St. James's-Palace, February 24, 1835.

THIS day His Majesty proceeded in state from St. James's-Palace to the House of Peers, where he arrived about two o'clock; and was received, on alighting from his state coach, by the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, the Deputy Lord Great Chamberlain, the Earl Marshal, the Lord Steward of the Household, the Duke of Wellington, Clarenceux King of Arms, in the absence of Garter, and Black Rod, and proceeded to the robing-room in the customary manner.

His Majesty was there robed, and having put on the imperial crown, the procession moved into the House in the usual order;—the sword of state was borne by the Duke of Wellington, and the cap of maintenance by the Marquess of Winchester.

His Majesty being seated upon the Throne, the Great Officers of State and others standing on the right and left, Sir Augustus Clifford, Knt. the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to deliver the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I AVAIL Myself of the earliest opportunity of meeting you in Parliament, after having recurred to the sense of My people. You will, I am confident, fully participate in the regret which I feel at the destruction, by accidental fire, of that part of the ancient palace of Westminster which has been long appropriated to the use of the two houses of Parliament.

Upon the occurrence of this calamity, I gave immediate directions that the best provision of which the circumstances of the case would admit should be made for your present meeting, and it will be My wish to adopt such plans for your permanent accommodation as shall be deemed, on-your joint consideration, to be the most fitting and convenient.

I will give directions that there be laid before you the report made to Me by the Privy Council in reference to the origin of the fire, and the evidence upon which that report was founded.

The assurances which I receive from My Allies, and generally from all Foreign Princes and States, of their earnest desire to cultivate the relations of amity, and to maintain with Me the most friendly understanding, justify, on My part, the confident expectation of the continuance of the blessings of peace.

The single exception to the general tranquillity of Europe is the civil contest which still prevails in some of the northern provinces of Spain.

I will give directions that there be laid before you articles, which I have concluded with My Allies, the King of the French, the Queen Regent of Spain, and the Queen of Portugal, which are supplementary to the Treaty of April 1834, and are intended to

facilitate the complete attainment of the objects contemplated by that Treaty.

I have to repeat the expression of My regret that the relations between Holland and Belgium still reinain unsettled.

. Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have directed the estimates for the ensuing year to be prepared, and to be laid before you without delay.

They have been framed with the strictest attention to economy; and I have the satisfaction of acquainting you that the total amount of the demands for the public service will be less on the present than it has been on any former occasion within our recent experience.

The satisfactory state of the trade and commerce of the country, and of the public revenue, fully justifies the expectation that, notwithstanding the reductions in taxation which were made in the last session, and which, when they shall have taken full effect, will tend to diminish the existing surplus of the public revenue, there will remain a sufficient balance to meet the additional annual charge which will arise from providing the compensation granted by Parliament on account of the abolition of slavery throughout the British dominions.

I deeply lament that the agricultural interest continues in a state of great depression.

I recommend to your consideration whether it may not be in your power, after providing for the exigencies of the public service, and, consistently with the steadfast maintenance of the public credit, to devise a method for mitigating the pressure of those local charges which bear heavily on the owners and occupiers of land, and for distributing the burden of them more equally over other descriptions of property.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The information received from the Governors of My Colonies, together with the Acts passed in execution of the law for the abolition of slavery, will be communicated to you.

It is with much satisfaction that I have observed he general concurrence of the Colonial Legislatures in giving effect to this important measure; and, not-withstanding the difficulties with which the subject is necessarily attended, I have seen no reason to abate My earnest hopes of a favourable issue.

Under all circumstances you may be assured of My anxious desire, and unceasing efforts, fully to realise the benevolent intentions of Parliament.

There are many important subjects, some of which have already undergone partial discussion in Parliament, the adjustment of which, at as early a period as is consistent with the mature consideration of them, would be of great advantage to the public interests.

Among the first in point of urgency is the state of the tithe question in Ireland, and the means of effecting an equitable and final adjustment of it.

Measures will be proposed for your consideration, which will have for their respective objects, to promote the commutation of tithe in England and Wales, to improve our civil jurisprudence and the administration of justice in ecclesiastical causes, to make provision for the more effectual maintenance of ecclesiastical discipline, and to relieve those who dissent from the doctrines or discipline of the church from the necessity of celebrating the ceremony of marriage according to its rites.

I have not yet received the report from the Commissioners appointed to enquire into the state of municipal corporations, but I have reason to believe that it will be made, and that I shall be enabled to communicate it to you, at an early period.

I have appointed a Commission for considering the state of the several dioceses in England and Wales, with reference to the amount of their revenues and to the more equal distribution of episcopal duties; the state of the several cathedrals and collegiate churches, with a view to the suggestion of such measures as may render them most conducive to the efficiency of the Established Church; and for devising the best mode of providing for the cure of souls, with reference to the residence of the Clergy on their respective Benefices.

The especial object which I have in view in the appointment of this Commission, is to extend more widely the means of religious worship according to the doctrines of the Established Church, and to confirm its hold upon the veneration and affections of My people.

