The following Address to the King has been presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of the City of Edinburgh, humbly beg leave, at the present crisis, to renew the expression of our devoted attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government. While we sympathise with the difficult

situation in which your Majesty is placed by the unexpected retirement of Earl Grey and Lord Althorp from the distinguished places they held in your Majesty's Administration; and while we recollect with gratitude the eminent service which your Majesty has performed to the cause of liberality and good government by calling to your Majesty's Council these eminent noblemen by whom the Reform Bill was brought forward and carried, we, at the same time, with all dutiful respect and humility, beg leave to express our confident hope that your Majesty, with that paternal solicitude for the welfare of your people which has distinguished your Majesty above the most illustrious of your predecessors, will call to your councils men whose known and tried liberality and patriotism will ensure to the country the full benefits expected both by your Majesty and your people from the great measure of parliamentary reform.

Westminster, August 13, 1834.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read,* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said

Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for raising the sum of fourteen millions three hundred and eighty-four thousand seven hundred pounds, by Exchequer Bills, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four.

An Act to continue, for five years, from the fifth day of April one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and to amend the Acts for authorising a composition for assessed taxes.

An Act to regulate the conveyance of printed newspapers by post, between the United Kingdom, the British colonies, and foreign parts.

An Act to repeal the stamp duties on almanacks and directories, and to give other relief with relation to the stamp duties in Great Britain and Ireland respectively.

An Act to amend the laws relating to the collection and management of the Revenue of Excise.

An Act to amend an Act, of the present session, for altering and consolidating the laws for regulating the pensions and allowances to persons in respect of their having held civil offices in His Majesty's service.

An Act for abolishing capital punishment in case of returning from transportation.

An Act to suspend, until the end of the next session of Parliament, the making of lists and the ballots and enrolments for the militia of the United Kingdom.

An Act to defray the charge of the pay, clothing, and contingent and other expences of the disembodied militia in Great Britain and Ireland, and to grant allowances in certain cases to Subaltern Officers, Adjutants, Paymasters, Quartermasters, Surgeons, Assistant-Surgeons, Surgeons' Mates, and Serjeant Majors of the Militia, until the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five.

An Act to repeal certain provisions of two Acts of His Majesty King George the Third, affecting the printers, publisher, and proprietors of newspapers in Ireland.

An Act to continue for one year, and from thence to the end of the then next session of Parliament, several Acts, relating to the importation and keeping of arms and gunpowder in Ireland.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of King George the Third, for establishing fever hospitals, and to make other regulations for relief of the suffering poor, and for preventing the increase of infectious fevers in Ireland.

An Act to amend three Acts, made respectively in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, and in the first and second years, and in the second and third years of the reign of His present Majesty, for the uniform valuation of lands and tenements in the several baronies, parishes, and other divisions of counties in Ireland, and to provide for the more effectual levy of grand jury cess.

An Act to regulate the salaries of the Officers of the House of Commons, and to abolish the sinecure offices of Principal Committee Clerks and Clerks of Engrossments.

An Act to amend the laws relating to the land and assessed taxes, and to consolidate the boards of Camps and taxes.

An Act to regulate the expenditure of county rates and funds in aid thereof.

An Act for preventing the interference of the spring assizes with the April quarter sessions.

An Act to authorise persons duly appointed to act as justices of the peace in the islands of Scilly, although not qualified according to law.

An Act to continue for one year, and from thence to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the Acts for the relief of insolvent debtors in Ireland.

An Act to amend an Act of the twentieth year of His Majesty King George the Second, for the relief and support of sick, maimed, and disabled seamen, and the widows and children of such as shall be killed, slain, or drowned in the merchant service, and for other purposes.

An Act to amend and render more effectual two Acts of the fifth and sixth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, relating to weights and measures.

An Act to authorise an advance, out of the general fund of moneys belonging to the suitor of the Courts of Chancery and Exchequer in Ireland, towards the purchasing of ground, and building thereon offices necessary to the Courts of Justice in Dublin.

An Act for the more effectually providing for the erection of certain bridges in Ireland.

An Act for the more effectual administration of justice at Norfolk Island.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the forty-ninth year of the reign of King George the Third, for amending the Irish road Acts.

An Act for improving the practice and proceedings in the Court of Common Pleas of the county palatine of Lancaster.

An Act to extend the term of an Act of the first and second years of His present Majesty, for ascertaining the boundaries of the forest of Dean, and for inquiring into the rights and privileges claimed by free miners of the hundred of Saint Briavels, to the twenty-first day of January one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and from thence to the end of the then next session of Parliament.

An Act for empowering the Commissioners of His Majesty's Woods, Forests, Land Revenues, Works, and Buildings, to pay the net proceeds of the tolls of the Menai and Conway bridges into the receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer at Westminster to the account of the Consolidated Fund.

An Act for placing the Mumbles-head Light-house, in the county of Glamorgan, under the management of the Corporation of the Trinity-house of Deptford Strond.

An Act to enable the Commissioners of Sewers for the city and liberty of Westminster, and part of the county of Middlesex, to make a new sewer at Bayswater, in the county of Middlesex.

An Act for better paving, cleansing, lighting, and improving the waterside division of the parish of Saint Mary Magdalen, Bermondsey, in the county of Surrey.

