The Affizes for the County of Bucks, will be held on the 10th of this Instant *June* at *Wickham*, according to what was published in the last *Gazette*.

Genova, June 3. You have already had an account of what passed here from the 17th to the 27th of the last Month, and now am to inform you that the 27th in the Evening after some intermission the French began again to shoot their Bombes into the Town with great fury, and so continued till the next day at Noon, having in that time shot above 1200 Bombes which did a great deal of mischief. The 28th in the Evening they drew off their Gallies, and that Night their Gallies Sailed to the Westward, and were followed the next Morning by the Ships except 7 that Sailed Eastward; before their departure they sent a Shore to know what was become of Monsieur de la Motte one of the Captains of their Ships, and were answered that he was killed by some of the Country People of *Bisagno*. We reckon the French shot about 14000 Bombes, of which about 2000 broke in the Air, about 4000 fell in the Sea, and the rest did Execution; There were about 120 Persons killed with the Bombes and the fall of Houses; and we are told, that in the descent and other ways, the French lost 3 or 400 men. The French Prisoners we took, have been restored to their Liberty, and have had Money given them to carry them out of the Territories of this State. The Count de *Meigar* Governor of *Milan* hath been here, being received and complemented according to his Quality; He staid here only one night, and offered the Senate a farther assistance of men both Horse and Foot, for which they gave him their thanks, and told him that they wanted nothing but Maritime Forces. Yesterday in the Evening eight Gallies of this Republick commanded by *Gio. Maria Doria* sailed from hence to go and joyn the so long expected Spanish Gallies.

Dantzick, June 7. Our Letters from *Cracow* of the first Instant, tell us, that the King of *Poland* was gone with all the General Officers, to the Rendezvous of his Army, which was appointed to be held at *Wesie* on the Frontiers of *Podolia*; And that it was said his Majesty intended to attack *Caminiec*; That the Cast lan of *Cracow* was marching with a considerable Body of men to joyn the Cossacks, commanded by General *Mobila*, and that after their conjunction they would march to the assistance of *Petro-*

zensko the Hospodar of *Walachia*, who is under the Protection of the King of *Poland*.

Vienna, June 8. The Imperial Troops are on their march to the General Rendezvous in *Hungary*, which we are now told, will not be held till the 10th or 12th of this month. In the mean time General *Caprara* marches with 8000 men towards *Upper-Hungary*, and Count *Bargozzy*, whose Troops are very much increased, the Hungarians that Desert Count *Teckele* coming in to him, has orders to joyn General *Caprara*. They write from *Hungary*, that the Barou de *Mercy* was polled with the Troops under his command between *Newbeusel* and *Barkan*; That Colonel *Heussler* was with 3000 Horse and Dragoons on the other side of it; and that they had advice by several Deferters, that the Garison consisted but of 1000 Foot and 500 Horse, and that they were in great want of Provisions. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, that a Body of the Cossacks, who had advanced into the Country of the Tartars of *Budziacke* near the Black Sea, have lately obtained a very great advantage, but do not give us the Particulars.

Lintz, June 10. The last Letters from *Hungary* give an account that the Duke of *Lorrain* was come to *Nitria* within two Leagues of *Newbeusel*; and that that place continues very closely blocked up by the Baron de *Mercy*; that the Imperial Troops were marching to the General Rendezvous; And that Count *Caprara* with 8000 Imperialists, and Count *Bargozzy* with his Hungarian Troops, are to act in *Upper-Hungary* against Count *Teckele* in case he continues in his Rebellion. The advices from the Turkish Territories, tell us, The Grand Signior and the Grand Visier who had resolved to remove to *Belgrade* to give warmth to the Operations of the Campagne, have been obliged to change that Resolution and to remain at *Adrianople*, by reason of the great disorder the Affairs of that Empire are in; And that the Grand Signior hath appointed the Aga of the Janinaries to command his Forces in *Hungary*, which it's said are to act only defensively, while their main Force is employed under the command of one of their most eminent Bassa's against the King of *Poland*: But these advices do not come from hands that can be relied upon.

Francfort, June 15. The Troops of *Bavaria* are on their march towards *Ulm*. There hath been held a review of those of *Wirtzburg* and *Bamberg*; and the Troops of *Hesse* are at *Weizlaer* not far from this place. Prince *Waldeck* is gone to the Princes of the House of *Saxony*, to press them to hasten the march of their Troops.

Cologne, June 16. Our Elector is removed from hence with his whole Court to *Bonne*; His Troops are drawing together; and we are told, that a Body of French, that are to joyn them, are expected this Evening at *Zulich* five or six Leagues from hence. Monsieur de *Tambonneau* the French Resident, is likewise retired from hence, and is now with the Bishop of *Strasbourg* at *Breuil*, whether our Magistrates have sent six Deputies to confer with the said Bishop, upon what hath been proposed to them on the part of his Electoral Highness.

