The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Christopher Pepys, Knt. was, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint Captain Henry Prescott, R. N. Governor and Commander in Chief of the Island of Newfoundland and its dependencies, he this day took the usual Oath appointed to be taken by the Governors of His Majesty's Plantations.

d'Affaires at this Court to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, that by a Decree of Her Majesty the Queen Regent of Spain, dated September 16, 1834, the coast of the North of Spain, from Cape Finisterre to the Bidassoa, is declared in a state of blockade; and that all vessels acting in contravention of that Decree will be subject to the penaltics established by the general maritime law in such cases.

Church Commissioners'-Office, September 29, 1834.

Majesty in Council, assigning a consolidated district to the church at Highgate, of parts of the parishes of Hornsey and St. Pancras, under the 6th section of 59 Geo. 3, c. 134:

At the Court at St. James's; the 1st of August 1832, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his or their hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of

the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain, and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" And whereas by the said Act it is fur-ther enacted " that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" And whereas by another Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes; after reciting, that "a considerable population is frequently collected together at the extremities of and locally situate in parishes, or extra parochial places, contiguous to each other, at a distance from the respective churches or chapels of such respective parishes or extra parochial places, it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners with such consent as is required by the said recited Act in the case of district parishes, to unite and consolidate any such contiguous parts of such parishes and extra parochial places into a separate and distinct district for all ecclesiastical purposes, and to cause such district to be named, ascertained, and marked out by described bounds, and such name and the description of such bounds, when approved by His Majesty in Council, to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the Office of the Registry of the diocese to which such district shall belong under the provisions of this Act, and to make grants or loans for or towards the building of, or to build any chapel or chapels, with or without cemetries, in and for the use of the inhabitants of any such district, in such manner and under such regulations as may in the judgment of the Commissioners appear from the circomstances to be most expedient; and to constitute any such district a consolidated chapelry, and every such chapelry shall be under the superintendence of such spiritual person as shall be appointed under the provisions of this Act to serve any such chapel, and such spiritual person shall have cure of souls in such district; and the right of presentation and appointment of such spiritual person shall thenceforth belong to such person or persons, and be exercised in such manner as may be agreed by the several patrons of the churches or chapels of such parish and extra parochial places respectively with the approba-tion of the Commissioners, and banns of marriage may be published, and marriages, christenings, churchings, and burials may be solemnized and performed in any such chapel immediately and at all times after the consecration thereof, and the pew rents in such chapel shall be fixed, and salaries to the minister and clerk assigned therefrom, in such manner as is directed in the said recited Act, or in this Act concerning pew rents and salaries in separate or distinct parishes, and all fees and offerings which may arise and accrue within such chapelry according to such table of fees as the Commissioners shall make, with the approbation of the Bishop, may be demanded, received, sued for, prosecuted and recovered by the spiritual person having cure of souls therein, and by the clerk and sexton of such chapelries, in like manner as if every such chapelry was a distinct parish; and it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, and they are hereby required in every such case, to ascertain and make compensation in manner directed in like cases under the said recited Act, for any loss which may be sustained by the incumbent of any contiguous parish or extra parochial place, which shall form part of any such district by reason of any fees, oblations, and offerings being transferred to the spiritual person serving any such chapel; and all such chapelries shall be deemed to be benefices, and be subject to the jurisdiction of the Bishop and Archdeacon within whose diocese and archdeaconry, the altar of such chapel shall be locally situate, and to all the laws in force concerning presentation and appointment to benefices and churches, and lapse, and all other laws relating to the holding of bene-fices and churches;" and whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the 7th and 8th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of

