WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the seventeenth day of this instant December; We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said seventeenth day of this instant December, to Thursday the fourth day of February next; and We have given order to Our Lords Commissioners for the custody of the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to prepare a commission for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said fourth day of

February next, assemble and be holden for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said fourth day of February next.

I do hereby give notice, that it hath been certified to me in writing, under the hands of two Members serving in this present Parliament, that Henry Somerset, commonly called the Marquis of Worcester, late Member serving in this present Parliament for the western division of the county of Gloucester, is become a Peer of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and to whom a writ of summons hath been issued under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom to summon him to Parliament; and that I shall issue my warrant to the Clerk of the Crown to make out a new writ for the electing of a Knight to serve in this present Parliament for the said western division of the county of Gloucester, in the room of the said Henry Somerset, commonly called the Marquis of Worcester, now a Peer of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and

to whom a writ of summons hath been issued as aforesaid, at the end of fourteen days after the insertion of this notice in the London Gazette.

therein contained in favour of the wife of the said Insolvent, in order to render the life estate of the said Insolvent saleable for the benefit of his Creditors, or for such other purpose or purposes, and to take such other proceedings at law or in equity relating to the said settlement, and for the obtaining and enforcing any estate, effects, or rights of the said Insolvent against the Trustees of the said settlement, and any other person or persons, as the said Creditors shall be advised, or at the said meeting shall determine; and also to assent to or dissent from the said Assignees proceeding to a sale, by public auction, of a certain real estate of the said Insolvent, situate in Parchment-Street, in the said City of Winchester, in mortgage, or releasing, at a valuation to be made thereof, the equity of redemption of the said Insolvent therein to the Mortgagee, permitting him to be a Creditor on the estate of the said Insolvent for the residue of the mortgage debt, interest, and costs; and if the Creditors at the said meeting shall authorise the said Assignees to proceed to the said sale, then to approve and direct in what manner, and at what place, the said real estate of the said Insolvent shall be sold by public auction; and to authorise and empower the said Assignees to compound, submit to arbitration, or otherwise arrange the matters aforesaid, or any of them, or any debt due from the said Insolvent, or to his estate, or any claim, dispute, matter, or thing, relating to the estate, effects, and property of the said Insolvent; and generally to authorise and empower the said Assignees to act in the conduct and management of the estate of the said Insolvent, as the said Assignees shall be advised; and on other special affairs.—Dated the 5th of December 1835.
