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Venice, June 12.

THE Fleet of this State is at Sea, having on board 13 or 14000 Land men; They have taken their Course for the *Levani*; and we doubt not but they will undertake some great Enterprize. The Prince of *Parma* is to go and command in *Dalmatia*, where this State will have a very good Army, which with the help of the *Morlaques* will give the Turks work enough. Our last Letters from *Constantinople* gave an account that the Turks were raising two great Armies, the one to be employed against the Poles, and the other in *Hungary*; but withall tell us, that things were in great disorder, and the Janisaries very much dissatisfied.

Milan, June 9. Our Governor the Count *de Melgar*, has assured the Republick of *Genoua* that he will send all the Troops in this Country to their assistance, if they have need of them. His Excellency has given out Commissions to raise 20 Companies of Foot, and is providing a Fond for that Service; and it's said he intends to raise some German Troops.

Dantzicke, June 10. The last Letters we had from *Cracow* told us that the King was arrived on the Frontiers of *Podolia*, where his Troops were to hold their general Rendezvous; That great preparations were made for the Siege of *Caminiec*, but that after all it was believed the King would not enter upon it in the beginning of the Campagne, but that leaving that place, blocked up, he would march towards *Moldavia* and *Valachia*, to secure those Provinces; And the same Letters say, that it was believed the Turks, knowing the importance of them, would draw all the Force they could that way. We may certainly expect in a short time to hear of some considerable action on that side; for the King of *Poland* has a great Army, and will not be idle with it. The *Moscovites* are very backward to enter into the War; their affairs at home not being in a condition for it; however it's hoped the Imperial Ambassador has upon his arrival at *Moscow*, disposed that Court to enter into the League.

Vienna, June 15. The Letters from *Hungary* do assure us, that the Duke of *Lorraine* will advance with the Imperial Army to *Pest* to attack that place, and afterwards *Buda*, unless the advices he receives from the Turkish Territories, make him change his design. The publick account we have hitherto had of the Enemies preparations for this Campagne, hath been such, as to beget a belief here, that they will not be able to bring any great Armies into the Field this Summer, and now lately we were told that the Aga of the Janisaries who was marching towards *Hungary*, had been countermanded, and ordered to turn with the Forces he had with him towards *Valachia* and *Moldavia*, to make head against the Poles; but this news cannot be relied upon. The King of *Poland* is by this time in the Field with an Army of 60000 men, and every body concludes he will attack *Caminiec*, and probably he is al-

ready set down before it: It is a place of great importance; and therefore it's thought the Turks will make their greatest Effort on that side, to save it. Count *Teckley* persists in his Rebellion; and there is reason to believe that his late Proposals were not made with any real intention to bring things to an accommodation, but only to gain time: It is reported that 5000 Turks and Tartars have joyned him, and that he threatens to make an Inroad into *Moravia*; to prevent which some Imperial Troops have, it's said, been ordered that way.

Lintz, June 16. On Sunday last arrived here two Expresses from *Hungary*, with Letters from the Duke of *Lorraine*; wherein we are told, he gave the Emperor an account, That he was encamped with the Imperial Army, which consisted of about 30000 men near *Gran*, expecting the Regiments that were on their march from *Moravia* and *Silesia*; And that he had received advice that 80000 Turks were marching towards *Hungary*; and that Count *Teckley* had received from them an assistance of 3 or 4000 men; that it was said he would fall into *Moravia*, and that some of his Troops were already advanced to *Zurach*. The Prince of *Lubomirski* is on his march with 3000 Poles to joyn the Imperial Army; But we do not hear that the King of *Poland* designs to send any of his Troops for *Hungary*, thinking it more for the advantage of the Common Cause to employ his whole Force in *Podolia*. There are Letters from the Frontiers of *Poland*, which say, that that King was marching with a great Army towards *Moldavia*; and that the Cossacks commanded by their General *Mohila*, were ordered to observe the Tartars. Several Expresses have within these few days been sent from hence to the Courts of *Bavaria*, *Saxony*, *Brandenburg*, &c. as is said, to acquaint those Princes, That the Emperor is willing to accept the Truce as it was at first proposed by *France*.