His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect; and whereas by another Act of Parliament, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," after reciting so much of the aforesaid Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, whereby it was enacted, that it should be lawful for the Commissioners appointed for the execution of the therein recited Act, with certain consents in the now reciting Act mentioned or referred to, to unite and consolidate contiguous parts of parishes and extra-parochial places into a separate and distinct district, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and to make grants or loans towards the building of any chapel or chapels in any such district, and to constitute any such district a consolidated chapelry; and that all such chapelries should be deemed to be benefices, and be subject to the jurisdiction of the Bishop and Archdeacon within whose diocese and archdeaconry the altar of such chapelry should be locally situate; and after further reciting that doubts had arisen touching such jurisdiction in the case of chapels or districts situated wholly or in part within exempt or peculiar jurisdictions, it was enacted, that every such chapel and district, whether situated wholly or in part within any exempt or peculiar jurisdiction, shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Bishop and Archdeacon within the limits of whose diocese and archdeaeonry the altar of any such chapel shall be locally situate, in as full and ample a manner as it would be if no part of such chapelry were within some exempt or peculiar jurisdiction; and in every such case all other ecclesiastical jurisdiction over the said chapel and chapelry shall. wholly cease, and no other jurisdiction shall be exercised in the said chapelry save and except the jurisdiction of the Bishop and Archdeacon as aforesaid, any law, usage, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that when the last census was taken the parish of Hornsey, in the county of Middlesex, and diocese of London, contained a population of 5,856 persons, and that the parish of Saint Pancras, in the same county, which is a peculiar under the jurisdiction of the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's, and within the limits of the same diocese, contained a popula-tion of 103,000 persons; that the said Commissioners have caused a new chapel to be erected at Highgate, at the extremity of and situate in that part of the said parish of Saint Pancras which is contiguous to the said parish of Hornsey, which affords accommodation to 1,520 persons, including 520 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; that such chapel has not yet been consecrated; that the said chapel is distant two miles from the parish church of Hornsey, which is the only place in that parish appropriated to the celebration of divine service according to the rites of the Church of England, and is distant one mile and a half from the Kentish-town chapel, which is the nearest place for celebration of

such divine service in the parish of Saint Pancras; that the extremities of the said parishes of Hornsey and Saint Pancras which lie contiguous to each other at Highgate, and are delineated in the accompanying plan, contain a population of 4,070 persons:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances above mentioned, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate the said contiguous parts of the said parishes of Hornsey and Saint Pancras into a separate and distinct district, to be assigned to the said chapel for all ecclesiastical purposes, and to constitute such district a consolidated chapelry, under the 6th section of the said Act passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving such chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the said district attached to such chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named the Consolidated Chapelry of Highgate, and that the boundaries thereof should be as follows:

The boundary to commence half a furlong north west of Ken-wood-house, at the point where the three parishes of Saint Pancras, Hornsey, and Finchley meet; from thence proceeding along the boundary line which divides the parishes of Hornsey and Finchley, crossing the Barnet-road, until it arrives at a point in the said line, one furlong distant towards the north from the said Barnet-road; thence turning to the east and continuing parallel to the said Barnet-road, and the road called the Highgatearchway-road, at one furlong distance therefrom until it arrives at Hornsey-lane; to continue along the centre of Hornsey-lane, leaving Islington on the south east until it meets the Holloway-road, where the parishes of Islington, Hornsey, and Saint Pancras meet, continuing along the boundary line which divides the parishes of Islington and Saint Pancras, down Maiden lane one furlong; thence to proceed in a south western directon to Swaine's-lane, until it meets the road from Kentish-town to Highgate; thence to proceed in a north western direction up the said road towards Highgate, one furlong beyond the entrance into Millfield-lane; then to diverge in a line nearly west, across the field into Millfield-lane, continuing along the said lane, until it meets the houndary line which divides the parishes of Hornsey and Saint Pancras, at the entrance into the Lord Southampton's ground, called Fitzroy-farin, and to proceed westward about one furlong and three quarters, to the point where it commences half a furlong north west of Kenwood-house aforesaid, as is more particularly delineated in the map hereunto annexed, and is therein coloured brown and green:

That the consent of the Lord Bishop of London has been obtained thereto, as required by the abovementioned section of the said Act of the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; and in testimony of such approbation the said Bishop of London, hath put his signature and seal at the foot of the said instrument, and humbly praying, that 1832, by virtue and in pursuance of the said Act of

His Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to His Majesty's wisdom shall seem meet:

His Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that such proposed union and consolidation be accordingly made and effected, according to the provision of the said Acts.

A Court of Mayor and Aldermen, held in the Inner Chamber of the Guildhall of the City of London, on Monday the 29th day of September, in the year of our Lord 1834, and in the fifth year of the reign of William the Fourth, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith.

