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Constantinople, January 22.

Several Officers Appointed by the Grand Signior to seize the Goods and Estate of the late Grand Viscer Cara Mustapha, and those that were strangled with him, are come hither from *Adrianoople*. They have found in his Strangle here 7000 Crowns in Money, some Jewels, and a Crown of Pearls of great value, (which they have sent to the Grand Signior) and 800 Slaves, of which the greatest part are Women. The *Resident* or Chancellor, the Grand Viscer Physician, who was a Grecian, his Interpreter, and all his other chief Officers have been strangled. The 18th of the last month *Cara Ibrahim* a Circassian attending the Grand Signiors Person was declared Grand Viscer, and the Grand Signior sent him a very rich Veil; but he did not long enjoy his new Honor, for on the ninth instant he was Strangled by order of the Grand Signior; which, it's said, was done to content the Janisaries, who were very much dissatisfied with the new Viscer: And it's said that *Cara Hassan Oglu* Circassian of this City is named to succeed him. Prince *Soliman* Brother of the Grand Signior, hath lately received Letters from him, full of assurances of his friendship and kindness. The Chiaus which was sent to *Persia*, is returned within these few days, having, it's said, been able to obtain no other answer at that Court, than that the King of *Persia* is not obliged to give to any Body an account of his Designs. There arrived at the Court of *Persia* before this Chiaus came from thence, Deputies from the People of *Georgia*, who were very kindly received. The *Sieur Doyan* Ambassador from the Republick of *Venice* is still here, but it's believed he will embark on one of the Ships of the Dutch Convoy, having the Grand Signior's leave to depart.

Stockholme, March 8. The King of *Sweden* is now at *Upsal* to view his Troops in those Parts, And it's said his Majesty will have a very good Army in the Field this Summer if there be occasion for it.

Warsaw, March 15. Our Letters from *Cracow* inform us, that the King of *Poland* who parted from thence towards the latter end of the last month for *Niemiraw*, had been stop't for several days in his Journey by the ill Weather. That his Majesty had received Letters from the *Sieur Lubaczewski*, giving an account, that he had distributed the Money, he was charged with, among the Cossacks according to his Majesties order; That he had re-established the *Sieur Kuniki* in his command of General of the Cossacks, and had made Colonel *Muhila* his Lieutenant General, and that the eupon the said *Kuniki* was marched with a Body of Cossacks towards the Province of *Budziac*, to secure several Posts which cover *Podolia* on that side. We are assured from all hands, that the King of *Poland* will besiege *Caminitz*, and that the necessary Preparations are making for it: It is said the place is in no very good condition, that the Garrison is very much weakened, and that they want Provisions and Ammunition, but this we are told with so much uncertainty, that no great heed is to be given to it. From the Conference at *Kadisin*, we

have an account that the Polish and Moscovite Commissions had on yea brought matters to any conclusion; that the first insisted upon the Restitution of *Kiovia* and some other places, which have been for several years in the hands of the Moscovites, but these would not hear of it, and that it was believed, for the preventing a misunderstanding between the two Crowns in the present juncture, that they would at last agree to renew the Treaty of *Andersborg* and so refer to a higher power the determination of these Preventions. *Vienna, March 22.* Front *Stungy* we have an account, That the Rebels have published themselves of the Quaggers, which the Troops of *Lithuania* and those commanded by the Prince of *Lubomirsky* lately quitted in *Upper Hungary*. That *Count Tschekley* was marching towards *Eschabar* and *Stungy*, to restore the Partitions he has in those places. That the Imperialist Troops are raising together near *Torochin*. And that General *Apraxin* who the Emperor has appointed for the present to command his Forces in *Hungary*, was very sick in a few days at *Nemobla*. *Vienna, April 1.* The Deputies of the Electors of *Frisia* and the Duke of *Neuburg* are returned home, not having been able to prevail with the Commonalty to accept of the Imperial Commission they were charged with for the continuing the Affairs of this City. It's said that our Elector intends to remove from hence very suddenly to *Roan*. The Letters from *Munich* assure us, that the Elector of *Saxony* will have an Army of 20000 men in the Field the beginning of the next month. And that the Troops of *Frankonia* and *Swabia* will likewise make considerable Roys, and that these will be commanded by Prince *Waldeck*.

Hamburg, April 8. The Danish Troops continue in the Quarters they have taken in *Stecklenburg* and *Lawenburg*. And it's said that the Duke of *Zell* as Colonel of the Circle of the *Lower Saxony*, has ordered several Troops to march to oblige them to dislodge. The Count de *Berke*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the King of *Sweden*, parted from hence this week on his Journey for *Stockholm*. Our Letters from *Poland* tell us, that very great Preparations are making in that Kingdom for the Campaign; and that the King of *Poland* intends to employ his main Forces this Summer in *Podolia* and towards *Moldavia* and *Wallachia*.

