Vienna, July 2

Everal Expresses are arrived from Hungary with the news of the defeat of a very considerable Body of Turks near Vaccia; of which you will have the Particulars from Lintz. There are Letters from Croatia, which say, That General Leslie advancing with 6000 Germans and 12000 Croats to the Bridge of Effecke, had taken the Fort at the head of it, and had after-wards fet Fire to the Bridge in several places, of which we must expect the confirmation From Upper Hungary we have advice, that the Cafile of Ungwar is very closely besieged by the Rebels. From Cracom they write, that the King of Poland intended to part from Fawarow the 25th of the last Month, to go and put himself at the head of his Army, which was in the mean time marching under the command of the Crown General.

Lintz, July 4. The second Instant arrived here from Hungary Count Charles de Lamberg, being fent by the Duke of Lorrain, to give the Emperor an account of the defeat of a great Body of Turks, who had posted themselves near Vaccia to cover that place, of which we have the following Rela-The Imperial Army having repassed the Danube near Gran on the zeth and 21. of the last Month, they flaid two or three days in the Neighborhood of that place, expecting the Regiments that were on their march from Silesia, where they had Wintered, to joyn the Army, and then marched towards Vaccia to attack that place and Novi. grad; That the Duke of Lorrain receiving advice that the Enemy were posled near Vaccia, He refolved to fight th m, and advanced accordingly; That the Christians having on the 27th with some trouble passed the Desiles of Marots, they saw the Enemy standing in Batallia on the Hills near Vaccia, having the Danube and a great Mora's on their left, and a Wood on their right; The Duke of Lorrain made what haste he could to put the Army into Batallia, which having done about 11 a Clock, they marched in two Lines, besides the Reserve and the Troops appointed to take care of the Baggage, towards the Enemy, who suffered them to advance without any opposition, till they came on the Hill, but then with great fury and their vival Cries, charged them, beginning with the Regiment of Taff, which was almost in the middle of the first Line, where the Duke of Lorrain was in Person, whose Horse was wounded, and those of two Officers near him killed with Pistol-shot; but the Turks having spent their first fury, and observing the firmness of the Christians, turned their backs, though they quickly rallied and charged the Chrlstians on all sides, and then wheeling off again, re-turned a third time to the charge, but the Christians still advancing upon them without breaking Foot and fled; And the Imperial Cavalry of the

first Line pursued them above an hour; but by reafon of the swiftness of the Enemies Horses, the Christians quickly lost the fight of them. This Body confitted of about 20000 men, of their best Troops, commanded by the Visier of Budz, and several Bassa's under him; There were among them 4000 Tartars; most of their Foot were slain, and those that escaped got into Vaccia, which the Imperialists afterwards made themselves Masters of, the Turks that were in it, surrendring on discretion; in all, it's calculated about 3000 of the Enemy were killed, and 1500 taken prisoners, with seven Pieces of Cannon and several Standards; The Visier of Budz is supposed to be killed, his Horse having been taken by a Soldier of the Regiment of Taff, who presented it to the Duke of Lorrain; and among the prisoners there are, it's said, a Bassa and 10 Aga's; The loss of the Christians is very inconfilerable, this Victory having cost them not above 20 or 30 men. The 28th cost them not above 20 or 30 men. the Imperial Army continued in the Neigborhood of Vaccia, and the next day decamped and marched towards Peft. The Emperor has fent a Courier to the Pope with the news of this Victory, for

which Te Deum was lung here yesterday.

Bruffels, July 11. On Sunday last in the morning Monsieur de Chanlay, Quarter Master-Generat of the Armics of France (for whom the Mareschal de Schomberg had two days before by a Trumpeter he sent hither, desired a Passport) arrived here from the French Camp at Leffines, and being conducted to Court, had Audience of the Marquis de Grana, and was afterwards entertained by high Excellency at Dinner. In the afternoon, as likewise the next morning the Council of State was affembled; and last night Monsieur de Chanlay took his leave of his Excellency, and parted from hence this The Commission he came upon morning carly. is not made publick, but it's believed to have been about setling Contributions, and adjusting matters in relation to a suspension of Hostilities. Yesterday in the afternoon arrived here an Express from Lintz with the news of a great Victory obtained by the Duke of Lorrain against the Turks the 27th of the last Month. The Particulars we have, are; That the Visier of Buda being informed that the Imperial Army moved towards Now grad, he marched with 20000 Turks to Vaccia, and posted them very advantagioully upon a riling ground near that place, having on their left the Danube and a great Morals, and a great Wood on their right, and the Christians being to pass several Defiles before they could come to them; However the Duke of Lorrain continued his march, and having gained the Defiles, their Order, the Enemy fell into confusion, and advanced towards the Enemy, and engaged them, being seized with fear, their Horse abandoned the but the Turkish Horse soon fled, and the Germans closely pursued them and cut off most of their Foot; 3000 of the Turks were killed, 1400 taken prisoners, with many Standards and fix Pirces of Cannon; And in the heat of this action the Imporialists attacked Faceia, and after a di pute of five hours were Mafters of it, the Turks yielding themfelves prisoners; Five or fix Persons of Principal note among the Furks were killed, and it's believed the Visier of Buda is of that number, his Horf be-The loss on the fide of the Christ ans considerable. Hague, Juy 14. The States of Holland re-alsembled the 12th Instant. The Prince of Orange's Regiment of Horie-Guards returned hither the Loth Instant from Brabant; and the next day the Train of Artillery was brought back to Delf. Yesterday Monsieur de S. Didier returned hither with his Most Chrl lian Majesty's Ratification of the Treaty Signed here the 29th past. It is said that the Emperor has refolved to accept the Truce as

proposed by France.

From the French Camp at Fortia in Catalonia, Ju ie 16. 1684. The Mareschal de Belfonds having on the 21. Past

had a Conference with Monfirm du Quesne, who commands the French Fleet, and the Duke of Mortemar, General of the Gallies, in which it was refolved to attack Cap de Qiers, the next day the necessary Detachements were made as well from the Fl ct.a. the Army, and the Duke of Mortemar arrived with 10 Gallies before the place; and the same day the Mareschal de Belfonds removed with the Army from St. Pere Pescador, and came and encamped here; In the Evening the Marquis de Reuel posted himself with two Batallions before Cap de Quiers, and the next morning the Sieur de Chaferon, Lieutenant-General, arrived there with two Batallions more and a fmill Body of Dragoons, which he brought from Perpignan. About 150 Mique lets fallied out of the place, and skirmished with some of our Troops, but they quickly retired again: And in the Evening the Duke de Mortemar landed 600 men, who were employed in the Siege,

Sieur de Chaferon summoned the Tower of Pont-
