THIS day the Right Honourable Robert Cutlar Fergusson was, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, constituting and appointing William Viscount Melbourne; the Right Honourable John Charles Spencer (commonly called Viscount Althorp); Robert Vernon Smith, Esq.; the Honourable George Ponsonby; Robert Graham, Esq.; and Captain George Stevens Byng; to be Commissioners for executing the offices of Treasurer of the Exchequer of Great Britain and Lord High Treasurer of Ireland.

Whitehall, July 18, 1834.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, granting the dignity of a Baron of the said United Kingdom to the Right Honourable John William Ponsonby (commonly called Viscount Duncannon), and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, stile, and title of Baron Duncannon, of Bessborough, in the county of Kilkenny.

AT the Council-Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 7th day of July 1834,

By a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS by an Order of their Lordships, dated the seventeenth of April last, it was ordered and declared (in pursuance of the provisions of an Act of Parliament, passed in the third and fourth year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the abolition of slavery throughout the British colonies; for promoting the industry of the manumitted slaves; and for compensating the persons hitherto entitled to the services of such slaves;"), that all persons interested in or affected by certain General Rules annexed to the said Order, and framed, under the 47th and 55th clauses of the said Act, by the Commissioners appointed by His Majesty under the authority of the said Act, might, within six months from the date of the said Order, appeal against any such rules to His Majesty in Council:

And whereas the said Rules and Order were duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act of Parliament:

And whereas it is expedient that the time for receiving appeals against any of the Rules, so as aforesaid framed under the 47th clause of the said Act, should be enlarged, in so far as relates to the colonies of the Cape of Good Hope and Mauritius, to the period of nine months from the date of the said Order:

The Lords of the Committee (being three of the Lords of His Majesty's Privy Council) are therefore pleased (in exercise of the authority in them vested by the said Act) to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for receiving any such appeals as last aforesaid be, and the same is hereby, enlarged, in so far as relates to the colonies of the Cape of Good Hope and Mauritius, to the period of nine months from the date of the said Order of the seventeenth of April last.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS in the fourth year of the reign of His present Majesty an Act was passed, intituled "An Act for the appointment of convenient places for the holding of assizes in England and Wales," it was, among other things, declared and enacted that His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, should have power from time to time to order and direct at what place or places, in any county in England or Wales, the assizes and sessions under the commissions of gaol delivery, and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business shall be holden; now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the authority thereby vested in His Majesty in that behalf, His Majesty, with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order and direct, that from and after the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, the assizes and sessions under the commissions of gaol delivery, and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business, in and for the county of Glamorgan, shall be holden as follows, that is to say, in the Spring in every year at Swansea, in the said county, and in the Summer of every year at Cardiff, in the said county;

And the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS in the third year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, an Act was passed, intituled "An Act for further con-

tinuing, altering, and amending several Acts for the better regulation of lastage and ballastage in the River Thames; and for enabling the Corporation of Trinity-house of Deptford Strond to reduce, alter, modify, relinquish, or abolish dues payable to the said Corporation; and for other purposes connected therewith;" whereby, after reciting, among other things, that "under the authority and by virtue of the several Acts of Parliament therein recited, as well as of other Acts of Parliament, and of divers charters, grants, and letters patent of Kings and Queens of this realm, and also by prescriptive right, the Masters, Wardens, and Assistants for the time being of the Trinity-house of Deptford Strond aforesaid have collected, taken, levied, and received, from or in respect of ships and vessels requiring ballast, the several rates and prices specified in the said Act of the forty-fifth year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, and certain dues or duties, rates or tolls of various denominations from or in respect of all British ships and vessels, and from or in respect of all foreign ships, and vessels entering or departing from the ports, harbours, or roadsteads of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; and that the Masters, Wardens, and Assistants of the Trinity-house of Deptford Strond aforesaid have not by the terms of the said several Acts of Parliament, charters, grants, and letters patent, or any of them, any power to reduce, modify, alter, relinquish, or abolish any of the rates, prices, dues, duties, and tolls imposed or granted, collected, taken, levied, and received as aforesaid; and that it is expedient that the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants should be empowered (under the regulations thereafter contained) to reduce, alter, modify, relinquish, or abolish, and at any time or times thereafter to revive and re-establish any of the rates, prices, dues, duties, and tolls aforesaid, or any part or parts thereof, from time to time as to them the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants should seem meet, just, and reasonable;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that the Master, Wardens, and Assistants for the time being of the Corporation of Trinity-house of Deptford Strond aforesaid shall be, and they are thereby, authorised and empowered from time to time, and at any time or times thereafter, upon the requisition or with the consent of His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in His or Their Most Honourable Privy

