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Genoa, March 28.

THE 22. Instant arrived here the Alexander Merchant from Leghorn; The 26th the Constant Warwick from Thoulon; Yesterday the George Ketch from Marfelles; And this Morning the Rainbow from O Porti; The Dutch Convoy is departed for the Levant.

Milan, March 22. The Marquis de Mailbraye, Son of the Duke de Mazarine, who was passing from Genoa to Rome, has by order of our Governor been stop't with several Gentlemen that accompanied him at Tortona, which is done by way of Reprizal for the Marquis d'Alcanitas, Brother to the Count de Melgar, who was lately made Prisoner at Bayonne as he was going for Spain. Our Governour has given out Commissions for the making several new Levies.

Rome, March 16. The Pope has not yet perfectly recovered his health, which is the reason he does not give Audience to the Foreign Ministers. The Duke d'Estree, Ambassador of France, had some days since an Audience of Cardinal Cibo, to whom he delivered the Letters which his Most Christian Majesty and the Duke of Orleans have written to the Pope, to desire a Dispensation for the Marriage between the Duke of Savoy and Mademoiselle, which his Holiness hath granted, and ordered to be put into the hands of the Duke of Savoy's Minister at this Court. The Senator Lunio, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, had yesterday an Audience of Cardinal Cibo, with whom he was several hours. The 4th Instant the Pope sent 100 thousand Crowns to the Emperor, and a like sum to the King of Poland to be employed in the Preparations for the Campagne. The Pope has made choice of Don Hippolito Capurione to command his Gallies this Summer.

Venice, March 29. On Sunday last the Great Council made choice of the Procurator Morosini to be General of the Forces of this State, a man Eminent for the great Services he hath on former occasions render'd the Republick, and particularly during the War of Candia. He was the same day to return his thanks to the Doge and the Senate for the Honor they had conferr'd upon him, and has since received the Compliments of all the Persons of Quality here. The preparations for the War are in the mean time carried on with all imaginable vigor and application: Many of the Nobility have offer'd to serve as Volantiers, and of this number is the Procurator Costarini; Several Commissions have been given out this week for new Levies; and we are told that Prince Cesar d'Este has undertaken to raise 3000 Foot and 1000 Horse. And that the Count de Buquoy has a Commission to raise 2000 Germans. The Turkish Merchants that are here have leave to retire with their Effects out of the Territories of the Republick; And from Dalmatia we have an account, that the Proveditor General hath not only permitted the Turks that were there to leave the Country, but has likewise furnished them the means of withdrawing their Goods. From the Levant we have an account, that the new Grand Visier hath sent

Messengers into all the Provinces of the Ottoman Empire to signify to the several Bassas and Governours the Grand Signior's orders for the raising all the men they possibly can for the War in Hungary, where the Grand Signior intends to employ the main of his Forces, while he acts only defensively against the other Enemies he is like to have upon him this Summer. We are told that the Turks have made Overtures to the Moslaques to induce them to lay down their Arms, but in vain, those people persisting in their Resolution entirely to throw off the Turkish Yoke; and we have advice that they have now lately fallen upon several Turkish Merchants who were retiring with their Goods from Spalatro to Venetia, and that they made a Booty of 200000 Crowns.

Vienna, March 30. A great quantity of Powder, Bullets, Bombs, Grenadoes, &c. have within these few days been sent from hence by Water for Hungary: From whence we have an account, that the Baron Merry and Colonel Heuser, who had been abroad with some Imperial Troops, to observe the Rebels, were come back to Neusatz. That the Hussars of Ulm had fallen upon a Party of the Garrison of Neusatz, had kill'd several, and taken 25 Prisoners, which they brought to Neusatz. And that Count Tockley, not having succeeded in his design upon Ladislaw, was march'd towards Galbach.

Lindau, April 10. General Caprara is gone for Hungary to command the Imperial Troops, which at his late orders are drawn together upon at least this Body of them as he shall think necessary, and to march against Count Tockley, who continues to ravage the Countie, and to treat very barbarously such of the Gentry as will not joyn with him. Two days since arrived here an Express from Silesia, being sent to give the Emperor an account, that the Troops of Prince Lubomitski, who lately left their Quarters in Hungary, so that as they saw they were no longer able to subsist in them, were come into the Dutchy of Raibor, pretending to take their Quarters there. Our Letters from Poland tell us, that great preparations are making there for the War, and that the King will certainly begin the Campagne with the Siege of Caminice.

Ratisbonne, March 29. The 17th Instant the Bishop of Aichstadt, the Emperors's Principal Counsellor at the Dyet, returned hither after an absence of several Months; And having given notice thereof to the several Colledges, he was on the 21. Instant Complemented thereupon by a solemn Deputation in the name of the Dyet. The same day the Electoral Colledge took into consideration the Proposals which his Most Christian Majesty lately made by the Count de Grey his Minister here, concerning a Truce for 20 years; and concluded that the said Truce ought to be forthwith accepted by the Empire. But the Colledge of Princes have not yet deliberated upon these Proposals, and it's believ'd they will not till after the Easter Holydays, which last here three weeks for that the Protestants and Roman Catholicks do keep upon different days.
