The Bishop of Strabourg is retired for some days to Zons.

Hamburg, April 7. We told you in our last that the Danish Troops had taken Quarters in Lamenburg and Mecklenburg: and since we hear they have done the like in the Country of the Duke of Riona. It's said that the Lunenburg. Troops have orders to be ready to march on the 11th Instant. There are Letters from Riga which tell us, That the Polish and Moscovite Commissioners not being able to adjust the Pretentions which these Crowns have each upon the other, they had at last agreed to renew the Truce for nine years, during which time things are to remain in the state they now are inc

Hague, April 11. The States of Holland Sepatated the 8th instant, and are to meet again to morrow, when it's believed the Deputies will bring in the Advices of their Principals concerning the pruviding a Fond for the defraying their Quota of the extraordinary charges of the State. There hath been nothing farther done concerning the Papers of Amsterdam, which remain Sealed up, but we are told that it was proposed the last week by the Deputies of Haerkm, that the Seal might be taken off and the Papers reflored to the Magistrates of Am-. The Deputies which the States General fent to the States of Friezeland to perswade them to consent to the new Levy, are come back, and have made Report to the States General, that arriving at Leuwaerden, the States of that Province, who had separated themselves some days before, reaffembled purposely to receive them, and that having heard what the faid Deputies were directed to represent to them, they had declared, that they could not confent to the faid Levy, for the reasons which they had already communicated to the States We connot yet fay with any certainty General. what will be done in this matter of the news Levy, the opposition of Friezeland and Groningen having hitherto kept the States General from coming to a resolution therein, though it's thought they will at Tall proceed in it by plurality of Voices, and that in such case the Levy will be made according to the Quota's of those that have consented to it, and so it will not come to above 8 or 9000 men. Waldecke parted from hence the 7th Instant for Flanders, from whence, after having conferred with the Marquis de Grana, he will continue his journey for Germany. The 8th Instant two Batallions of the Princes Foot-Guards marched from hence for Brabant; whither his Highness will follow very suddenly himself. We have advice that a Body of French Troops are marching under the command of the Marquis de Ranti through Limburg to joyn as is believed, the Forces of the Elector of Cologne commanded by Monlieur de Choifeulr

Raris, April 8. Preparations are making for the Kings Journey for Flanders, which it's faid his Majeffy will begin the 22, of this Month. The Musketcers have orders to be in a readine is to match on the 20th. Here is a report that the Marcichal de Belfonds hath passed the Pyrenees, and that advancing towards Pampeluna, he hath caused a great disorder in those Parts, but it needs 4 confirmation.
