

Such of the Creditors as have not produced their grounds of debt, with oaths of verity thereto, in the hands of the Trustee, are required to do so, on or before the 16th day of July next, being ten months after the date of the first deliverance on the petition for sequestration; otherwise they can receive no share of the first dividend which may be made from the debtor's estate, agreeably to the terms of the Statute.