An Act for incorporating certain persons for the carriage of goods and commodities by means of a railway from the city of Durham to Sunderland near the Sea, with a branch to join the Hartlepool railway, in the township of Haswell, all in the county of Durham.

And three private Acts.

At the Court at St. James's, August 13, 1834.

A CHAPTER of the Most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned for this day, the following Knights Companions, in their mantles and collars, assembled in the Entrée-room, viz.: their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Sussex and Gloucester, the Earl of Westmorland, the Duke of Beaufort, the Duke of Wellington, the Duke of Richmond, and Earl Grey, attended by the under-named Officers of the Order, in their mantles, chains, and badges, viz. the Honourable and Reverend the Dean of Windsor, Register of the Order; Sir Ralph Bigland, Knt. Garter Principal King of Arms; and Sir Augustus-William-James Clifford, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

At two o'clock, the Knights Companions were called over by Garter, and, with the Register of the Order, proceeded into the presence of the Sovereign, in the Throne-room; Garter and Black Rod going no further than the door, not having been sworn.

The Sovereign being seated in the chair of state, the Knights Companions took their respective seats at the table according to the order of their stalls, and the Register stood at the bottom of the table.

The Register then acquainted the Sovereign that Sir Ralph Bigland, Knt. Garter Principal King of Arms, attended at the door, and humbly prayed to be admitted to take the oath of office, as Chief Officer of Arms of this Most Noble Order; and Garter in his mantle, and wearing the chain and badge of his office (with which he had been invested by His Majesty on the 7th day of December 1831), being by His Majesty's command introduced by the Register, and kneeling near the Sovereign, the oath was administered to him by the Register, acting for the Chancellor of the Order. Garter rising made his obeisance to the Sovereign, and having had the honour to kiss His Majesty's hand, withdrew to his place at the bottom of the table.

Garter then acquainted the Sovereign that Sir Augustus-William-James Clifford, Knt. Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, attended at the door, and humbly prayed to be admitted to take the oath of office; and Black Rod in his mantle, chain, and badge being, by His Majesty's command, introduced by Garter, and kneeling near the Sovereign, the oath was administered to him by the Register, after which he had the honour to kiss His Majesty's hand, and retired to his place at the bottom of the table.

Then by His Majesty's command, Sir William Woods, Knt. Clarenceux King of Arms, was introduced by Garter and Black Rod, and kneeling near the Sovereign, the Register administered to him the oath of office as Deputy to Garter Principal King of Arms, after which he had the honour to kiss His Majesty's hand and retired.

The Register then signified to the Chapter, the Sovereign's royal will and pleasure, that the vacant stall in the Royal Chapel of St. George at Windsor, be filled; and as by the Statutes none but a Knight, can be elected, his Grace Bernard-Edward Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshal and Hereditary Marshal of England, was introduced, and knighted by His Majesty with the sword of state.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Register, were by him presented to the Sovereign,

who was pleased to command him to declare, and he accordingly declared, that the Most Noble Bernard-Edward Duke of Norfolk had been duly elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then by the Sovereign's command, his Grace was received at the door of the Chapter-room by the Duke of Richmond and Earl Grey, the two Junior Knights Companions present, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion) and by Black Rod: The Duke of Norfolk, kneeling near the Sovereign, and Garter presenting on his knee the Garter, His Majesty, assisted by their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Sussex and Gloucester, the two Senior Knights Companions present, buckled it on his Grace's left leg, the Register pronouncing the usual admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the ribband with the George, and His Majesty, with the assistance of the said two Knights Companions, put the same over the Duke of Norfolk's left shoulder, the Register pronouncing the admonition; after which his Grace had again the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and having received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, withdrew.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by command of the Sovereign, again called over the Knights Companions, and a procession was made to the Royal Closet:

At the Court at St. James's, August 13, 1834.

The King, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters patent under His royal sign manual and the great seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to grant unto the Most Noble Bernard-Edward Duke of Norfolk, Knight of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if his Grace had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

The question alluded to in the foregoing requisition, and upon which the ballot is to be taken, is as follows, viz.

"First.—That in the opinion of this Court it was the intention of the East India Company, evinced by the terms of the compromise which they entered into with His Majesty's Government, and which has been confirmed by Parliament, that the Maritime Officers of the Company, who had served, or were serving, in ships owned or chartered by the said Company, and had not abandoned the service, should be justly and liberally compensated, in consequence of the interest of such Officers being affected by the entire discontinuance of the East India Company's trade.

That such compensation was one of the express conditions of relinquishing the said trade, and that section 7 in the Act of the 3d and 4th of William the Fourth, chapter 85, was altered and modified to admit the claims of the said Officers to compensation; that it would be inconsistent, therefore, with the honour and character of the East India Company, contrary to the spirit and intention of the Act of Parliament, and at variance with the moral and equitable rights of the Maritime Officers, if a just and liberal compensation were not awarded to them for being suddenly and entirely deprived of the advantages which they derived from the Company's service.

Secondly.—That this Court, having taken into consideration the claims of the Maritime Officers to that compensation which has been solemnly and legally recognised and provided for, deem the following scale of pensions and gratuities to be no more than adequate to the just expectations of the claimants:
