

Whitehall, July 27, 1835.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Frind Cregoe, of Moor-end, Charlton Kings, in the county of Gloucester, Esq. and unto Elizabeth Sarah his wife. His royal licence and authority, that they may, in compliance with the earnest desire of Caroline Colmore, of Charlton Kings aforesaid, spinster, take and use the surname of Colmore, in addition to and after that of Cregoe; that the arms of Colmore may be borne by the said Frind Cregoe, quarterly with those of Cregoe; and that the said surnames and arms may in like manner be taken, borne, and used by the issue of their marriage; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise His Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.