HEREAS in and by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the second year of the reign of His present Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled, "An Act to amend the laws relating to hackney carriages, and to waggons, carts, and drays used in the metropolis, and to place the collection of the duties on hackney carriages and on hawkers and pediars in England under the Commissioners of Stamps," it was, among other things, enacted, that it should and might be lawful for the Court of Mayor and Aldermen of the city of London. from time to time to appoint proper places, in the said city of London and liberties thereof, and in theborough of Southwark, where hackney carriages might stand and ply for hire, and to make such. orders for regulating the number of such hackney carriages to stand in such places respectively; and the distances at which they should stand from each other, and the times at and during which they might stand and ply for hire, and such other orders and regulations for the better ordering and regulating the said hackney carriages and the drivers, or other person or persons having the management thereof, respectively as to the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen should seem proper, and from time to time to alter, amend, or repeal such rules, orders, and regulations and to make others in the room thereof; and that the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen should cause all the orders, rules, and regulations, tobe made by them as aforesaid, and every alteration, amendment, or repeal thereof respectively, to be advertised in the London Gazette, and in any two or more newspapers circulated in the said city of London, and a copy thereof to be hung up for public inspection in the Town-Clerk's office, at the: Guildhall of the said city, before the same, or any of them, should be carried into effect, or be considered as repealed by the said Court of Mayor and. Aldermen :

And whereas the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen of the said city of London did afterwards, on the 3d day of January, in the year of our Lord.

Parliament, make certain rules, orders, and regulations, whereby, among other things, the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen did appoint certain places, in the said city of London and liberties thereof, and in the borough of Southwark, then deemed by the said Court to be proper places for the standing and plying of backney carriages for hire, and did also by the said rules, orders, and regulations, regulate the number of such hackney carriages to stand in such places respectively, and the distances at which they should stand from each other, and the times at and during which they might stand and ply for hire, in the manner herein particularly set forth:

And whereas the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen did by one of such rules, orders, and regulations, appoint a certain street called Moorgate, within the city of London, to be a proper place for twenty hackney carriages to stand and ply for hire there, in the manner particularly pointed out and directed by

the said rule, order, and regulation:

And whereas it hath duly appeared to this Court, that the standing for backney carriages at Moorgate aforesaid, mentioned in the said recited rule, order, and regulation, hath become inconvenient; this Court doth, therefore, in pursuance and by virtue of the powers and authorities granted by the said recited Act for that purpose, hereby repeal the said rules, orders, and regulations, so far as relates to the appointment of a standing for twenty hackney carriages in Moorgate aforesaid; and instead thereof, this Court doth hereby appoint, that one hackney carriage only be permitted to stand and ply for hire in South-place, between South-street and the Pavement, Moorfields, in the middle of the said street or place called South-place; and this Court doth also hereby appoint, that four hackney carriages only be permitted to stand and ply for hire in South-place, between South-street aforesaid and Wilson-street, in the centre of the said street or place called Southplace; and this Court doth also hereby appoint, that eight hackney carriages only be permitted to stand and ply for hire in the Pavement, in Moorfields aforesaid, in the centre of the said street or Pavement, between South-place and West-street; and this Court doth also hereby further appoint, that five hackney carriages only be permitted to stand and ply for hire in the street called the Pavement, Moorfields, in the centre of the said street, between West-street aforesaid and the entrance to the Riding Academy; and this Court doth also hereby further appoint, that four hackney carriages only be permitted to stand and ply for hire in London wall, from the corner of the Chapel, Moorgate, to Circus-place, such four last-named hackney carriages to stand on the north side of the said street called London-wall; and we do further appoint, that all such hackney carriages, where more than one is appointed to stand, do stand in lines one after the other, and at the distance of two feet from the horse or horses attached to the next succeeding hackney carriage upon the said standing, where more than one; and that the whole of such twenty-two hackney carriages allowed to stand and ply for hire upon the said standings, or any or either of them, may stand and ply for hire there during the whole of every day and night:

direct, that no hackney carriage shall stand or ply for hire upon such part of the said standings herein appointed, or any or either of them, as shall be directly opposite to the entrance of any other street or lane leading into or out of the same, but that a width or space upon the standing, equal to the width of the entrance to any such street or lane, shall be left open, in order that no obstruction may be given to any other carriage whatever passing or repassing from or into such streets or lane:

