NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the next session, for an Act to alter, amend, and enlarge the powers of an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intitled "An Act for widening and improving certain streets in the town of Liverpool, in the county palatine of Lancaster; for the further prevention of nuisances and annoyances in the said town; for the regulation of weighing machines, weights, and measures, and the establishment of a fire police therein," so far as the said Act relates to the said fire police establishment; and that it is proposed to obtain power by the said intended Act for laying an additional or increased rate or charge on the owners or occupiers of property, real and personal, which shall be uninsured, and which shall be preserved or protected by such fire police, and on the director or directors of all and every fire office or offices who shall have an insurance or insurances effected upon any property, real or personal, which shall be preserved or protected by such fire police to be applied towards defraying the charges and expences attendant upon such preservation or protection.—Dated this 26th day of October 1835.
