ON Thursday morning, the 11th instant, at nine o'clock, the Remains of His late Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester were privately removed from Bagshot-park to Cumberland-lodge, escorted by a detachment of the King's Own Light Dragoons, in the following order:

A mourning coach, drawn by four horses, conveying four Pages of His late Royal Highness.

The carriage of His late Royal Highness, drawn by six horses, conveying the Coronet, the Field-Marshal's Baton, and Sword of His late Royal Highness, attended by the Comptroller and Treasurer of His late Royal Highness's Household.

THE HEARSE,

Drawn by eight horses, decorated with escocheons of His late Royal Highness's Arms.

A mourning coach, drawn by six horses, conveying the Grooms of the Bedchamber of His late Royal Highness.

A mourning coach, drawn by six horses, conveying the Equerries of His late Royal Highness.

A mourning coach, drawn by six horses, conveying the Chaplains and Medical Attendants of His late Royal Highness.

The carriage of Her Royal Highness the Princess Sophia-Matilda of Gloucester, drawn by six horses.

Upon arrival at Cumberland-lodge, the Body was received by a guard of honour, removed from the hearse, and lay in state from twelve till four o'clock.

At half past seven o'clock in the evening, the Remains of His late Royal Highness were removed from Cumberland-lodge to St. George's Chapel at Windsor, in the following order:

A detachment of the King's Own Light Dragoons, three abreast, bearing flambeaux.

The Band of the Scots Fusilier Guards, playing the Dead March in Saul, between the flourish of Trumpets, Drums, &c.

Trumpets and Drums of the Royal Household.

 Serjeant Trumpeter.

Footmen and Grooms of the Royal Family, in state liveries, with crape hatbands and black gloves, bearing flambeaux.

Footmen and Grooms of His late Royal Highness, in deep mourning, bearing flambeaux.
