THE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, assigning districts to the parochial chapel of Macclesfield, and to Saint George's Chapel, Sutton, in the parish of Prestbury, under the provisions of the 16th section of 59th Geo. 3, c. 134:

At the Court at St. James's, the 16th of July 1835, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish

for his or their consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his or their hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other emoluments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain, and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches or parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or any chapel then built, or which might thereafter be built, or re-

quired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriages shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, or by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that in the year 1831, when the last census was taken, the parish of Prestbury, in the county palatine and diocese of Chester, contained a population of 47,957 persons; that there are, besides the parish church, fifteen chapels in the said parish, which altogether afford accommodation to 9:19 persons; that one of the said chapels, called the Parochial Chapel of Macclesfield, affords accommodation to 1671 persons, including 414 free seats appropriated

to the use of the poor; and that another of the said chapels, called St. George's Chapel, in Sutton, affords accommodation to 1477 persons, including 400 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that divine service is regularly performed in both the said chapels:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that particular districts should be assigned to each of the said chapels, called the Parochial Chapel of Macclesfield and St. George's Chapel, in Sutton, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should respectively be named the Parochial District of the Parochial Chapel of Macclesfield, and the District of St. George, in Sutton, with boundaries as follows:

PAROCHIAL DISTRICT OF THE PAROCHIAL CHAPEL OF MACCLESFIELD.

The boundary to commence on the High North-road to Manchester, at the meer stone near the Beach-bridge, thence westward along the boundary of the borough to the meer stone at Westbrook; then continuing westward by Moss-meadow, along the boundary between Fallibroome and Macclesfield, to the meer stone at Whirley end; then southward by the boundary between Birtles and Macclesfield, by Long Moss, till it meets the township of Henbury, following the boundary to that of Gaysworth, and along the southward to Moss-pool; then along the boundary between Macclesfield and Sutton (as is described in the perambulation of 1822, in the records of the Corporation) to where it meets the High London-road, continuing eastward along the boundary between Macclesfield and Sutton, as therein described, to where this meets the boundary of Macclesfield-forest at Teg's Nose; then southward following the boundary between this and Sutton to Tenter-bank, and along the boundary between Wildboar Clough and Sutton to Greenway-bridge, and along the boundary between Wincle and Sutton to where it meets that of Bosley, continuing southward to the River Dane by Cartridge-wood; then following the course of the Dane eastward by Quarnford-bridge, where it forms the boundary between Cheshire and Staffordshire; and then northward as the boundary between Cheshire and Derbyshire by Tinker's Pit; then following the River Gogt to where this meets the township of Kettleshulme; then westward along the boundary between this and Macclesfield-forest, by High Bedmoor and Lamled, and between Rainow and Macclesfield borough; then northward, to include the township of Hurdsheld, to Swanscoe, along the boundary between Tlitherington and Hurdsheld; then westward to Breach bridge, where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan annexed to the said representation, and coloured crimson.

DISTRICT OF SUTTON.

The boundary to commence on the High London-road, where it enters the township of Sutton from that of Macclesfield, then going south west, following the boundary between these townships (as marked by the meer stones in the perambulation of the borough of Macclesfield in 1822) to where this meets the boundary of Gawsworth parish, following this to Moss-pool and Lingards, where it meets the boundary of Bosley township; along this to where it meets the township of Winclé, turning north east to Green-way-bridge till it meets the township of Wildboar Clough; along this to Tenter-bank where it meets the township of Macclesfield-forest; along this to Teg's Nose where it returns to the township of Macclesfield, and turning westward along the boundary of the borough by the Sheep-wash, to where it again crosses the High London-road, where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan annexed to the said representation, and coloured yellow.

That marriages, churchings, baptisms, and burials should be performed in each of the said chapels; and that the fees for churchings, baptisms, and burials should belong to, and be paid to, the respective Ministers of the said two chapels; and that the fees for marriages should, from and after the next avoidance of the living of Prestbury, be paid to the respective Ministers of the said two chapels:

That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Chester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, in testimony whereof the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed the said representation; and humbly praying, that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to His Majesty in His royal wisdom should seem meet:

His Majesty, having taken the said representation, and the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, when the last census was taken the parish of Chorley, in the county palatine of Lancaster, and diocese of Chester, contained a population of 9282 persons; that there is, besides the parish church, one chapel in the said parish, lately built, and called Saint George's Chapel, which affords accommodation to 2012 persons, including 1590 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that divine service is regularly performed therein:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the said chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named St. George's District, with boundaries as follows:

