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Vienna, March 31.

THE Letters from *Leutsch* in *Upper-Hungary* of the 18th instant, give an account, that *Teckelej* was marching that way with a Body of 12000 men, and that he had sent a Summons to the Officer that commands in the place, to deliver it up to him, threatening if he did not, to put all that were in it to the Sword. That the Poles that were in *Zeben*, have surrendered it upon Articles to the Rebels, who have likewise possessed themselves of *Kasmarke*, which the Troops of Prince *Lubomirski* had abandoned. That the thirteen Towns in *Ziperland* have paid 5000 Crowns to Count *Teckelej* to free them from being burnt, but that they have nevertheless been very ill used, and some of them plundered. And that the Tartars have carried away a great many of the Country People. The private Letters from *Belgrade* and *Buda* tell us, that there continues a great Consternation among the Turks, occasioned as by their ill success, so by the contagious Disemper that now reigns in *Turkey*, and has already swept away a great many People, there having been lately found up and down in the Country between *Belgrade* and *Buda* above 40000 dead Bodies; and their Horses and Cattle likewise dying in great numbers. These Letters say farther, that several of the *Ottoman* Provinces in *Asia* have revolted, That their Affairs are every where in a very ill posture, and that to restore them the *Mufti*, and many of the Principal *Bassa's* began to cast their Eye upon the Grand Signior's Brother. And some Persons come from *Upper-Hungary*, tell us it was strongly reported there, that the Grand Signior and a great many of the Chief of his Court have been strangled by the Janisaries, who they say, were so incensed against the Sultan for having caused three eminent *Bassa's* to be strangled, because they would not accept of the place of Grand Vicer, which had been offered them one after another, that they immediately fell upon him, and all those who they believed had advised him to it. The same report comes by the way of *Croatia*, and seems to deserve some credit. The Count *de Caprara* passed some days since through this place in his Journey for *Hungary*, where he is to command the Emperors Forces.

Lintz, April 2. All things are preparing for the Campaign, but it's believ'd the backwardness of the Season will not suffer the Armies to take the Field before the end of *May* or the beginning of *June*; in the mean time General *Caprara* will act with a Body of Imperial Troops in *Hungary*, and will, it's said, attack *Caschau*, *Esperies*, and other places, which are still possessed by the Rebels. We have an account that the Baron *Mercy*, Colonel *Hausler*, and the Baron *Bargozzi*, are come to *Newsoi*; but that the high Waters that are out, do hinder the march of the Regiments that are commanded thither. And that Count *Teckelej*, who

hath made a great havock in *Upper-Hungary*, understanding the Imperial Troops are drawing together, hath quitted *Kasmarke* and all *Ziperland*, and is retired towards *Caschau*. The Imperial Court will remove from hence towards the latter end of this month to *Crembs*.

Lintz, April 6. The Duke of *Lorraine* will part from hence in three or four days to accompany his Dutcheſs to *Insprucke*; and so soon as he comes back, the general Rendezvous of the Imperial Army will be appointed, and in the mean time the Recruits are hastened, and the Emperor has declared that the Officers that shall not have their men compleat within the time limited, shall be cashiered, and the men they have raised put into other Companies. We are assured that *Newbeusel* is in great distress, that the Garison is very much weakened by Sickness, and that those that can, do daily leave the place. Our Letters from *Gran* give us an account, that the Imperialists having intelligence from some Country People that thirty Turkish Horse, who came from *Newbeusel*, commanded by *Sauara Mustapha* Aga, a Principal Officer among them, were in a Village two Hungarian Miles from *Gran*, where they were forced to rest their Horses, 1500 Hussars were immediately sent out; who surprized the Turks, killed several of them, and took the rest Prisoners, of which number was the said Aga, whom they brought to *Gran*, with 20000 Crowns in Money; and that they understood from the Prisoners, that the said Aga was sent with Letters to the Vicer of *Buda*, and that he had taken with him what Money he had, to save it, believing *Newbeusel* could not hold out long. The last Letters from *Upper-Hungary* informed us, that Count *Teckelej* after having destroyed the Estates of several of the Nobility that are faithful to the Emperor, hath been forced to retire to the Mountains, the Turks and Tartars that came lately to his assistance, having again left him. We have advice, as well by the way of *Hungary* as *Croatia*, that the Janisaries have strangled the Grand Signior and have set up his Brother.