I feel it also incumbent upon Me to call your earnest attention to the condition of the Church of Scotland, and to the means by which it may be enabled to encrease the opportunities of religious worship for the poorer classes of society in that part of the United Kingdom.

It has been my duty, on this occasion, to direct your consideration to various important matters connected with our domestic policy.

I rely with entire confidence on your willing

co-operation in perfecting all such measures as may be calculated to remove just causes of complaint, and to promote the concord and happiness of My subjects.

I rely also with equal confidence, on the caution and circumspection with which you will apply yourselves to the alteration of laws, which affect very extensive and complicated interests, and are interwoven with ancient usages, to which the habits and feelings of My people have conformed.

I feel assured that it will be our common object, in supplying that which may be defective, or in renovating that which may be impaired, to strengthen the foundations of those institutions in Church and State which are the inheritance and birthright of My people, and which, amidst all the vicissitudes of public affairs, have proved, under the blessing of Almighty God, the truest guarantees of their liberties, their rights, and their religion.

second time with the same ticket, to prevent which, it must be produced at Constitution-hill-gate, and at Stable-yard-gate also, where a corner of it will be torn off by the Marshalmen in attendance; and no person can be allowed the privilege of the *entrée* by any other approach to the Palace than the gates above mentioned.

T has been notified by the Minister Plenipotentiary of Her Catholick Majesty to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in a communication dated the 24th instant, that the permission which, in virtue of a Royal Order of Her Majesty the Queen Regent of Spain, dated at Madrid, the 11th of December 1834, had been granted to Spanish vessels, to enter the ports of Corunna, Gijon, Santander, and Bilboa (notwithstanding the blockade of the coast of the north of Spain, from Cape Finisterre to the Bidassoa, declared in the Royal Order of the 16th of September preceding), had, by another Royal Order, dated at Madrid, the 11th of February 1835, been extended to the vessels of His Majesty's subjects, under the conditions prescribed in the before-mentioned Royal Order of the 11th of December 1834, of which the following is a translation:

(Translation.)

TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

Madrid; December 11, 1834.

A representation from the "Procuradores" of the province of Biscay having been taken into consideration in a sitting of the Council of Ministers, in which the Procuradores state, that, in consequence of the declaration of the blockade of the coast of Cantabria, many Spanish vessels are detained in England, on account of the Consuls refusing to furnish them with the proper papers in order that they may proceed to the ports of that coast, to the serious detriment of that commerce in general, since, although the cause which gave rise to the declaration of the blockade unfortunately still subsists, it would appear that no inconvenience could arise from continuing the commerce in goods of lawful trade, under certain regulations and restrictions:—the Council, having attentively

considered this subject, and being desirous to conciliate the interests of commerce with the attention due to the blockade of that coast, as one of the measures most efficacious in favour of the cause of the Queen, our Mistress, has determined what follows:—

lst. Her Majesty's Consul in London and his Delegates, Vice-Consuls, or Consular Agents in the ports of Great Britain, shall furnish papers, in the usual manner, to all Spanish vessels which may be bound, in due form, for the ports of Corunna, Gijon, Santander, and Bilboa; to which ports alone, and to no others of those comprehended in the blockade this favour is granted.

2dly. The captains or consignees of the said vessels shall lay before the Consuls. Vice-Consuls, or their Agents, a list of the bales, packages, &c. with a general statement of their contents, comprised in the register of their whole cargo, which must consist only of goods of lawful trade, and in no way and under no pretext whatsoever of those called contraband of war, which are designated in the twenty-fourth article of the "Ordenanza del Corso; excepting rigging and canvass, which are exempted from this rule for the present, and so long as the rebels are not in possession of any vessel of any description, nor of any maritime port.

3dly. The Consuls, Vice Consuls, or their Agents shall transmit to the administrators of Customs, or to the judges of contraband in any of the above-mentioned ports to which this favour has been granted, and to which the vessels may be bound, a general list of their cargoes, in order that they may be examined and searched, for the purpose of ascertaining whether they convey any article not mentioned. in that list; the military chiefs in the aforesaid ports, whether of the army or of the navy, or the persons by them appointed, are authorised to be present at the examination of those vessels, notwithstanding that they may have been already searched at sea by any Spanish man of war, with the like object of ascertaining whether they carried on board any of the goods above cited as contraband of war; theseextraordinary measures shall cease, de fucto, whenever the blockade shall be raisêd.

4thly. As long as these restrictions shall continue in force, and in order to prevent all Spanish vessels from approaching or entering any port or ports, occupied by the enemies of the Queen, our Mistress, the captains, supercargoes, or consignees of the said vessels shall give, before the Spanish Consuls, Vice-

Consuls, or their Agents, who may have furnished them with the papers necessary to their voyage, and as a guarantee that they do not carry any warlike stores, a security which shall not be under 60,000 rials, nor above 100,000 rials; which I communicate to your Excellency. (Signed)
