PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this day pleased to deliver the Great Seal to the Right Honourable John Lord Lyndhurst; whereupon the oath of Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain was, by His Majesty's command, administered to him, and his Lordship took his place at the Board accordingly.

Whitehall, November 21, 1834.

THE following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the undersigned, Magistrates, Gentry, Clergy, and other inhabitants of the ancient and loyal borough of Brecon, beg leave to approach your Majesty's Throne in order to express, at this important crisis, our firm and unalterable determination to exert our utmost efforts in support of your Majesty's just prerogative, in placing at the head of the government of these kingdoms such persons as your Majesty shall in your judgment think fit to appoint; and our full reliance on the declaration

which your Majesty has already most graciously made, that no consideration whatever shall induce you to consent to any such measures as shall place in danger the integrity of the constitution of this country as now by law established, both in church and state.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

SIRE,

WE the undersigned, inhabitants of the borough of Merthyr Tydfil, beg most respectfully to approach your Majesty's Royal presence with assurances of our loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's Throne and Government.

We beg most dutifully to convey to your Majesty the expression of our admiration and gratitude for the wisdom and firmness evinced by your Majesty, in removing the powers of government from the hands of a body of councillors, whose vacillating and injudicious measures have brought the constitution and the interests of the country into imminent danger.

We beg also to express our hopes and confidence, that, by the exercise of your Majesty's sound judgment and paternal love for your people, such Ministers will be called into your Majesty's councils as will preserve in safety the sacred institutions and the important eternal interests of the country.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the undersigned, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects of Ashford and its vicinity, in the

county of Kent, assembled to commemorate your Majesty's glorious declaration of inviolable attachment to our constitution in church and state, feel it our duty, at the present important crisis, to lay before your Majesty the expression of our entire devotion to your Majesty's person, and of our steadfast determination to rally round your Majesty in defence of those principles on which the Illustrious House of Brunswick ascended the British Throne.

But prepared as we are to support your Majesty, even with our lives and property, in resisting every enemy of the Monarchy, and of our Protestant Establishment, we are no less anxious to co-operate with your Majesty in uniting loyal men of all parties, or in promoting any real improvement of our invaluable constitution in church and state.