Lintz, June 16. The Imperial Army was encamped the 12th Instant near *Gran*, where a Bridge is laying over the *Danube*; and the Duke of *Lorraine* had received advice that the Turks were marching with a great Force towards *Hungary*; if it be true, his Highness will not be in a condition with the Forces he has now with him, which it's said are not above 25000 men, to execute his design upon *Pest* and *Buda*; Several Regiments that had their Winter-Quarters in *Silesia* and *Moravia*, had not yet joyned the Army; and the Count *de Caprara* and the Baron *de Mercy*, were abroad with separate Bodies, the first to observe Count *Teckley*, and the other to block up *Newbeusel*. The Recruits for the Imperial Army are continued in all the Hereditary Countries; and Officers will be employed the whole Summer to raise all the men they can; Part of the Regiment of *Becke*, quartered hereabouts, has orders to march for *Hungary*; and we are told that the Elector of *Bavaria* will send a good Body of his Troops thither.

Municken, June 19. The Elector of *Bavaria* is at present at *Starenberg*; but is expected here this day to assist at a Council of War that is appointed

ed to be held, where it's believed it will be re-
loved how many of his Electoral Highness's
Troops shall be sent for *Hungary*. An Envoy
hath been sent by our Elector to the Court of
Brandenburg, and another to that of *Saxony*.

Hamburg, June 23. The King of *Denmark* is still
at *Itzehoe*, and will it's said continue there some
time. From *Berlin* we have an account, that an
Envoy was arrived there from the Elector of *Ba-
varia*; and that the *Lunenbourg* Minister had ac-
quainted the Elector of *Brandenburg* that the Duke
of *Zell* had put some Troops of this Circle into
Domitz in pursuance of an Order he had received
from the Emperor. From *Cracow* they write,
that the Polish Army was on its march towards *Po-
dolia*; and that they had advice that the Turks made
great preparations in order to relieve *Caminiee*.

Hague, June 27. On the 24th instant the States
General concluded by plurality (the Consents of
the Provinces of *Zealand* and *Gelderland* not being
yet brought in) to accept the Truce of twenty
years proposed by his Most Christian Majesty;
and deputed six of their Body to acquaint the
French Ambassador therewith; his Excellency
thereupon dispatched Expresses to give the King
his Matter, as likewise the *Mareschal de Schomberg*,
who commands the French Army in *Flanders*, an
account of what had passed. And at the same time
the States General sent to the Prince of *Orange* to
communicate to him the Resolution they had taken.
The Papers of *Amsterdam* have been restored to
the Deputies of that City; and the States of *Hol-
land* have it's said ordered, that what hath been
entered on this Subject, shall be razed out of their
publick Register. The Ministers of *Sweden*, *Lun-
enbourg*, and the Circle of *Franconia*, were yester-
day morning in Conference with the Deputies of
this State.

Hague, June 27. About four this Afternoon
five Deputies of the States General went in their
Coaches to the House of the French Ambassa-
dor, as we are told, to Sign the Treaty.

Amsterdam, June 27. The States General have
accepted the Truce proposed by the Most Christian
King: And we expect our next Letters from the
Hague will tell us that the Treaty is Signed by the
French Ambassador and the Deputies of this State;
by which six weeks is given the King of *Spain*
to accept the said Truce; And a Month to the
Dyct at *Ratubonne* to agree to it upon the Condi-
tions already offered them. The Papers of this City
that were Sealed up at the *Hague*, have been restored
untouched, and thereupon our Magistrates have
again opened their publick Calh, and the Receiver-
General of *Holland* has been here, and has received
a considerable sum of Money for the Service of the
State; and the actions of the *East-India* Company
that were the last week at about 320, are risen to
above 400. The Letters from *Hamburg* say, the
King of *Denmark* was still at *Itzehoe*, and that the
general Rendezvous of his Troops was put off till the
11th of the next Month. They likewise tell us,
that the *Brandenburg* Troops that had orders to
march, were countermanded.

Paris, June 28. The French Army command-
ed by the *Mareschal de Schomberg* continued, ac-
cording to our last advices from *Flanders*, en-
camped at *Lessines*; but the States General hav-
ing accepted the Neutrality proposed to them
by his Most Christian Majesty, the Campaigne is
not like to last much longer on that side. The
Pope's Nuncio had some days ago an Audi-
ence of the King, concerning, as is said, the af-
fairs of *Genoua*. The last news we had of the
French Fleet, was, that they took their Course
towards *Catalonia*.

Whitehall, June 20. His Majesty hath been

Graciously pleased in Consideration of the Loy-