Council, to reduce, relinquish, abolish, alter, or modify all or any or either of the rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls imposed or granted by the said several grants, charters, or Acts of Parliament, or any of them, or collected, taken, levied, and received under the authority thereof respectively, or by ancient usage, custom, or prescription, or any part or parts thereof, so far as may be consistent with the charitable and other uses, purposes, and intents for which the said Corporation has been established and maintained; and that it shall also be lawful for the Master, Wardens, and Assistants for the time being of the said Corporation of Trinity-house of Deptford Strond, at any time or times after the passing thereof, to revive and re-establish any rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls which may have been relinquished or abolished, or to increase, or otherwise alter or modify, any rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls which may have been reduced, altered, or modified under the authority of the said Act, and so from time to time to relinquish or abolish, and revive or re-establish, and reduce or increase, alter or modify, all or any of such rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls as occasion may require, so as, nevertheless, that no such rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls shall at any time be increased beyond the amount which might be collected, taken, levied, or received by the said Corporation in respect thereof before the passing of the said Act; and it is thereby provided, that no such relinquishment, abolition, reduction, alteration, or modification, or subsequent revival re establishment, increase, alteration, or modification, of any such rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls, or any or either of them, or any part or parts thereof, shall at any time be deemed valid or take effect until the same shall have been submitted by the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants to, and shall have been assented to and confirmed by, His Majesty; His heirs; or successors, in His or Their Most Honourable Privy Council, and such assent and confirmation shall have been signified in writing unto the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants; and that it shall be lawful for the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants to fix and determine the period (so that the same do not exceed three calendar months, from the receipt by them of such assent or confirmation as aforesaid), from and after which, all and every the rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls so relinquished or abolished, shall be discontinued and no longer collected, taken, levied, or received, or from and after which, all and every the rates, prices, dues, duties,

or tolls so received or re-established, reduced, increased, altered, or modified respectively as aforesaid, shall and may be collected, received, levied, or taken:

And whereas the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants have submitted to His Majesty in His Most Honourable Privy Council, that the rates of duty now payable for the buoys in the River Exe, be reduced as follows, that is to say:

British vessels and Foreign vessels privileged, in respect of charges	One penny per ton per voyage.	One halfpenny per ton per voyage.
Foreign vessels not privileged	Two pence.	One penny.
Stone boats	Five shillings each per annum, as at present.	

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the authority thereby vested in His Majesty in Council in that behalf, His Majesty, with the advice of His Privy Council, doth assent to and confirm the said-proposed reduction, and it is hereby ordered that such assent and confirmation be signified in writing unto the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants, by the Clerk of His Majesty's Council in waiting, to the intent that in further pursuance of the said Act, the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants, do fix and determine the period not exceeding three calendar months, from the receipt by them of such assent or confirmation, from and after which the rates and duties so reduced, may be collected, received, levied, and taken.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

CEREMONIAL of the Investiture of Rear-Admiral Sir William Parker with the Ensigns of a Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

By command of the Sovereign, Rear-Admiral Sir William Parker was conducted, with the usual reverences, to His Majesty, preceded by Sir William Woods (the Officer of Arms attendant upon the Knights Commanders) bearing upon a crimson velvet cushion the star, ribband, and badge of the second class of the Order.