And this Court doth hereby further order and direct, that the said rule, order, and regulation, hereby made, shall be forthwith advertised in the London Gazette, and in the two newspapers circulated in the city of London, called the Times and the Morning Advertiser; and that a copy of the said rule, order, and regulation be forthwith hung up in the Town Clerk's-office, at the Guildhall of the said city, pursuant to the provisions contained for that purpose in the said recited Act of Parliament:

And this Court doth hereby further order and: direct, that the said rule, order, and regulation, hereby made, shall be in full force from and immediately after the same shall be advertised and a copy thereof hung up in the Town Clerk's-office as aforesaid, pursuant to the directions of the said Act of Parliament.

HALF-PAY AND RETIRED-PAY TO NAVAL OFFICERS. AND OFFICERS OF THE ROYAL MARINES.

OTICE is hereby given, that on the receipt in the Wages Department at the Admiraltyin the Wages Department at the Admiraltyoffice, Somerset-place, of the affidavit or certificate of identity required from each Officer by His Majesty's Orders in Council, a bill for the amount of the half-pay or retired-pay due will be made out in this Department, which will be payable by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, on the following days, viz.

On the 10th and 11th of October, to Masters, Surgeons, and Pursers, and their Attorneys.

On the 13th, 14th, and 15th of October, to: Lieutenants at 5s. a day and under, and their

On the 16th and 17th of October, to Lieutenants at 7s. and 6s. a day, and Chaplains, and their Attorneys.

On the 20th, 21st, and 22d of October, to-Admirals, Lieutenant-Generals, Major-Generals, Colonels, Lieutenant-Colonels, Majors,. Captains, Commanders, and Retired Commanders, and their Attorneys.

Great inconvenience having been experienced bythe claims of Officers, who have not chosen to receive their half-pay or retired-pay on the days fixed' for their rank, being brought forward on the days. appointed for the payment of half-pay and retiredpay to Officers of different ranks; notice is hereby given, that no such claims can in future be attended to on the days not appointed for Officers of thoseranks; but for the accommodation of such Officers, . And this Court doth hereby further order and also for the convenience of those who may not

have transmitted their affidavits or certificates sufficiently early to admit of payment on the above-mentioned days, a recall will take place on the 24th and 25th of October.

After which the half-pay and retired-pay will be payable on the first and third Wednesday in every month, excepting during the general payment.

Officers residing in or near London, and wishing to receive their half-pay or retired-pay in person, are requested to deliver their affidavits or certificates into the Wages-office at the Admiralty, Somerset-house, or transmit them to the Secretary of the Admiralty, immediately on the expiration of each quarter; and those employing agents are also requested to furnish their agents with their affidavits or certificates, as promptly, for unless such documents are early delivered into this Office, delay in the payment must unavoidably ensue

It sometimes happens that Officers apply personally for their half-pay or retired-pay, without having previously sent in their affidavits or certificates as required by the usual advertisement; any delay or inconvenience to which they might be subject by this oversight, it is in the power of the Officers themselves to prevent, by an adherence to

the existing regulations.

Under the authority of the Statutes relating to the pay of the Navy, besides the above-mentioned modes, Officers may receive their half-pay or retired-pay in any of the following ways, viz.

1st. By drawing a bill for the amount, on a form to be transmitted from this Office.

2d. By a remittance bill, or permanent remittance bill, payable to them at or in the neighbourhood of their residence, by the Collector of Customs or Excise.

3d. By extract or permanent remittance bill, at a Dock-yard, where there is an establishment of Pay Clerks.

If they wish to receive it by bill of exchange, they are to give notice thereof, by letter, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked, in the corner, " Half-pay, or Retired-pay, Accountant-General," and thereupon the proper form will be sent to them.

If they wish to have it remitted to them, they must give a like notice to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked in the same manner, and a bill will thereupon be made out and transmitted to

In all cases, the Officer signifying his desire of payment is to state at the foot of his letter, his Christian and surnames, his rank, and a full description of his residence.

MEM .- Bills of exchange drawn under or by virtue of the Act of 11 Geo. 4, cap. 20, are not liable to the stamp duty.

No persons residing out of His Majesty's dominions are entitled to the privileges of this Act.
