants at 5s. a day and under, and their Attorneys.

On the 16th and 17th of July, to Lieutenants at 7s. and 6s. a day, and Chaplains, and their Attorneys.

On the 19th, 21st, and 22d of July, to Admirals, Licutenant-Generals, Major-Generals, Colonels, Lieutcuant-Colonels, Majors, Captains, Commanders, and Retired Commanders, and their Attorneys.

Great inconvenience having been experienced by the claims of Officers, who have not chosen to receive their half-pay or retired-pay on the days fixed minions are entitled to the privileges of this Act.

for their rank, being preferred on the days appointed for the payment of half-pay and retiredpay to Officers of different ranks; notice is hereby given, that no such claims can in future be attended togon the days not appointed for Officers of those ranks; but for the accommodation of such Officers, and also for the convenience of those who may not have transmitted their affidavits or certificates sufficiently early to admit of payment on the above-mentioned days, a recall will take place on the 24th and 25th of July.

After which the half-pay and retired-pay will be payable on the first and third Wednesday in every month, excepting during the general payment.

Officers residing in or near London, and wishing to receive their half-pay or retired-pay in person, are requested to deliver their affidavits or certificates into the Wages-office at the Admiralty, Somerset-house, or transmit them to the Secretary of the Admiralty, immediately on the expiration of each quarter; and those employing agents are also requested to furnish their agents with their affidavits or certificates, as promptly, for unless such documents are early delivered into this Office, delay in the payment must unavoidably ensue.

It sometimes happens that Officers apply personally for their half-pay or retired-pay, without having previously sent in their affidavits or certificates as required by the usual advertisement; any delay or inconvenience to which they might be subject by this oversight, it is in the power of the Officers themselves to prevent, by an adherence to

the existing regulations.

Under the authority of the Statutes relating to the pay of the Navy, besides the above-mentioned modes, Officers may receive their half-pay or retired-pay in any of the following ways, viz.

Ist. By drawing a bill for the amount, on a form to be transmitted from this Office

2d. By a remittance bill, or permanent remittance bill, payable to them at or in the neighbourhood of their residence, by the Collector of Customs or Excise.

3d. By extract or permanent remittance bill, at a Dock-yard, where there is an establishment of Pay Clerks.

If they wish to receive it by bill of exchange, they are to give notice thereof, by letter, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked, in the corner, " Half pay, or Retired-pay, Accountant-General," and thereupon the proper form will be sent to them.

If they wish to have it remitted to them, they must give a like notice to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked in the same manuer, and a bill will thereupon be made out and transmitted to them

In all cases, the Officer signifying his desire of payment is to state at the foot of his letter, his Christian and surnames, his rank, and a full description of his residence.
