R. WARRINGTON, His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General at Tripoli, has transmitted to Lord Glenelg, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, an official note, of which the following is a translation, which has been addressed to Mr. Warrington by his Excellency Esseit Mustapha Nedgib:

(Translation.)

Esseit Mustapha Nedgib, by the Grace of God, Pacha Vizier of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, Lieutenant-General of Tripoli and its Dependencies, to Hanmer Warrington, His Britannic Majesty's Consul-General at Tripoli.

SIR.

DURING the troubles which have for three years past desolated this country, there has arisen a ruinous abuse, which no Government can tolerate, that of embarking and landing merchandise and other articles at other places than the established ports. This illicit commerce, besides causing the greatest injury to the revenue, is extremely prejudicial to lawful commerce and to the tranquillity of the country. We, therefore, inform you, Sir, that we have given the necessary orders to several of our vessels to be ready to cruise on the coast; and you will accordingly have the goodness to inform those of your countrymen, and all others whom it may concern, that henceforth all coasting traffic is

expressly forbidden, and that no commercial intercourse will be allowed at any other places than the ports of Tripoli, Bengasi, and Derna; and consequently, that from the 1st September 1835, all vessels, boats, or craft, &c. which may be found in the prohibited places, will be seized, it being declared that the whole of this coast is, from this moment, to be regarded as in a state of blockade, excepting only the three ports above mentioned.
