AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 15th day of *August* 1834,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the third and fourth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that no goods shall be imported into, nor shall any goods, except the produce of the fisheries in British ships, be exported from, any of the British possessions in America by sea, from or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such possessions, except into or from the several ports in such possessions called free ports, enumerated or described in the table in the said Act in that behalf contained:

And it is thereby provided, that if His Majesty shall deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any port or ports not enumerated in the said table, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such port or ports; and it is thereby declared, that from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject, nevertheless, to the limitations and the restrictions thereinafter provided, shall extend, and be deemed

and construed to extend, to any such port or ports respectively, as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act:

And it is by the said Act further enacted, that the several ports therein mentioned shall be free warehousing ports for all the purposes of the said Act; and it is thereby further enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to appoint any port in His Majesty's possessions in America, to be a free warehousing port for all or any of the purposes of the said Act; and that every such port, so appointed by His Majesty, shall be, for all the purposes expressed in such Order, a free warehousing port under the said Act, as is appointed by the same:

And whereas His Majesty in Council doth deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act, so far as relates to free ports and to free warehousing ports, to the ports of Yarmouth and of Liverpool, in the province of Nova Scotia; now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers thereby vested in His Majesty in Council, His Majesty doth, by and with the advice of the Lords and others of His Most Honourable Privy Council, by this present Order in Council extend the provisions of the said Act, so far as relates to free ports, to the said ports of Yarmouth and Liverpool, in the province of Nova Scotia, and doth hereby declare, that, from

and after the fifteenth day of August in this present year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act of Parliament, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject, nevertheless, to the limitations and restrictions therein provided, shall extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to the said ports of Yarmouth and Liverpool respectively, as fully as if those ports had been inserted and enumerated in the said table of free ports at the time of passing the said Act:

And in further pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, and in further exercise of the powers thereby vested in His Majesty in Council, His Majesty doth, by and with the advice aforesaid, by this present Order in Council, appoint the said ports of Yarmouth and Liverpool, in Nova Scotia, to be free warehousing ports for all the purposes of the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Thomas Spring Rice, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

CHANGE OF DIES.

*Stamps and Taxes, London,
August 21, 1834.*

WHEREAS the Commissioners of Stamps having, in the month of November 1833, pursuant to an Act of the 3d and 4th William 4, cap. 97, discontinued the use of the several dies theretofore used for denoting the stamp duties payable by law, in respect of Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes (except banker's re-issuable notes for sums not exceeding £10) and Receipts; and having provided in lieu thereof new dies, to be used after the said 30th day of November last, for denoting the duties aforesaid, from which day they declared, that such new dies should be the only true and lawful dies for denoting the duties on Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes (except such as before mentioned) and Receipts; and whereas many persons have in their possession Stamps for Bills, Notes, and Receipts, rendered useless by reason of the introduction of the said new dies, which they neglected to present to be restamped with the new dies, within the period of three calendar months prescribed for that purpose by the Act above mentioned: notice is hereby given that, for affording relief in such cases, an Act has been passed (4 and 5 W. 4, cap. 57), extending the time for restamping Bill and Receipt Stamps, rendered useless by the new dies above referred to, for a further period of six months from the 13th day of August instant. All persons, therefore, who have in their possession such Stamps, which have so become useless, will be entitled to have impressions of the new dies in lieu thereof, on the useless Stamps being presented at the Head Office for Stamps in Westminster, or

Edinburgh, or at the Office of any Distributor or Sub distributor of Stamps in the country, at any time within the space of six calendar months next after the said 13th instant.
