Venice, June 10. This Morning the Præcurator *Moresini* Captain General of the Forces of this State, sailed from hence with 16 Ships, 5 Galeasses, and 2 Gallies, to joyn the rest of the Fleet. They have on board a great many Land-men, which are commanded under the General by the Count *de Straffoldo*. From *Dalmatia* they write, that the Turks having attempted to retake *Duarez* from the Morlaques, they were defeated with the loss of 200 men. By a Vessel arrived from *Cyprus* we have advice, that the Grand Signior hath caused all the Goods belonging to the Subjects of this State to be seized.

Milan, June 7. Our Governor the Count *de Melgar*, has, since his return from *Genova*, given out Commissions for twenty Companies of Foot, which are to be raised in *Lombardy*; and there is a discourse of making another Levy of Germans.

Legborne, June 6. The 31. past, arrived in this Port three French Men of War commanded by Monsieur *Tourville*, who sailed again the third Instant, being, it's said, bound for *Tripoly*. The Pope Gallies, and a Part of our great Duke, are gone to joyn the *Venetian Fleet*.

Vienna, June 11. The Reports from *Hungary* give an account that the Imperial Troops had passed the

Waag at several places without holding a General Rendezvous; and that on the eighth Instant the Duke of *Lorraine* had his Quartets near *Comorra*, having about 30000 men in a Body, not reckoning those that are commanded by the Baron *de Mercy* and those of the Prince *de Lubomirski*; and that the Count *de Staremberg* our Governor arrived the seventh at his Highestes Quarters, being accompanied with Father *Marc d'Aviano*, and the Baron *Abele*. Count *Maximilian de Staremberg* is likewise gone to the Army, being to command the Artillery; and in few days the Gallies, and other small Vessels that are to be commanded by the Count *de Vecchi*, will be in a condition to part from hence. The Letters from *Buda* of the first Instant tell us, that the Poles and Cossacks, have defeated a great Body of Turks and Tartars on the Frontiers of *Moldavia*; and that of these 16000 and eight Bassas were slain; and that *Serasquier* Bassa, who at the Siege of this City, was Aga of the Janissaries, and was appointed by the Grand Signior to command his Forces this Campaigne in *Hungary*, upon the news of this defeat, had orders sent him to march with the best of his Troops towards *Valachia*; The Turks thinking it of the greatest importance to them, to secure themselves on that side.

Linz, June 13. They write from *Hungary*, that the Duke of *Lorraine* was on his march with the Imperial Army towards *Buda*, having left *Newbrusel* blockaded up by the Troops commanded by the Baron *de Mercy*; and we hope that place will not be able to hold out much longer, all our advices assuring us it is reduced to the last extremity. The Count *de Dracowitz* has undertaken to raise a Regiment of *Hungarians* for the Emperors Service. And the Palatine of *Hungary* does assemble the Troops of that Kingdom.

Cologné, June 20. The Deputies which our Magistrates sent to *Bonne*, returned last night, but we know not yet what report they have made of their Commission. The French do demolish the Fortifications of *Frier*, except the Walls which will be left standing for the security of the place; and we have advice that the Marschal *de Crequi* hath likewise put Garrisons into *Witlich* and *Bern Cassell*.

Hamburg, June 20. The Danish Troops are marching to the General Rendezvous in *Hohstein*; The King of *Denmark* is at present at *lixehoe*, but purpoues to go from thence to *Oldesloe*. The Dukes of *Lunenburg* have put some Troops into *Domi z* belonging to the Duke of *Mecklenburg*. Our last Letters from *Cracow* gave an account that the King of *Poland* was arrived on the Frontiers of *Podolitz*, where his Army was to Rendezvous; and that all things were preparing for the Siege of *Caminiec*.

Hague, June 23. The Provinces of *Holland*, *Friseland*, *Groningen*, *Utrecht* and *Ower Yssel* have agreed to the Truce proposed by his Most Christian Majesty. And the Deputies of *Zealand* and *Gelderland* are expecting the return of the Expresses they sent to their Principals, which it's not doubted but will likewise bring the contents of these Provinces.
