NOTICE is hereby given, that, by virtue of an Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of His present Majesty, intitled "An Act to repeal the duties, under the management of the Commissioners of Stamps, on stage-carriages and on horses let for hire in Great Britain, and to grant other duties in lieu thereof; and also to consolidate and amend the laws relating thereto," the Commissioners of Stamps and Taxes will put up the Duties by the said Act granted on horses let for hire, at the Crown and Anchor Tavern, in the Strand, on Friday the 11th day of December next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, subject to such conditions as will then be produced, to be let to farm, for the term of one year, from the 1st day of February next, inclusive, in the several divisions or districts following, that is to say:

All persons intending to bid for any of the said duties, are to notify their intention in writing addressed to the Commissioners, at the Stamp and Tax Office, Somerset place, at least three days previous to the said 14th day of December next, signed with their names, stating the places of their abode, and specifying the district or districts for which they intend to bid.

And no persons licensed to let houses for hire, nor any one in their use, can be admitted to contract for any of the said duties.