The sword of state being thereupon delivered to His Majesty, the Rear-Admiral, kneeling, was knighted therewith; after which he had the honour to kiss His Majesty's hand.

Then the Officer of Arms, on his knee, presenting to the Sovereign the ribband and badge of a Knight Commander, the King was pleased to invest Sir William Parker with the same.

The Rear-Admiral having again had the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and having received from His Majesty the star of a Knight Commander, retired.

HALF-PAY AND RETIRED-PAY, MIDSUMMER QUARTER, TO NAVAL OFFICERS AND OFFICERS OF THE ROYAL MARINES.

NOTICE is hereby given, that on the receipt in the Wages Department at the Admiralty-office, Somerset-place, of the affidavit or certificate of identity required from each Officer by His Majesty's Orders in Council, a bill for the amount of the half-pay or retired-pay due will be made out in this Department, which will be payable by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, on the following days, viz.

On the 10th and 11th of July, to Masters, Surgeons, and Purser, and their Attorneys.

On the 12th, 14th, and 15th of July, to Lieutenants at 5s. a day and under, and their Attorneys.

On the 16th and 17th of July, to Lieutenants at 7s. and 6s. a day, and Chaplains, and their Attorneys.

On the 19th, 21st, and 22d of July, to Admirals, Lieutenant-Generals, Major-Generals, Colonels, Lieutenant-Colonels, Majors, Captains, Commanders, and Retired Commanders, and their Attorneys.

Great inconvenience having been experienced by the claims of Officers, who have not chosen to receive their half-pay or retired-pay on the days fixed for their rank, being preferred on the days appointed for the payment of half-pay and retired-pay to Officers of different ranks; notice is hereby given, that no such claims can in future be attended to on the days not appointed for Officers of those ranks; but for the accommodation of such Officers, and also for the convenience of those who may not have transmitted their affidavits or certificates sufficiently early to admit of payment on the above-mentioned days, a recall will take place on the 24th and 25th of July.

After which the half-pay and retired-pay will be payable on the first and third Wednesday in every month, excepting during the general payment.

Officers residing in or near London, and wishing to receive their half-pay or retired-pay in person, are requested to deliver their affidavits or certificates into the Wages-office at the Admiralty, Somerset-house, or transmit them to the Secretary of the Admiralty, immediately on the expiration of each quarter; and those employing agents are also requested to furnish their agents with their affidavits or certificates, as promptly, for unless such documents are early delivered into this Office, delay in the payment must unavoidably ensue.

It sometimes happens that Officers apply personally for their half-pay or retired-pay, without

having previously sent in their affidavits or certificates as required by the usual advertisement; any delay or inconvenience to which they might be subject by this oversight, it is in the power of the Officers themselves to prevent, by an adherence to the existing regulations.

Under the authority of the Statutes relating to the pay of the Navy, besides the above-mentioned modes, Officers may receive their half-pay or retired-pay in any of the following ways, viz.

- 1st. By drawing a bill for the amount, on a form to be transmitted from this Office
- 2d. By a remittance bill, or permanent remittance bill, payable to them at or in the neighbourhood of their residence, by the Collector of Customs or Excise.
- 3d. By extract or permanent remittance bill, at a Dock-yard, where there is an establishment of Pay Clerks.

If they wish to receive it by bill of exchange, they are to give notice thereof, by letter, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked, in the corner, "Half pay, or Retired-pay, Accountant-General," and thereupon the proper form will be sent to them.

If they wish to have it remitted to them, they must give a like notice to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked in the same manner, and a bill will thereupon be made out and transmitted to them.

In all cases, the Officer signifying his desire of payment is to state at the foot of his letter, his Christian and surnames, his rank, and a full description of his residence.

MEM.—Bills of exchange drawn under or by virtue of the Act of 11 Geo. 4, cap. 20, are not liable to the stamp duty.

No persons residing out of His Majesty's dominions are entitled to the privileges of this Act.
