AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 4th day of *March* 1835,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the third and fourth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that no goods shall be imported into, nor shall any goods, except the produce of the fisheries in British ships, be exported from, any of the British possessions in America by sea, from or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such possessions, except into or from the several ports in such possessions called free ports, enumerated or described in the table therein contained; and it is thereby, amongst other things, provided, that if His Majesty shall deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any port or ports not enumerated in the said table, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such port or ports; and that from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject nevertheless to the limitations and restrictions hereinafter provided, shall extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to any such port or ports respectively, as fully as if the same had been inserted and enu-

merated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act; and after reciting that there are in the said possessions many places situated in rivers and in bays at which it may be necessary to establish ports for particular and limited purposes only, it is further Order in it shall be lawful for His Majesty in any enacted, that Council made for the appointment of any free port to limit and confine such appointments respectively to any and such purposes only as shall be expressed in such Order :

And whereas His Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act for such purposes as are after mentioned, to the port of Majaquadvie, in the province of North Brunswick; now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers thereby in His Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, His Majesty doth, with the advice of His Privy Council, order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the first day of June next all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures therein contained, subject nevertheless to the limitations and restrictions hereinafter provided, shall extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to the said port of Majaquadvie, as fully as if the said port had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act; provided, nevertheless, that the said port of Majaquadvie shall be a free port under the said Act for the single purpose of importing from the United States of America articles for the use and

consumption of His Majesty's subjects and others inhabiting the said port, and for no other purpose :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

A Royal Order of Her Majesty the Queen Regent of Spain, of which the following is a translation, has been communicated by the Minister Plenipotentiary of Her Catholick Majesty to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in a note dated the 6th instant :

(Translation.)

To the Secretaries of the Departments of Finance and of the Navy.

Most Excellent Sirs,

Her Majesty the Queen Regent, animated by Her constant desire to afford every possible facility and freedom to national and foreign commerce that may be compatible with the paramount object of the defence of the kingdom, has been pleased to resolve, upon the advice of the Council of Ministers, that the ships of Spain, as well as those of friendly and Allied Powers, which may arrive with cargoes of goods of lawful commerce in the four ports excepted from the general blockade of the northern coasts, and specified in the Royal Order of the 11th December last, shall be exempted from leaving the deposit or bond required by the said Royal Order, provided, nevertheless, that on approaching our coasts within the distance of six miles laid down by the maritime law, and on casting anchor in our ports, the said ships do observe the forms and attend to all the regulations required by the laws and ordinances for preventing the smuggling of contraband of war, so prejudicial under the circumstances in which the nation is placed.

I communicate this to your Excellency by Royal Order, that you may cause the necessary orders to be issued by the Department under your direction to the proper authorities.

God preserve your Excellency many years.

This day the Archbishop of Canterbury and Bishops, with the Prolocutor and Members of the

Lower House of Convocation of the Clergy of the province of Canterbury, waited upon His Majesty to present the following Address; which was received by His Majesty upon the Throne:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the province of Canterbury, in Convocation assembled, beg leave most respectfully to offer the sincere and humble expression of our loyal and affectionate attachment to your Majesty's throne and person.

We acknowledge with peculiar thankfulness the many instances of condescension and kindness which we have received from your Majesty, and the repeated assurances of your Majesty's fixed resolution to protect and uphold the Church. At this particular juncture, when the Church is assailed with unceasing hostility, when its Ministers are reviled and calumniated, its revenues invidiously exaggerated, and its very existence denounced as pernicious to the interests of Religion, it is hardly possible to calculate the benefit which our venerable Establishment has derived from the firmness and fortitude evinced by your Majesty in its defence.

Being conscious that we have nothing to fear from the fullest investigation of the truth, and sincerely desiring the removal of every obstacle to the success of our sacred ministrations, we feel ourselves deeply indebted to your Majesty for having directed the attention of your Government to the concerns of the Church, for the purpose of ascertaining its real condition, and of applying remedial measures wherever they may be found necessary.

We rejoiced in the enquiry which was instituted by command of your Majesty into the amount of ecclesiastical revenues, anticipating, what has in fact resulted from it, an authoritative contradiction of the statements so assiduously circulated of the enormous wealth of the Clergy.

With still greater satisfaction we view the recent appointment by your Majesty, of a Commission empowered to take into consideration the state of the Church, and to suggest such measures as may repair any decays and supply any imperfections in our ecclesiastical system, and call into action all its energies.

Aware of the vast importance of this undertaking, yet not insensible to its difficulties, we cheerfully proffer to your Majesty the assurance of our zealous co-operation in carrying it, under the Divine blessing, to a happy conclusion. Most anxiously do we desire, that means may be found of making the resources of the Church available, in the highest possible degree, to the purposes of religious instruction, due care being taken to secure the continuance of that which has ever been its characteristic distinction, the maintenance of a learned and pious clergy, qualified to be the defenders of our holy religion, and the opponents of erroneous doctrine, as well as the guides and counsellors of the people committed to their charge.

In any event we may venture to promise, that the clergy, as a body, will not be found wanting in the discharge of their duties as the ministers of peace and the teachers of godliness.

By such a course of proceeding we shall best shew forth our sense of your Majesty's paternal goodness, and strengthen our hope of acceptance when we offer up our prayers, in the name of the Lord Jesus, for the honour and happiness of your Majesty, for the welfare of all our fellow subjects, for the peace and prosperity of the realm, and for the perpetuity of our happy Constitution in Church and State.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

"I cordially thank you for this loyal and dutiful Address.

"I derive great satisfaction from the assurance which you have given me, of your zealous co-operation in the measures which I have directed with a view to the improvement of our ecclesiastical system.

"Firmly determined to uphold and to protect the Established Church, my efforts will ever be directed to maintain its rights and privileges, and to extend its influence.

"I rely with confidence upon the continuance of your exertions in the discharge of the sacred duties confided to you, which, as they have eminently contributed to the advancement of true religion, will, I trust, under the blessing of Almighty God, ensure the permanent happiness and welfare of my people."
