Brufels, Sept. 27. The French A my is now encamping about two le gues fom this place, between Geersbergh and Lexfe but with what defign we k tow net. Count Marfin is upon recov ty f em bis ciftemper. The Marqueis de Caffel Rodrigo ately ordered all the French Inhabitants of this place to qui the Town, and fte Ctly farbidden their ftay in any part. of the King of Spains Dorintons, under penalty of the forfeiture of all their goods, and feifure of their persons (though na-

turalized) it found here after the 24 h Inflant.

Bruges, Sept. 28. Since the demolishing of Aloft, and blowing up the Walls and Gates there, (in which many men were, for want of care, burt and killed) the French finding fome want of Provisions, the whole Country being milerably Is affed, a e now retiring to their Winter Quarters, leaving ve y frong Garrisons in all the places which they have taker. They have put 4000 men into Doway, and proportionable rumbers into other places, according to their bignels. They are also building a ver y. prat and frong Cittadel at Courtray, and have pulled down many of the Bu ghers houses to make way for to the no small trouble of the Ci iz ns, but have difmantled Geersbergh, about five leagues diftant from Ghent and Brußels.

The Marquels de Caftel Rodrigo has made leveral removes in his Garrisons, having fent a freth supply of men from Bruf. fels to St. Gillan whole old Garrifen is merched to Monts, that of Monts to Valencienne, whe le Garifon is to rem ve to Cambray to reinforce that place, as being nearest to, and moft active sgainft the French. The Governour of which laft place some few dayes fince sent out a strong party, which has filled up the River betwix Doway and Tournay with rubbish and other materials, is he his done also between Arras and Doway, and thereby put a ftop to all entercourse by water between those places. The Garrisen of Cambray is very eftive, and frequency abroad, and have taken many fouldiers belinging to Domay : the last week they came up to the very walls of it, furprifing and killing their Saninel, and falling is upon their Out-gustd, returned with little or no burt.

Paris, Sept. 28. This day the Sieur Van Beuninghen leaves this place, and returns for Holland. 'Tis reported that the States of the United Provinces intend fu Idenly to dispatch hither three Ambaffadors Extraordinary, who are toufe their endeavours to encourage an Accommodation between the two 'Tis allo discourfed here that the Duke de Roque-Laure is to be fhorily fent Ambiffador Extraordinary into En-

gland.

From Madrid we are advised, that the Cardinal Viscomti a sendy to part thence, intending for this place, in purluance of the Order received from the Pope, to prepare the bufineffet between the two Crowns in order to his Mediation, which will be likewise the endeavour of several other Forreign Mini-Rers defigned bicher.

In the mean time his Majefty has given order for very great levies of Horse and Foot, but not to commence before the Month of January, and has in order theraunto figned feveral w Commissions.

From the Army, Letters of the 20th I fant inform us, that our Forces were then about Leikerk, and that Mathat de Turenne had fent out f om his Army a Body of 6000 mm, commanded by the Count de Duras and Duke de Roames, Lieutenant General, and the Count de Vivonne Mar. find de Camp, but upon what expedition was not then known, and that the Regiment of Guards, with some offer Regiments, were ordered to take up their Winter Quarters in Lille, and would in few day's March thirt, where care was taken to build them Cabbins, and raife Tents to lodg them.

His Majesty with all his Court intends hither about Allialontide, where he will pals the Winter, and the Thuillerles are

to be prepared to entertain their Mejetties.

Trurec, Sept. 16. A Veffel artiving lately on thefe Coals from the Barbados, confirms to us the e-the defeat and tuine of the French Fleet by Sir fo. Harman ; and by Latters from thence of the 30 of July we are told, that near twenty of that Fleet were confiderable fhips, carrying from 20 to 60 Gunt, that five of them were great Men of War, arrived in three or four dates before their defent from France and Holland, and that the Admiral carried above 60 Gans, and the Vice-Admiral 50. boil of them new built fhips ; that the Engagement held from Thurlday, June 27. till Sunday at noon, when the wind favouring Sic 30 Harman, he came in with his Fire thips, and burnt them, only three thips fcaping of the whole number, and those disabled; that immediately after the Norwich Fregat was di parche away to the Lord Willoughby, with an account of what had paffed, and arrived at Barbados the Tuefe av following , where Orden were prefently taken for a fpredy furply to be fent to the Fleet, with all fores of neceffaries.

Tarmouth, Sept. 20. Here are now at Anchor in this Road about 60 fall of laden Colliers, Wi h the Antelope, Forrefter, Sweepstakes, and Truelove, riding at Sea for the fecunity. A Veffel coming in hicher yeft re'ay from London tells us of about 3: o fail of laden Colliers which are at an-

cher upon the Coafts between this and London.

Harwich, Sept. 21. The Fleet of Colliers that lay bere weather bound, are now under fail for the Thames.

The Right Honourable the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal be defired and Authorized to cause such farther Writs of Dedima potestatem to be Iffued our for Administring the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremicy in the feveral Counties and pleas within the Kingdome of England, Dominion of Wales, the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, and in the Iflands of Guernfey and Ferfey, where the fame have not been already Iffeel he late Lord Chancellor.