Hamburg, June 16. The King of *Denmark* hath appointed the Rendezvous of his Forces to be on the 19th of this month between *Itzehoe* and *Kelling-buysen*; And accordingly his Troops and a Train of Artillery are marching thither. The Swedes do fortifie *Wismar*, 1000 men being daily at work there. Our Polish Letters give an account, that the King of *Poland* was gone from *Fawarow* to put himself at the Head of his Army, which we are assured will consist of above 60000 fighting men: They say the Turks are resolved to bring a great Army into the Field on that side.

Brussels, June 20. The Dutch Forces continue encamped between *Vilvoord* and *Louvaine*; The Prince of *Orange* having his Quarters at *Haren*: The Marquis de *Grana* has drawn the Spanish Horse and Dragoons out of the several Garisons, who are encamped by themselves near *Digheem*, making together 3500 Horse and Dragoons under the command of the Prince de *Vaudemont* and Count *Salazar*; And his Excellency hath sent his Train of Artillery to the Camp. The French Army is encamped between *Lessines* and *Grammont*, being daily reinforced with fresh Troops: On Sunday last the Prince de *Conti* came to *Mabeuge*, with a Detachment of 10000 men from *Luxemburg*, and hath, it's believed, by this time joyned the *Mareschal de Schomberg*.

Hague, June 20. The States of *Holland* having after long and serious debates resolved to accept the Truce of 20 years proposed by his Most Christian Majesty: The Nobles and two of the Eighteen Towns viz. *Rotterdam* and *Medenblicke* dissenting; They went in a Body to Communicate the Resolutions they had taken to the States General. The Provinces of *Friezeland*, *Groningen*, *Zealand* and *Utrecht*, have, it's said, likewise accepted of the Truce, and the other two Provinces seem inclined to it, so that it's believed the States General will in a day or two, come to an unanimous Resolution in this matter. And yesterday in the Evening the Deputies of the State were with the French Ambassador, to desire a Prolongation of the time given them by his Most Christian Majesty for a few days, which his Excellency consented to.

Paris, June 21. They write from *Flanders* that the *Mareschal de Schomberg* was advanced to *Lessines* within eight Leagues of *Brussels*; and that it was believed he would approach nearer to that City, if the Truce was not signed at the *Hague*, within the term given by his Most Christian Majesty. The City of *Trier* hath received a French Garison; and the *Mareschal de Crequi* is marched towards *Limburg*. From *Catalonia* we have advice that, the *Mareschal de Belfonds* was encamped at *Gorgoigne*, and that he was going to put his Troops into Quarters during the great Heats.

Westminster, June 13. This day *William Sacheverell*, *George Gregory*, and *Charles Hutchinson*, Esquires, and the other Persons convicted the last Term of a great Riot at *Nottingham*, appeared at the Kings Bench Bar, to receive the Judgment of the Court upon their said Conviction; which was, that Mr. *Sacheverell* should pay a Fine of 500 Marks; Mr. *Gregory* 300 Marks, Mr. *Hutchinson* 200 Marks; Fines being likewise set upon the rest according to the value of their several Estates. And that all of them find Sureties for their Good Behaviour for a Twelve month.

Westminster, June 14. This day Sir *Thomas Armstrong* was brought from *Newgate* to the Kings Bench Bar, where being asked what he could say for himself, why Execution should not be awarded against him, he standing attainted by Outlawry upon an Indictment of High Treason for Conspiring the Death of the King, &c. and having nothing material to offer,

the Court made a Rule, that he should be executed on Friday next at *Tyburn*.

He is vehemently suspected to be concerned in these Robberies and Burglaries following, viz. In a Burglary committed in *Norfolk* some time since with three more, where one of their Companions was killed In a Robbery on the Highway with *Walter Gilman* nigh *Newport* in *Hessex*, where they thort a Horse: In another Robbery with the said *Gilman* and one *Furniell*, for robbing two Burchers that live about four Miles from *Ailesbury*: In another Robbery at *Stowe* in the Woods in *Gloucestershire*. He usually when he hath committed any Robberies, to go for *Ireland* till the noise be over. There was taken with him a large Silver Rapier with a Bow and Silver figure in the Shell, with a Scrowl Leaf on each side of the Figure; a Mass Face on the middle of the Bow, a railed Silver handle and a three Square Blade. A Silver Watch with a tudded Case, the Lining out of the lower part of the Case, long frised Hours on the Dial Plate; it has likewise the days of the Month, and goes 30 hours; the Makers name is *Thomas Rothram de Lewis*. If any one has been robbed by the said *Graydinge*, or of the said Watch and Sword, let them repair to the said Keeper, where they may see the said Offender, and the Watch and Sword, if owned, restored, prosecuting the Offender according to Law.
