

the Duke of *Lorraine* arriv'd the 28th of the last Month at *Sherowitz*; That General *Mercy* had been out with 5 or 6000 Men to War in *Newheusel*; and that the Imperial *Patrias* had been under the Cannon of that place. A great many Boats have been sent from hence with Ammunition and all manner of Necessaries for the Army in *Hungary*.

Lintz, June 3. We have advice from *Hungary*, that the Duke of *Lorraine* parted on the 31. of the last Month from *Sherowitz*; accompanied with all the General Officers, to go to the Rendezvous of the Army on the *Wuag*. The Letters from the Court of *Poland* give an account, That the Poles and Cossacks had defeated a body of between 16 and 18000 Turks and Tartars who were marching to put a great Convoij of Provisions into *Caminie*; That 8000 of them were killed upon the place, and all the Provisions and Ammunition taken; and that of the Christians there were about 2000 killed.

Lintz, June 6. The Letters from *Hungary* tell us, That the Duke of *Lorraine* arriv'd the second of this Month at *Comorra*; That the whole Train of Artillery was likewise arriv'd there; And that the general Rendezvous of the Imperial Army was to be held as this day. In the mean time *Newheusel* remains block'd up; And the Imperialists have defeated a Party of that *Garon* that was abroad, and killed 200 of them upon the place.

Hamburg, June 9. The Elector of *Brandenburg's* Troops have orders to march the 15th Instant; and a Train of Artillery is prepared. The King of *Denmark* is at *Itzehoe*, seven Leagues from hence.

Brussels, June 16. The 14th Instant the French Army commanded by the *Marschal de Schomberg*, advanced to *Lessines*, within eight Leagues of this place; upon which the Prince of *Orange* changed the resolution he had taken to encamp his Forces towards *Hall*, and gave out Orders for the drawing them together between *Vilvord* and *Louvaine*; and accordingly they encamped yesterday in two Lines from *Hever* to *Scarbeck*, about a league from hence, composing 16 Battalions and 31 Squadrons, besides 1000 Spanish Horse who are encamped by themselves near *Pigniers*; And his Highness has his Quarters at *Haren*. *Monfieur de Montal*, who was posted with a separate Body on the other side of *Maubuge*, is removed towards *Mons*; and we are told, that several Detachements that were sent to the Army before *Luxemburg*, have rejoined the *Marschal de Schomberg*. We are assur'd that the *Bavarian Troops* and those commanded by *Prince Waldecke*, are marching towards the *Rhin*.

Hague, June 17. The States of *Holland* re-assembled yesterday; but are again Adjourn'd till tomorrow, when it's believ'd they will take a final Resolution upon the Offers made to them by his Most Christian Majesty. The Deputies of the States General had the 14th a long Conference with the Count of *Milau*. They have likewise had several Conferences with the Ministers of the Allies. The Spanish Envoy has given in a Memorial, wherein he acquaints the States General that the King his Master is resolv'd not to make any Peace or Truce with *France*; but with the Inclusion of the Republick of *Genova*.

Paris, June 17. The 14th Instant the *Sieur Raux*, the *Pope's* Nuncio, had an Audience of the King at *Versailles*, upon the Affairs of the present Conference, and particularly those of *Genova*: We are told that Republick hath Published a Declaration of War against *France*; and that they have enter'd into closer Engagements with the Spaniards, and have undertaken to furnish at certain rates all the Ammunition and Provisions they shall want for the Service of their Forces both by Land and Sea. The loss which the French have sustain'd in *Catalonia* is very considerable; We are told they had two *Lieutenant Colonels* and 70 Captains killed, and other Officers and Soldiers proportionable; and that the Army had pass'd the *River Ter*, and was retiring towards *Basars*; whether it's said a Detachment will be sent to reinforce it. The French Fleet of Men of War and Gallies command'd

by *Monfieur du Quesne*, return'd the first and second of this Month to *Thoulon*, and the 6th they sail'd again from thence, bring 16 Men of War and 30 Gallies, as was believ'd for the Coast of *Catalonia*. The 14th Instant *Te Deum* was sung in the Church of *Notre Dame* for the taking of *Luxemburg*, and in the Evening there were Bon-Fires, and the Cannon of the Arsenal and the Bastille were discharged. The *Marschal de Crequi*, it's said, is march'd towards *Trier* with 15000 men; having sent a Detachment of 10 Battalions to joyn the Army commanded by *Monfieur de Schomberg*.

London, June 11. This day a Tryal was had at the Guild Hall before my Lord Chief Justice *Fefey*, upon an Information against *Francis Smith* living at the Elephant and Castle in *Cornhill*, for Printing and Publishing a very Scandalous and Seditious Libel, call'd, *The Raree Show*, of which he was upon a very plain Evidence found Guilty.

Whitehall, June 11. Sir *Thomas Armstrong* (who was named in His Majesties Proclamation of the 28th of June 1683, as having Traiterously Conspir'd the Death of His Majesty and his Royal Highness) having been taken the last week at *Leyden* in *Holland* by Order of the States, and put on board one of His Majesties Yachts at *Rotterdam*, he was brought last night to *Greenwich*, and this morning committed to *Newgate*.
