

turn into the Ambassadors'-court, set down at the Arcade, and go out into Cleveland-row. The carriages of the Cabinet Ministers and Great Officers of State may afterwards wait in the King's-court, those of the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers in the Ambassadors'-court, and those of all other persons having the *entrée* may wait in Stable-yard or St. James's-park, till called for; they are then to take up in the same order as they had set down, pass away into Cleveland-row, and up the left hand side of St. James's-street.

No carriage will be admitted with company a second time with the same ticket, to prevent which, it must be produced at Constitution-hill-gate, and at Stable-yard-gate also, where a corner of it will be torn off by the Marshalmen in attendance; and no person can be allowed the privilege of the *entrée* by any other approach to the Palace than the gates above mentioned.

Tickets for carriages belonging to persons having the *entrée* will be delivered at the Board of Green Cloth, St. James's-Palace, on Tuesday next, between the hours of eleven and three o'clock.

At the Court at Windsor-Castle, June 11, 1836.

CEREMONIAL of the Investiture of General His Serene Highness Louis William Frederick the reigning Landgrave of Hesse Hombourg with the Ensigns of an Honorary Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

THE following Knights Grand Crosses, in their mantles and collars of the Order, assembled in the Guard-chamber of His Majesty's Royal Castle of Windsor, viz. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, His Royal Highness the Prince of Orange, His Serene Highness the Prince Ernest of Hesse Philipsthal Barchfeld, his Grace the Duke of Wellington, the Lord Viscount Strangford, the Lord Viscount Beresford, Lord Hill, Lord Cowley, the Honourable Sir Edward Paget, the Lord Viscount Combermere, the Lord Stuart de Rothsay, the Honourable Sir Galbraith-Lowry Cole, the Marquess of Londonderry, Sir William Henry Clinton, the Honourable Sir Charles Colville, the Right Honourable Sir James Kempt, Sir Gordon Drummond, Sir George-Townsend Walker, Bart., the Right Honourable Sir George Cockburn, Lord Heytesbury, Lord Howard of Effingham, the Earl of Rosslyn, Lord Farnborough, Sir George Martin, Sir Harry Neale, Bart., the Right Honourable Sir Stratford Canning, Sir Thomas Byam Martin, Sir James Hawkins-Whitshed, Bart., the Lord Strafford, the Honourable Sir Robert Stopford, the Right Honourable Sir Robert Adair, Sir William Hargood, the Honourable Sir William Lumley, Sir James

Walter-Aston Blount, Esq. (Chester Herald), Genealogist; Algernon Greville, Esq. Bath King of Arms; Captain Michael Seymour, R. N. Register and Secretary; Sir William Woods (Clarenceux King of Arms), Deputy Register and Secretary; and George Frederick Beltz, Esq. (Lancaster Herald), Gentleman Usher of the Order.

At half past six o'clock, the Knights Grand Crosses having been called over, proceeded, with the Officers of the Order, into the presence of the Sovereign in Saint George's-hall, with the usual reverences.

Then, by His Majesty's command, General His Serene Highness Louis William Frederick the reigning Landgrave of Hesse-Hombourg was received at the entrance of Saint George's-hall by General the Earl of Rosslyn and Admiral Sir James Hawkins Whitshed, Bart., the senior General and the senior Admiral present, and was conducted between them to the Sovereign, preceded by Bath King of Arms (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet-cushion), and by the Gentleman Usher of the Order.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, having received from Bath King of Arms the ribband and badge, presented them to the Sovereign, and His Majesty was pleased to put the same over the Landgrave's right shoulder; His Serene Highness having had the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and, having received from His Majesty the star of a Knight Grand Cross, withdrew.

Then, by His Majesty's command, the Knights Grand Crosses were again called over, and, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.

Her Majesty the Queen, Her Royal Highness the Landgravine of Hesse-Hombourg, His Serene Highness the reigning Duke of Brunswick, their Royal Highnesses Prince William and Prince Alexander of the Netherlands, Prince George of Cambridge, Prince Charles of Solms, and many personages of distinction, together with the Officers of the Royal Household, were present at this august ceremony.

In the evening a dinner of state was given by the Sovereign, in the Waterloo-chamber, to the Knights Grand Crosses, at which several noble and distinguished personages were present, together with the Officers of the Order.

Their Majesties shortly after proceeded to the Drawing-room, where they were received by a party of Nobility and Gentry, specially invited on this occasion.
