This day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, Sheriffs, Common Council, and Officers of the City of London, waited upon His Majesty with the following Address; which was read by the Honourable Charles Ewan Law, the Recorder; and which His Majesty was graciously pleased to receive upon the Throne:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble, dutiful, and loyal Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the city of London, in Common Council assembled, approach your Majesty, with the most sincere attachment to your Royal Person, to present our congratulations upon the safe return of Her Majesty our most illustrious Queen to this country.

And while we express our thankfulness to Divine Providence, for having preserved Her Majesty in health and safety to resume the high duties of Her exalted station in your Majesty's Family and upon the Throne of these Realms, we beg also to renew the assurances of our devoted loyalty and attachment to your Majesty and to your Royal Consort.

That the same gracious Providence which has protected our illustrious Monarch and his beloved Queen, through periods as eventful and important as history has ever recorded, may continue to shower upon them His choicest blessings, and long preserve them to reign in the hearts and possess the affections of a loyal and devoted people, is our most sincere and fervent prayer.
