THE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, assigning districts to the chapels of Saint John Walham-green and Saint Mary Northend, in the parish of Fulham, under the provisions of the 16th section of 59th Geo. 3, c. 134:

At the Court at Brighton, the 20th of November 1835, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other emoluments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain, and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of

fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches or parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or required under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it

shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriages shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapel shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, or by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding;" and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;'" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,'" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that in the year 1831, when the last census was taken, the parish of Fulham, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London, contained a population of 7317 persons; that there are, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation for 800 persons, two chapels in the said parish, called respectively the Chapel of St. John, Walham-green, and the Chapel of St. Mary, Northend; that the said chapel of St. John, Walham-green, affords accommodation for 1370 persons, including 544 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; and that the said chapel of St. Mary, Northend, affords accommodation to 800 persons, including 150 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor; that the said two chapels have been consecrated and divine service is regularly performed therein:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to each of the said last-mentioned chapels, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th

year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such districts should be respectively named the district of St. John, Walham-green, and the district of St. Mary, Northend, with boundaries as follows:

ST. JOHN, WALHAM-GREEN.

This district will be bounded on the east by the Kensington-canal, and on the south by the River Thames, which are in fact, on those two sides, the boundaries also of the parish of Fulham; on the north it will be bounded by a cart-way which runs nearly at right angles from the Kensington-canal to the road leading from Northend to Walham-green, and, after following that road for about one hundred and fifty yards, its line will then follow a carriage-way leading in the direction of the Greyhound public-house, until it meets another road from the direction of Norman-house; on the west it will be bounded by the road last mentioned, falling into and crossing another road from the Old Crabtree public-house to Sir John Lillie's, leaving St. nley-place to the right and Wheatsheaf-alley to the left, till it meets the main road from Fulham to London, near the Wheatsheaf public-house; from that point the boundary will continue in a direct line to the north west corner of the wall which incloses the premises of Peterborough-house, leaving the whole of Parson's-green-lane, Parson's-green, and the population connected therewith, to the district of the old church at All Saints, Fulham; from the point last named it will take a direct line, leaving Peterborough-house to the left, till it reaches the River Thames, as the same is delineated in the map annexed to the said representation, and thereon coloured blue.

ST. MARY, NORTHEEND.

This district will be bounded on the east by the Kensington-canal, on the north by the boundary line which divides the parishes of Fulham and Hammersmith, and on the west by the River Thames, on the south it will be bounded by a cart-way which leads from the River Thames, and crosses, near the Greyhound public-house, the road leading from Fulham to Hammersmith; it will then follow the direction of the same cart-way until it meets, to the north of Norman-house, the northern boundary for the district proposed for the church of St. John, Walham-green, as the same is delineated in the plan annexed to the said representation, and therein coloured yellow.

That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be performed in both the said chapels; and that the fees for the same should be paid to the respective Ministers of the said two chapels, except that the fees for burials accruing at the said chapel of St. Mary, Northend, shall continue to be apportioned in the same manner that the same are now, between the Vicar of Fulham and the Minister of the said last-mentioned chapel:

That the consent of the Lord Bishop of London has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of His said Majesty King George

the Third, in testimony whereof the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed the said instrument; and humbly praying, that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to His Majesty shall seem meet:

His Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed districts be accordingly assigned to the said two chapels, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