The boundary to commence in the centre of Market-street, the high road from Preston, to Bolton, opposite High-street; thence proceed eastward, along the centre of High-street, including the south or right side thereof, in a straight line, crossing Eave's-lane on the south end of the work-house, and down a regular foot-path to a bridge over the canal; thence, proceeding northward, along the canal side to the township of Whittle-le-woods, where the parish of Chorley joins the parish of Leyland; thence, eastward, along the boundary which separates the parishes of Chorley and Leyland, crossing the Blackburn-road, to the township of Heapey, in the parish of Leyland; thence along the eastern boundary which separates the parishes of Chorley and Leyland; thence, southward, along the boundary which separates the parishes of Chorley and Standish, crossing Eave's lane, the canal, the road to Bolton, and Carr-lane to the River Yarrow; then along the said river to the end of Gillibrand-wood; then, northward, on the west side of the said wood, to Dole-lane, and along the west side of Saint Thomas's-street into Market-street, where the boundary commenced, as the same is, in the map annexed to the said representation, more particularly delineated, and therein coloured blue.

That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be performed in the said chapel; and that the fees arising therefrom should, during the present incumbency of the parish of Chorley, be equally divided between the Incumbent of the said parish and the Minister of the said chapel, and from and after the first avoidance of the incumbency of the said parish church, that the whole of the said fees should belong to the Minister of the said chapel:

That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Chester has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act passed in the 59th year of His Majesty King George the Third; in testimony whereof the said Lord Bishop has signed and

sealed the said representation; and humbly praying that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to His Majesty in His royal wisdom shall seem meet:

His Majesty, having taken the said representations, and the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

HALF-PAY AND RETIRED-PAY TO NAVAL OFFICERS AND OFFICERS OF THE ROYAL MARINES.

NOTICE is hereby given, that on the receipt in the Wages Department at the Admiralty-office, Somerset-place, of the affidavit or certificate of identity required from each Officer by His Majesty's Orders in Council, a bill for the amount of the half-pay or retired-pay due will be made out in this Department, which will be payable by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, on the following days, viz.

On the 10th and 12th of October, to Masters, Surgeons, and Purser, and their Attorneys.

On the 13th, 14th, and 15th of October, to Lieutenants at 5s. a day and under, and their Attorneys.

On the 16th and 17th of October, to Lieutenants at 7s and 6s. a day, and Chaplains, and their Attorneys.

On the 19th, 20th, and 21st of October, to Admirals, Lieutenant-Generals, Major-Generals, Colonels, Lieutenant-Colonels, Majors, Captains, Commanders, and Retired Commanders, and their Attorneys.

Great inconvenience having been experienced by the claims of Officers, who have not chosen to receive their half-pay or retired-pay on the days fixed for their rank, being brought forward on the days appointed for the payment of half-pay and retired-pay to Officers of different ranks; notice is hereby given, that no such claims can in future be attended to on the days not appointed for Officers of those ranks; but for the accommodation of such Officers, and also for the convenience of those who may not have transmitted their affidavits or certificates sufficiently early to admit of payment on the above-mentioned days, a recall will take place on the 23d and 24th of October.

After which the half-pay and retired-pay will be payable on the first and third Wednesday in every month, excepting during the general payment.

Officers residing in or near London, and wishing to receive their half-pay or retired-pay in person, are requested to deliver their affidavits or certificates into the Wages-office at the Admiralty,

Somerset-house, or transmit them to the Secretary of the Admiralty, immediately on the expiration of each quarter; and those employing agents are also requested to furnish their agents with their affidavits or certificates with the same dispatch, for unless such documents are delivered into this Office early, delay in the payment must unavoidably ensue.

As it sometimes happens that Officers apply personally for their half-pay or retired-pay, without having previously sent in their affidavits or certificates as required by the usual advertisement, any delay or inconvenience to which they might be subject by this oversight, it is in the power of the Officers themselves to prevent, by an adherence to the existing regulations.

Under the authority of the Statutes relating to the pay of the Navy, besides the above-mentioned modes, Officers may receive their half-pay or retired-pay in any of the following ways, viz.

1st. By drawing a bill for the amount, in which case they are to give notice thereof, by letter, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked, in the corner, "Half pay, or Retired-pay, Accountant-General," and thereupon the proper form of a bill of exchange will be sent to them.

2d. By a remittance bill, or permanent remittance bill, payable to them at or in the neighbourhood of their residence, by the Collector of Customs or Excise.

3d. By extract or permanent remittance bill, at a Dock-yard, where there is an establishment of Pay Clerks.

In either of the two latter cases; they must give a like notice to the Secretary of the Admiralty, marked in the same manner, and a remittance bill, or extract, will thereupon be made out and transmitted to them.

In all cases, the Officer signifying his desire of payment is to state at the foot of his letter, his Christian and surnames, his rank, and a full description of his residence.

MEM.—Bills of exchange drawn under or by virtue of the Act of 11 Geo. 4, cap. 20, are not liable to the stamp duty.

No persons residing out of His Majesty's dominions are entitled to the privileges of this Act.