Brussels, April 11. On Sunday last Prince *Waldeck* arrived here from the *Hague*, and having had several Conferences with the Marquis *de Grana*, upon the present State of Affairs, he parted again from hence this Morning for *Maastricht*, where he intends to stay several days (he being Governor of that place) and then to continue his Journey for *Germany*. We are preparing for the Campaign; a very great quantity of Ammunition Bread is baking here and at other places. New Tents are making for his Excellencies Guards; and a Train of Artillery is preparing at *Malines*. His Excellency has demanded of the States of this Province, an extraordinary Subsidy of 300 thousand Florins towards the enabling him to provide for the defence of those Countries, which the States did yesterday

communicate to the Magistrates of this City, the Proposal is to charge twelve Stivers upon every Acre of Land in that part of the Province, which is called *Walloon Brabant*, and eighteen Stivers an Acre upon the Quarters about *Antwerp*, which have not suffered so much as the other. The Spanish Troops from *Arth and Audenarde* have lately made an Invasion towards *Lille*, and burnt several Villages on that side. The Elector of *Cologne's* Resident at this Court, who was lately called home, is come hither again, and hath had Audience of the Marquis de *Grins*, to whom it's said he represented, That his Electoral Highness hath thought fit, in this conjuncture, to raise several Troops to preserve his Territories from the Violencies and Outrages they suffered during the last War; assuring his Excellency that his intention is not to molest any of his Neighbors, but to do all he can to dispose them to a Peace, which is so much to be desired at this time. The Letters come in this day from *Cologne* tell us; That his Electoral Highness's Forces are drawing together; That his Troops from the Bishoprick of *Hildesheim* have possessed themselves of a small Town called *Hoxer* upon the *Riven Wejer*; and it's said that before the end of this month, his Electoral Highness and his Allies will have an Army of 50000 men on the *Rhine*. On Saturday last a Person who is said to have been employed here as a Spy by the Baron de *Quincy*, was seized and sent Prisoner to the Castle of *Nikword*.

Brussels, April 14. This day marched from hence his Excellency's Guards, with the Duke of *Aerschors* Regiment of Horse, and 300 commanded Horse of the Dutch Troops, and a Regiment of Dutch Foot, being commanded by Count *Salazar*; each Soldier took two Days Provision; And it's said they are designed for *Namur*; to put into the place a Regiment of Foot and some Money. The Prince of *Orange's* Regiment of Foot Guards arrived yesterday at *Antwerp*; and his Highness will be himself very suddenly in *Brabant*. We have an account from the French Conquest, of the great Preparations that are making there for the Campaign; and that his most Christian Majesty is expected at *Valenciennes* before the end of this month. The 11th Infant Monsieur de *Montai* arrived at *Dinant*, between which place and *Charlemant*, the French are laying a Bridge over the *Meuse*.

Hague, April 14. The 12th Infant arrived here four extraordinary Deputies from the States of *Friezeland*, and two from the States of *Groningen*, who have since been in conference with the Ministers of this State. The States of *Holland* re-assembled the 17th Instant, but are since separated again, and the Deputies are gone home to consult their Principals upon the Points that are now before them. On Saturday last marched from hence a Battalion of the Princes Guards for *Flanders*, another having marched the day before from *Delft*. The Bailiey *Van Bancken* remains a close Prisoner at *Amsterdam*; and the Magistrates of that City have published a Placet for the apprehending one *Samuel Bos*, who appears to have been an accomplice of the said *Van Bancken* in the design he had against the Person of the Burgermaster *Van Beuvingen*.

Hague, April 18. The Extraordinary Deputies for the States of *Friezeland* and *Groningen*, who arrived here some days ago, have had Audience of the States General, and were informed their business is demanded; That the Troops which are in the Pay of those Provinces, may be forthwith re-

called from *Flanders*. The Count de *Solms* Colonel of the Princes Regiment of Foot-Guards is arrived here from *Germany*, and will part from hence in few days for *Flanders*, where his Regiment now is. It is said that his Highness has given orders for the forming a Camp on the side of *Over-Yssel* under the command of the Marquis de *Montpouillan*, to observe the *Munster* Troops. The States General are not yet come to a conclusion in the matter of the new Levy, the great question being, whether they shall proceed in it by plurality of voices. They write from *Zealand*, that they had an account by a Vessel arrived there, that the *Heer Van Sommerdyke* was arrived at *Surinam*.

Paris, April 19. The French and Suisse Guard; parted from hence the latter end of the last week for *Flanders*, and the rest of the Troops of the Household are preparing to follow. And it's said that the King's departure is fixed for the 24th of this month. The Count d'*Estree* Vice-Admiral of *France*, is going for *Provence* to hasten out the Fleet which his Majesty intends to have in the Mediterranean this Summer.

Deale, April 10. This Morning His Majesties Ships the *Diamond* and the *Dartmouth*, and about 25 Merchant Ships, sailed to the Westward.
