The Duke of Lorrain will pare Lintz, April 6. from hence in three or four days to accompany his Dutchels to Insprucke; and so soon as he comes back, the general Rendezvous of the Imperial Army will be appointed, and in the mean time the Recruits are hastened, and the Emperor has declared that the Officers that shall not have their men compleat within the time limited, shall be cashiered, and the men they have raised put into other Companies. We are affured that Newbeusel is in great distress, that the Garison is very much weakened by Sickness, and that those that can, do daily leave the place. Our Letters from Gran give us an account, that the Imperialifts having intelligence from some Country People that thirty Turkish Horse, who came from Newbeusel, commanded by Gauara Muslapha Aga, a Principal Officer among them; were in a Village two Hungarian Miles from Gran, where they were forced to rest their Horses, 150 Hussar were immediately sent out; who surprized the Turks, killed several of them, and took the rest Prisoners, of which number was the said Aga, whom they brought to Gran, with 20000 Crowns in Money; and that they understood from the Prisoners, that the said Aga was sent with Letters to the Visier of Buda, and that he had taken with him what Money be had, to fave it. believing Newbeusel could not hold out long, The last Letters from Upperhold out long, Hungary informed us, that Count Teckeley after having destroyed the Estates of several of the Nobility that are faithful to the Emperor, hath been forced to retire to the Mountains, the Turks and Tartars that came lately to his affiliance, having again left him. We have advice, as well by the way of Hungary as Croatia, that the Janifari s have ftrangled the Grand Signior and have fet up his Brothers

Bruffels, April 11. On Sunday lait Prince Waldeck arrived here from the Hague, and having had feveral Conferences with the Marquis de Grana, upon the present State of Affairs, he parted again from hence this Morning for Meestrucht, where he intends to flay feveral days (he being Governor of that place) and then to continue his Journey for Germany. We are preparing for the Campagne; a very great quantity of Ammunicion Bread is baking here and at other places. New Tents are making for his Excellencies Guards; and a Train of Artillery is preparing at Maliner. His Excellency has demanded of the States of this Province, an extraordinary Subfidy of Soe thouland Floring towards the enabling him to provide for the defence of those Countries, which the States did yesterday

considerates to the Magistrates of this City, the I called from Flanders. The Letters come in this day from Cologne tell-us; That his Electoral Highnesses Forces are drawing together; That his Troops from the Bishoprick of Hildesheim have possessed themselves of a small Town called Hoxer upon the Riven Weler; and it's faid that before the end of this month, his Electoral Highness and his Allies will have an Army of foods men on the Rhine. On Saturday Jaft a Person who is said to have been employed here as BeSpu by the Baron de Quincy, was seized and sent Prisoner to the Castle of Vilvord.

Brussells, April 14.
