Edward Clifford (sued with William Osborne), formerly of No. 1, South-Street, Spitalfields-Market, out of employ, then of Store-ditch, both in Middlesex, out of employ, then of the Green Man Public-House, Old Kent-Road, Surrey, Omnibus Proprietor, then of Whitechapel-Road, Omnibus Proprietor, then of the Dup Horse Livery-Stables, Worship-Street, and lastly of the Black Horse Livery-Stables, Curtain-Road, all in Middlesex, Omnibus Proprietor.

TAKE NOTICE,

1. If any Creditor intends to oppose a Prisoner's discharge, notice of such intention must be given, by entry thereof in the proper page and column of the book kept for that purpose at the Office of the Court, between the hours of Ten in the Forenoon and Four in the Afternoon, three clear days before the day of hearing above mentioned, exclusive of Sunday, and exclusive both of the day of entering such notice and of the said day of hearing; but in the case of a Prisoner, if an order has been obtained, but not carried into effect by the Creditors, notice of opposition will be sufficient if given one clear day before the day of hearing.

N.B. Entrance to the Office in Portugal-street.

2. The petition and schedule, and all books, papers, and writings filed therewith, will be produced by the proper Officer for inspection and examination, on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, until the last day for entering opposition inclusive, and copies of the petition and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided by the proper Officer, according to the Act 7 Geo. 4, c. 57, sec. 76.

3. Notice to produce at the hearing any books or papers filed with the schedule, must be given to the Officer having the custody thereof, within the hours above mentioned on any day previous to the day of hearing.

4. Opposition at the hearing can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.
