HEREAS by an Act, passed in the third and fourth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the general regulation of the "to Customs," it is, among other things, enacted, that goods of places within the limits of the East India Company's charter shall be imported only into such ports of the United Kingdom as shall be approved of by the Lords of the Treasury, and declared by an Order in Council to be fit and proper for such importation:

And whereas the port of Gloucester, in the county of Gloucester, has been approved of by the Lords of His Majesty's Treasury for that purpose; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the said port of Gloucester is fit and proper for the importation of goods from places within the limits of the East India Company's charter:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Church Commissioners'-Office, August 30, 1836:

HE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, assigning a district to Saint John's Chapel, Whetstone, in the county of Middlesex, under the provisions of the 16th section of the 59th Geo. 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at St. James's, the 29th day of June 1836, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of

the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide. such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions. of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, "that in any. case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parlia-ment, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, " that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said recited Act, or this Act, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which powers of the said Act, or this Act; and such district. shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controll of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriages shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese. any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapel shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, or by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes; and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;' " and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled · An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that when the last census was taken, the parish of Finchley, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London, contained a population of 3210 persons; that there is, besides the parish church, one chapel in the said parish, called Saint John's Chapel, Whetstone, which contains accommodation for 407 persons, including 204 free seats, appropriated to the use of the poor, which is consecrated, and in which divine service is regularly performed:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this

parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the said chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; intituled "An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named the district of Saint John, Whetstone, with boundaries as follows:

To commence on the High North Road, at the northern extremity of the parish of Finchley, then, proceeding south, along the eastern boundary of the parish of Finchley, where it joins the parish of Friern Barnet, as far as the south east corner of a field belonging to William Lambert, Esq. numbered in the award 1063; then proceeding along a fence into a cart lane, and then following in a southerlydirection the western side of the said cart lane, into North Colney-hatch-road; then, along North Colneyhatch-road, into the High North Road; then, proceeding north, along the High North Road to Nether-street road; then, westward, along Netherstreet road to the brook; then, following northward the line of the brook to where the parish of Finchley joins the chapelry of Tatteridge, in the parish of Bishops Hatfield and the parish of Barnet; then, following north east the boundary of the parish of Finchley and the parish of Barnet, to the place where the boundary commenced, as the said district is described in the map annexed to the said representation, and is therein coloured yellow:

And whereas the said Commissioners have further represented that baptisms, churchings, marriages, and burials should be performed in the said chapel; and that the fees for the said rites should, from and after the next avoidance of the parish church of Finchley, belong to the Minister of the said chapel for the time being:

That the consent of the Lord Bishop of London has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, in testimony of which he has signed and sealed the said representation; and humbly praying, that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to His Majesty in His royal wisdom shall seem meet:

His Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
