**T**HE Marquess de Miraflores, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of Her Majesty the Queen of Spain at this Court, has communicated to Viscount Palmerston, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Decree of Her Majesty the Queen Regent of Spain, in the name of Her Catholic Majesty Donna Isabella II. of which the following is a translation:

**ROYAL DECREE.**

Considering that the security and tranquillity of these kingdoms require that vigorous measures should be taken to prevent the spirit of party or sordid interest from affording nourishment to the civil war which unhappily desolates certain provinces; being desirous to prevent any attempts to land arms, military assistance, or stores, in the ports or on the coasts of the north of Spain, for the use of Spaniards in rebellion; and, with a view to self defence, looking rather to the prevention of evil than to its subsequent remedy; I have ordained as follows, in the name of my august Daughter, Donna Isabella II. and with the advice of my Council of Ministers:

1. Besides the general prohibition directed by the laws and regulations of the Custom-house against the introduction and landing of arms, ammunition, or warlike stores, another more special and rigorous prohibition shall be enforced for that portion of the

coast included between Cape Finisterre and the Mouth of the Bidassoa.

2. The ships of the royal navy, the guarda costas, and other Spanish vessels, as likewise the fortified places, forts, and land batteries, shall oppose by force the landing of the said articles, as being designed for keeping up the civil war in these kingdoms.

3. Every vessel that shall be found laden with arms, warlike stores, ammunition, or other articles contraband of war, provided that such vessel shall approach the said coast within six miles, manifesting, by that act alone, her intention and design to disembark the above-mentioned articles, shall be considered to be suspected of the said hostile intention, and shall be detained, and the arms and warlike stores which she carries shall be embargoed until a further decision shall be adopted, according to the importance and the circumstances of the case.

4. My Secretary of State shall forthwith communicate this Decree to the Ambassadors, Ministers, and Diplomatic and Consular Agents of my august Daughter in foreign countries, in order that sufficient publicity being given to these regulations, those who may infringe them may not be able to plead ignorance.

5. The other Secretaries of State in their several Departments shall issue the most precise orders and

adopt the proper measures, in order that this my Royal Decree may have immediate and full effect.

This you shall understand, and you shall take the necessary steps for its accomplishment.

Impressed with a deep conviction of the importance of your Majesty's presence and illustrious example in all the relations of private life and in those of the highest public concernment, we rejoice again to tender at the foot of the Throne the homage due to the exalted virtues of your Majesty; the memory of them will never be effaced, and the influence of their example will be the brightest inheritance of our children.

*" My Lord Mayor, and Aldermen,*

" It is with heartfelt pleasure that I receive the expression of your loyal and affectionate congratulations on my safe return to England, and I beg of you to believe that during my temporary absence my heart was still with that country with which, by attachment no less than by circumstances my happiness and existence are so entirely identified.

" I trust that, with God's assistance, I may be enabled to merit a continuance of that high and gratifying esteem which you have expressed towards Me, and which it will ever be My anxious wish to maintain."

They were all received very graciously, and had the honour of kissing Her Majesty's hand.
