The Gentlemen to wear black coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuff waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured swords and buckles.

One week of the above mourning is also to be for Her late Royal Highness the Grand Duchess of Hesse.

And on Sunday the 20th of March next, the Court to go out of mourning.
