Venice, June 12.

He Fleet of this State is at Sea, having on board 13 or 14000 Land men; They have taken their Courie for the Levani; and we doubt not but they will undertake fome great Enter prize. The Prince of Parma is to go

and command in *Dalmatia*, where this State wi'l have a very good Army, which with the help of the Morlaques will give the Turks work enough. Our laft Letters from *Conflantinople* gave an account that the Turks were raifing two great Armies, the one to be employed againft the Poles, and the other in *Hungary*; but withall tell us, that things were in great diforder, and the Janifari.s very much diffatisfied.

Milan, June 9. Our Governor the Count de Melgar, has alfured the Republick of Genoua that he will lend all the Troops in this Country to their alfultance, if they have need of them. His Excellency has given out Commissions to raise 20 Companies of Foot, and is providing a Fond for that Service; and it's faid he intends to raise some German Troops.

Dantzicke, June 10. The last Letters we had from Cracow told us that the King was arrived on the Frontiers of Podolia, where his Troops were to hold their general Rendezvous; That great preparations were made for the Siege of Caminiec, but that after all it was believed the King would not enter upon it in the beginning of the Campagne, but that leaving that place blocked up, he would march towards Moldavia and Valachia, to fecure thole Provinces; And the fame Letters fay, that it was believed the Turks, knowing the importance of them, would draw all the Force they could that We may certainly expect in a fhort time way, to hear of some confiderable action on that fide; for the King of Poland has a great Army, and will not be idle with it. The Molcovites are very backward to enter into the War; their affairs at home not being in a condition for it ;>however it's hoped the Imperial Ambaffador has upon his arrival at Molcow, disposed that Court to enter into the League

Vienna, fune 15. The Letters from Hungary do allure us, that the Duke of Lorrain will ad-The Letters from Hungary vance with the Imperial Army to Peff to attack that place, and afterwards Buda, unless the advices he receives from the Turkilh Territories, make him change his defign. The publick account we have hitherto had of the Enemies preparations for this Campagne, hath been fuch, as to beget a belief here, that they will not be able to bring any great Armics into the Field this Summer, and now lately we were told that the Aga of the Janifaries who was marching towards Hungary, had been countermanded, and ordered to turn with the Forees he had with him towards Valachia and Moldavia, to make head against the Poles; but this news cannot be relied upon. The King of Poland is by this time in the Field with an Army of 60000 men, and every body concludes

ready fet down before it: It is a place of great importance; and therefore it's thought the Turk^S will make their greateft Effort on that fide, to fave it. Count *Teckeley* perfifts in his Rebellion; and there is reafon to believe that his late Propofals were not made with any real intention to bring things to an accommodation, but only to gain time: It is reported that 5000 Turks and Tartars have joyned him, and that he threatens to make an Inroad into *Moravia*; to prevent which fome Imperial Troopshave, it's faid, been ordered that way.

Lintz, Fune 16. On Sunday last arrived here, two Expresses from Hungary, with Letters from the Dake of Lorrain; wherein we are told, he gave the Emperor an account, That he was encamped with the Imperial Army, which confilted, of about 30000 men near Gran, expecting the Regiments that were on their march from Moravia and Silefia; And that he had rec ived ad-vice that 80000 Turks were marching towards Hungary; and that Count Teckeley had received from them an assistance of 3 or 4000 men; that it was faid he would fall into Moravia, and that fome of his Troops were already advanced The Prince of Lubomirski is on his to Zurach. march with 3000 Poles to joyn the Imperial Army; But we do not heat that the King of Pe-land defigns to fend any of his Troops for Hungary, thinking it more for the advantage of the Common Caule to employ his whole Force in Podolia. There are Letters from the Frontiers of Poland, which fay, that that King was marching with a great Army towards Moldavia; and that the Coffacks commanded by their General Mohila, were ordered to observe the Tartars.' Several Expresses have within these few days been fent from hence to the Courts of Bavaria, Saxon), Brandenburg, &c. as is faid, to acquaint thole Princes, That the Emperor is willing to accept the Truce as it was at first propo'ed by France.

Lintz, June 16. The Imperial Army was encamped the 12th Inflant near Gran, where a Bridge is laying over the Danube; and the Duke of Lorrain had received advice that the Turks were marching with a great Force towards Hungary; if it be true, his Highnels will not be in a condition with the Forces he has now with him, which it's faid are not above 25000 men, to exccute his defign upon Peß and Buda; Several Regiments that had their Winter-Quarters in Silefia and Moravia, had not yet joyned the Army; and the Count de Caprara and the Ba-ron de Mercy, were abroad with separate Bodies, the first to observe Count Teckeley, and the other to block up Newbeufel. The Recruits for the Imperial Army are continued in all the Hereditary Countries; and Officers will be employed the whole Summer to raile all the men they can; Part of the Regiment of Becke, quartered hereabouts, has orders to march for Hungarys and we

Hamburg, June 23. I be King of Denmark isstill at Itzebue, and will it's faid continue there fome time. From Berlin we have an account, that an Envoy was arrived there from the Elector of Bavaria; and that the Lunenburg Minister had acquainted the Elector of Brandenburg that the Duke of Zell had put fome Troops of this Circle into Domitz in pursua ce of an Order he had received from the Emperor. From Cracow they write, that the Polith Army was on its mirch towards Podolig; and that they had advice that the Turks made great preparations in order to relieve Caminiec.

Hague, Fune 27. On the 24th inftant the States General concluded by plurality (the Confents of the Provinces of Zealand and Gelderland not being yet brought in) to accept the Truce of twenty years proposed by his Most Christian Majesty; and deputed fix of their Body to acquaint the French Ambaffador therewith; his Excellency thereupon difpatched Expresses to give the King his Matter, as likewife the Marefchil de Schomberg, who commands the French Army in Flanders, an account of what had paffed. And at the fame time the States General fent to the Prince of Orange 10 communicate to him the Refelution they had taken. The Papers of Amsterdam have been relieved to the Deputi s of that City; and the States of Holland have it's faid ordered, that what hath been entred on this Subject, shall be razed out of their publick Register. The Ministers of Sweden, Lupublick Register. nenburg, and the Circle of Franconia, were yesterday morning in Conference with the Deputies of this State.

Hague, June 27. About four this Afternoon five Deputies of the States General went in their Coaches to the House of the French Amballa-

dor, as we are told, to Sign the Treaty. Amilerdam, June 27. The States General have accepted the Truce proposed by the Molt Christian King: And we expect our next Letters from the Hague will tell us that the Treaty is Signed by the French Ambalfador and the Deputics of this State; by which fix weeks is given the king of Spain to accept the faid Truce; And a Month to the Dyctat Ratubonne to agree to it upon the Conditions already offred them. The Papers of this City that were Sealed up at the Hague, have been reliored untouched, and thereupon our Magistrates have again opened their publick Calh, and the Receiver. General of Holland has been here, and has received a confiderable fum of Money for the Service of the State; and the actions of the East-India Company that were the last week at about 320, are risen to The Lettersfrom Hamburg fay, the above 400. King of Denmark was still at Iszeboe, and that the general Rendezvous of his Troops was put off till the 11th of the next Month. They likewile tell us, that the Brandenburg Troops that had orders to march, were countermanded.

Paris, June 28. The French Army commanded by the Marcichal de schomberg continued, according to our last advices from Flanders, cacamped at Leffines; but the States General having accepted the Neutrality proposed to them by his Most Christian Majelty, the Campagne is not like to last much longer on that fide. The Pope's Nuncio had fome days agone an Audience of the King, concerning, as is faid, the affairs of Genoua. The laft news we had of the.