Versailles, April 12. The third instant the Count de *Mayan*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*, had Audience of the King, and complemented his Majesty upon the Duke his Masters Marriage with *Mademoiselle*; and the same day had likewise Audience of the Dauphin, the Dauphiness, the Duke of *Burgundy*, the Duke d'*Orleans*, and the Duke and Duchess of *Orleans*, upon the same subject. The ninth instant the Marquis de *Berrens* Ambassador from *Savoy*, being conducted by the *Sieur de Bonneuil* Introduction of Ambassadors, waited to the Duke of *Mayne*, the Duke of *Savoy's* Procurator to marry *Mademoiselle* in his name. The same day the contract of Marriage was signed by the King.

King, the Dauphin, the Dauphiness, the Duke and Duchess of Orleans, the Duke of Chartres, Mademoiselle, and by all the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, and by the Ambassador of Savoy; after which the Ceremony of Betrothing was performed by the Cardinal de Bouillon, the Kings Great Almoner.

The 10th between eleven and twelve a Clock, the Ambassador of Savoy, accompanied by the Introdutor of Ambassadors, having been to fetch the Duke of Mayne, they went together to Mademoiselles Apartments, and conducted her to the Chappel of the Castle, where, in the presence of the King, the Dauphin, Dauphiness, &c. the Duke of Mayne married her in the name of the Duke of Savoy, by virtue of the Procurator he had received from him; the Ceremony being performed by the Cardinal de Bouillon; which ended, the King led the Dutchess of Savoy to her Coach, and the Duke of Mayne was re-conducted to his Apartments by the Ambassador of Savoy. And after Dinner her Royal Highness began her Journey, the Duke of Orleans accompanying her as far as Faversham. The Princess of Ansbome is to accompany her Royal Highness to Savoy; and the Kings Officers are to attend her to the Frontiers.

Paris, April 19. The King will begin his Journey the 24th of this month, and in the mean time all things are preparing for it. Monsieur de Saligny is gone for Maastricht, and Monsieur de Toulon to hasten the Equipage of the Men of War, and Gallies that are fitting out there. The March instant died here the Dutchess of Aiban, Widow of Henry Chabot Duke of Rohan, who had the 67 year of her Age. The Sieur Fiquier who had the care of furnishing Provisions for the Kings Armies, is likewise dead within these few days. We have Letters from Ortesa of the 30th of the last month, which give an account that the Marischal de Bellonds, having passed through Rouen and Bourguen on the Frontiers of Spain, was arrived at Pau, from whence he would continue his Journey towards Catalonia, where he is to command the Kings Forces. They write from Provence, that they had advice by a Vessel lately arrived from Constantinople, that things were there in great confusion; The orders which the Grand Signior had sent thither for the Confiscation of the Goods and Estates of all the Turks that were killed in the last Campaign, having occasioned a great Sedition, which, it is said, had lasted ten or twelve days when this Vessel came away. But we cannot much rely upon the truth of this Report.

Plimouth, April 4. The Eagle of London, Captain Boneale Commander, bound for the East-Indies, put into this Port yesterday, having in a violent Storm lost her Main Mast. The same day in the Evening arrived here His Majesties Ship the Centurion from the Streights.

Portsmouth, April 6. On Thursday last my Lord Dartmouth came to an Anchor at Spithead with His Majesties Ships under his Command. There are likewise at Spithead two French Men of War, who come to convoy a Merchant Ship of that Nation, which hath lain here some time, being bound for Dunkirk.

Deal, April 7. There are now in the Downes, His Majesties Ships the Diamond, the Dartmouth, and the Faulcon, (the two former being outward bound) and the Anne Yacht; and about 40 Sail of outward bound Merchant men, most of them Ships of good Burthen. This Morning early we espied a Merchant Ship upon the Goodwin Sands; and many Boats went immediately off to her relief; but as yet we have no certain account what she is.

Deal, April 8. This day the Lord Dartmouth arrived in the Downes, with seven of his Majesties Ships, his Lordship being on-board the Griffin.

The Ships that was yesterday upon the Goodwin

Sands, got off last night, with the assistance of the Boats that went from hence, and is now in the Downes; she is called the Culpepper bound home from Virginia. Among the Merchant Ships now in the Downes, are the Samson, the William, the Society, the Bernardiston, the Falkon, and the John and Mary bound for the East-Indies.

Windfor, April 8. This day the Installation of the most Illustrious Prince George of Denmark (who in a Chapter held at Whitehall the first of January last, was elected into the Society of the Knights Companions of the most Noble Order of the Garter) and of Charles Duke of Somerset, and George Duke of Northumberland (in like manner elected the 10th of the said month of January) was performed with all due Ceremonies in His Majesties Chapel Royal, within the Castle of Windfor, the Dukes of Albemarle and Beaufort being constituted Commissioners by the Sovereign for investing them with the Robes and Ensigns of that most Honorable Order.
