ORDERS for the Court's change of mourning, on Thursday the 1st of January 1835, for His late Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, first cousin and brother in law to the King, viz.

The Ladies to wear black silk, fringed or plain linen, white gloves, necklaces and ear-rings, black or white shoes, fans and tippets.

The Gentlemen to wear black, full trimmed, fringed or plain linen, black swords and buckles.

The Court to change the mourning further on Thursday the 8th of January 1835, viz.

The Ladies to wear black silk or velvet, coloured ribbons, fans and tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuffs, with black ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuff waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured swords and buckles.

And on Thursday the 15th of January 1835, the Court to go out of mourning.

Whitehall, December 18, 1834.

THIS day being appointed for the further prorogation of Parliament by Commission, the Lords Commissioners (consisting of the Lord Chancellor,

the Earl of Rosslyn, Lord President of the Council, and the Earl of Jersey, Lord Chamberlain) assembled at three o'clock, in the room heretofore appropriated as the Library of the House of Lords, the Commons being assembled in a Committee-room contiguous thereto. Mr. Pulman, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was directed by the Lord Chancellor to require the immediate attendance of the Commons in the usual course; and the Commons being come thither, the Commission was read by the Clerk, and the Lord Chancellor signified to both Houses His Majesty's royal will and pleasure, that the Parliament should be further prorogued to Thursday the fifteenth day of January next, to be then and there holden, and the Parliament was prorogued accordingly.

THE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, for dividing the parish of Wrockwardine, in the county of Salop. into two distinct and separate parishes, under the 16th section of the 58 Geo. 3, c. 45:

At the Court at St. James's, the 30th of July 1834, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated; signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his or their hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain, and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such

respective divisions; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided; and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that, in the year 1831, when the last census was taken, the parish of Wrockwardine, in the county of Salop, and diocese of Litchfield and Coventry, contained a population of 2528 persons; that there is beside the parish church one chapel in the said parish, which has been lately built in the township of Wrockwardine-wood; that the parish church affords accommodation to 330 persons, including 20 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that the said new built chapel affords accommodation to 610 persons, including 430 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that the said parish should be divided into two distinct and separate parishes, under the 16th section of the said Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; and that the parishes should be named, respectively the parish of Wrockwardine and the parish of Wrockwardine-wood; that the said new built chapel should be the parish church of the said parish of Wrockwardine-wood; and that the boundaries of the said parish of Wrockwardine-wood should be as follows:

The boundary to commence at a place on the north side of the turnpike road, called the Watling-

street road, leading from Wellington to Lichfield, where the parishes of Wrockwardine, Shipnal alias Idsal, and Lilleshall meet; and thence proceed northward along the boundary which separates the parishes of Wrockwardine and Lilleshall to a place on the south side of a turnpike road, called the French-lane, leading from Wellington aforesaid to Newport, in the county of Salop, where the parishes of Wrockwardine and Lilleshall join the parish of Eyton on the Wild Moors; then proceeding westward along the boundary which separates the parish of Wrockwardine from the said parish of Eyton on the Wild Moors to the western corner of a field of land in the occupation of Thomas Webb, called the Langate, situate in the parish of Wrockwardine, where the parishes of Wrockwardine and Eyton on the Wild Moors join the parish of Wombridge; thence proceeding eastwardly along the boundary which separates the parishes of Wrockwardine and Wombridge to a lane leading from the French-lane aforesaid to Wombridge; thence crossing the said lane and proceeding southwardly along the said boundary, crossing the Shropshire canal twice, to a place near the said canal where the parishes of Wrockwardine, Wombridge, and Shipnal alias Idsal, meet; thence proceeding eastwardly and southwardly along the boundary which separates the parish of Wrockwardine from the parish of Shifnal to the turnpike road, called the Watling-street road; thence proceeding eastwardly along the northern side of the said road to the place where the boundary commenced; which district is more particularly described in the accompanying plan:

That the whole of the glebe land of the said parish which does not exceed a quarter of an acre, besides the garden of the Vicarage house, lies within and will belong to the parish of Wrockwardine:

That seven eighths of the tithes will belong to the parish of Wrockwardine, and one eighth to the parish of Wrockwardine-wood:

That the endowments of the said parish amount to fourteen pounds, fourteen shillings, and six pence, and will remain with the said parish of Wrockwardine:

That it is estimated that the amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues which will arise in the parish of Wrockwardine-wood will be two thirds; and of those which will arise in the parish of Wrockwardine will be one-third of those arising in the whole of the present parish:

That the consents of the Lord High Chancellor as patron in right of His Majesty of the parish church of Wrockwardine, and of the Lord Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry have been obtained, as required by the abovementioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of His Majesty King George the Third; and in testimony of such their approbation the said Lord High Chancellor and the said Lord Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry have put their signatures and seals at the foot of the said instrument; and humbly praying, that His Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to His Majesty shall seem meet:

His Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
